## Arran's special transport team

A GROUP of islanders is preparing to help those needing special transport after completing a British Red Cross training course for Isle of Arran Transport Service.

The service offers transport for people of all ages who have difficulty with public transport because of infirmity or disability.

Five volunteers were put through their paces at the training course at the fire station in Lamlash.

They received training in first aid and in moving and handling people, for example, if they are in a wheelchair.

Sharon Reader of the British Red Cross base in Ayr said there was an increased demand on the island to use the special bus provided by the service, which is available to islanders and also to visitors. It is also used to escort people to the mainland who need to go on to hospital in Glasgow.

'I am not sure why there is an increase in demand but it is going up all the time, and we are continue to look for more volunteers,' she

# Street lights spark row

PIRNMILL residents are blazing mad about plans to install street lighting, which the village has never had - and doesn't want.

The new lighting, five lampposts in all, are to be put up on a small new housing association development.

Now residents say their wishes not to have the lighting have been ignored and they should have been consulted.

They say they do not want what they feel will be a light pollution problem and the village has always been all right without lighting.

#### Going ahead

But the lights are going ahead, despite their objection, says North Ayrshire Council's (NAC) Jim Mason, of the roads department.

He said: 'In line with council policy, proposals for new developments should include a lighting plan.

'In addition, the council has a duty of care to ensure that new roads are safe. This means that the developer must submit a lighting design for approval by the Council.

'Lighting plays a part in letting drivers know different road characteristics such as warning that pedestrian movement is likely after possibly miles of unlit, unchanging road conditions with no pedestrian/vehicle conflict.'

something they do not want.

'This is not a road but a driveway to the development,' she said. 'It is a cul-de-sac that is to be

lit. It is light pollution and I don't want it. 'Every house in the village has lights on their homes which

residents put on when they go out and switch off when they are in.'

Another villager, Maggie McEachern, was also adamant the lights were not wanted.

'I think for a council whose roads are in the condition they are on Arran, to decide this is almost comical,' she said.

'This is one of the best places in the UK for stargazing because the sky is above the island is unpolluted.' Another villager, Grace Stewart, who has been allocated one of the new houses, was adamant the vil-

lagers did not want the lights. 'I am really against it and I, with Marie, campaigned against having them,' she told the *Banner*.

'The population of the village is 97 but we obtained 113 signatures because other people were so concerned.

'It is really annoying because it seems the view of the whole of the village doesn't matter.

'There is a lot of bad feeling in the village about these lights. Nobody wants them.

'Pirnmill is unique in that all the houses face the sea.'

She added that the village may have accepted shorter lampposts even though they did not want them, but those in the current planning proposal were too tall.

'It is very, very rural here,' she said. 'They are treating Pirnmill as if it was a big town or another housing scheme and not as a rural area.'

Mr Mason added that while the developer had yet to submit an amended design for approval, the units installed would not be eight metres high, as had been mentioned locally, but would be five or six metres high and fitted with cut-off, flat glass lanterns to ensure low light pollution and avoid glare for drivers.

Community councillor Campbell Laing told *The Banner*: 'The people of Pirnmill have the full support of the community council on this issue. I have been in contact with NAC and they say that the developers have not submitted a new design. If the tall lights go up, they will be told to take them down again.' In this week's Banner

RELIEF has greeted the news that an extension to Kilmory Cemetery is at last to go ahead. But villagers are still wondering when when the work will start after fighting for nearly 10 years for the ex-

tension.

At a special meeting of North Ayrshire Council on Tuesday, members agreed to a recommendation that the council should use an area of ground lying to the south of Kilmory

church, which has been designated the most suitable. Application will now be made to Kilmarnock Sheriff Court for authority to designate the site as a burial ground.

## Police launch assists off Brodