# Residents and businesses want main road improved

LOCHGILPHEAD resi- Lochnell and Poltalloch dents are calling on the trunk roads authority to improve one of the main roads through the town.

Following last week's report in the Argyllshire Advertiser (Friday October 2 'Lochgilphead's Poltalloch Street to be upgraded') several readers have contacted the paper to voice their concern over the lack of improvements to Lochnell Street.

Scotland Transerv, who maintain the A83, which runs through

Streets, announced last week they would spend £270,000 upgrading Poltalloch Street.

But many people feel the priority should be Lochnell Street, which is blighted by ruts and potholes.

Robert Wakeham contacted the Advertiser on Monday after reading last week's article.

Mr Wakeham said: 'It's really quite astonishing that Scotland Transerv is going to improve Poltalloch Street

The pensioner explained that her car was the second vehicle to reach the


'A van overtook my car otherwise I would've been first to meet the tree, so I consider myself very lucky because

# **LEADER funding** benefits local communities

**COMMUNITIES** across Argyll and Bute have benefited from the latest round of Argyll and the Islands European LEADER funding.

The Argyll and the Islands Local Action Group (LAG) held its seventh decision-making meeting on applications to the programme on Friday September 11 in Rothesay.

A total of 14 projects were awarded funding totalling £214,022.

Amongst the beneficiaries were Lochgoil Community Council who received £9,375 for their Ardentinny Path programme; Colintraive and Glendaruel Development Trust received £19,650 for Forward ColGlen!; Dunoon Burgh Hall Project received £35,000; the Dalriada Project received £3,360 for their marketing plan; Benmore and Kilmun Community Development

Trust received £3,000 for Gairletter Path link and Sandbank Community Development Trust received £11,540 for a bird viewing hide at the Holy Loch.

James Hilder, chairman said: 'This is a great confirmation of the significance of social enterprise locally. Community Groups and voluntary organisations now realise that grant funding is steadily decreasing and undertaking trading activities or running your group as a business is by far the best way to achieve a more sustainable future.'

LEADER has now funded 87 projects with an input of £2,915,871. The total value of these projects totals £8,662,007, representing a substantial cash injection for communities across Argyll and the Islands.

# **Shellfish** transporter licence hit

# 'The conduct complained of is serious and action against the licence is merited'

A SPECIALIST shellfish transport company has had its knuckles rapped by the Traffic Commissioner.

Islay Crab Exports Ltd and director James Monaghan were called to attend a public inquiry with the Deputy Traffic Commissioner for Scotland, Richard McFarlane, over recording of driver hours and driving whilst using a mobile phone.

As a result, at midnight on October 13, the Operator's licence will be suspended for two weeks and Mr Monaghan's Large Goods Vehicle (LGV) driving licence will be suspended for nine months.

Islay Crab Exports has its registered office at Loch Awe House, Tarbert, with Mr Monaghan as sole director. The firm's operator's licence authorises the use of six vehicles and two trailers;

the company transports live shellfish in specially adapted trailers from Scotland to Donegal, Ireland, and Poole in Dorset, England.

Approximately people are employed by the business, which includes fishing boats and a processing plant on Islay; the firm also services 70 other fishing boats covering most of the Western Isles.

## **Fixed penalty**

commissioner heard that Mr Monaghan has been issued with fixed penalty tickets in October 2007 and January 2009 for using a mobile phone while driving a car and his ordinary driving licence endorsed in each case.

On March 31 this year at Basingstoke Magistrates' Court in England Mr Monaghan was fined £500 together with costs and charges for entering the name of a driver who worked for him part time on a tachograph chart in respect of a journey he had begin in Poole on December 27, 2008.

'The conduct complained of is serious and action against the licence is merited,' ruled Mr McFarlane.

The deputy commissioner said in his decision: 'Tiredness is a very real issue for drivers of all classes of vehicles. Recent statistics tend to suggest that one in every five serious road traffic accidents is caused by driver tiredness.'

And he added: 'It is of the gravest of concern to me that the two fixed penalty notices relate to the use made by Mr Monaghan of a hand-held mobile phone whilst driving a motor vehicle. It matters not that it was his car and not a large goods vehicle that he was driving at the material times.'

AS PART of the Homecoming Year celebrations, Inveraray Burns Club hosted a special entertaining performance recounting Robert Burns's one and only visit to Inveraray in June

The performance part drama, part musical and part narration was especially written and directed by club member Alison Duncan from Dunoon and staged in the Argyll Hotel, Inveraray where Burns is reputed to have stayed.

Unusually for the poet, little was ever recorded about the West Highland tour, but the recital gleaned together snippets of information taken from letters, songs and poems, setting the visit in the perspective of his personal life and in Scottish and worldwide history.

#### **Pilgrimage**

Was his visit a personal pilgrimage to the home county of Margaret Campbell, with whom Burns was very much in love and who had died suddenly? Was his visit to meet up with the Duke of Argyll and collect subscriptions for his very successful book of poems which had just recently been published? Were there other reasons for his tour?

The one fact which is

undeniable is that on Burns arrival in Inveraray the hotel was extremely busy on account of the Duke of Argyll hosting a fishing conference and he regarded the welcome he received as less than satisfactory. As a result, and as was his habit of scratching lines of verse on window, Burns etched some very scathing remarks about his visit on a window pane of the hotel: 'Who e're he be that sojourns here, I pity much his case, Unless they've come to wait upon their Lord, their God, His Grace.

'There's naethin' here but Heilan pride And Heilan scab and hunger. If Providence has sent me here, Twas surely sent in anger.'

Alison's performance related how Burns left Inveraray the following morning and stopped in at Dumbarton where he was made a Freeman of the Town, but not before enjoying a rip roaring all night ceilidh with friends on the shores of Loch Lomond. Eventually Burns came to love the Highlands as evidenced by the beautiful song, My heart's in the Highlands and the short verse A Highland Wel-





# Man fined £400 for leaving pets locked in car on hot day

#### Suffering

Damian Alexander Lord, aged 28, of 2 Laurel Court, Camelon, Falkirk, pleaded guilty by letter to causing unnecessary suffering to three dogs, knowing or that there would have been suffering by leaving the dogs in a locked and secured car in direct sunlight in a temperature of approximately 23°C for a duration of two-and-a-quarter hours without water or fresh air.

The court heard on Thursday last week that police officers had to go into the distillery to find Lord on June 24.

'By the time he came back to his car the vet had already been summoned,' said depute procurator fiscal Kelly Duling.



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

Peter Redshaw has lived in Craobh Haven almost since the village was established, over the years running a gift shop, launderette and charter boat business with his late wife, Ann. They kept scrapbooks charting the ups and downs of the new village, with its cottages and houses built to look like they had stood there for hundreds of years.

#### How did Craobh Haven come to be here?

It is a story that goes back to when 'From Russia With Love' was filmed in this area in the 1960s. Sean Connery and golfer Jack Nicolas were involved with a company called Topspin in a plan to form a large area, the whole of Lunga, with a large golf course on the hill and a marina. That was kicked into touch, but it was the start of it.

In 1982 Stanley Hampton revived the ideas. The area where these houses are built was a hill and that material was used to make a breakwater to join the three islands.

# When did you come to live here?

Ann and I came here in 1984 on a sailing holiday. I was working in Jordon at the time. We spent two weeks here in '84 and repeated that in '85, before we decided to buy a house, coming to live here from the east coast. We came in May - the house wasn't finished so we stayed on the caravan site from then until we moved into the house in early August. When we bought the house they wanted people buying to start a business. So we started the Mangle Laundrette in the village.

#### How did the village change of the years?

There was a row of houses half finished when the company went into liquidation in February 1987.

All the local people had to do something to keep the place operating because the liquidators didn't want to know at all. It was a lovely time because everyone in the village was working together.

Then in 1991 a firm called Craobh Haven 2000 came with big plans and lots of money. We welcomed them with open arms, but they went into receivership too. All the wonwonders here, but they haven't.

It would have been developed the way the original people had in mind. There were plenty of objections early on,


but had it gone on the way it was intended, I think it would have been a much more successful operation.

will this be consumed by fees - i.e.: rental for having the turbine on his property and maintenance)?



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
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# Caithness says it is ready for the challenge

'There's also something special about it being the main west coast ferry port – you can actually see folk arriving by plane, train, automobile and ferry


'It's a meeting point in so many ways – a natural place for a gathering like this!
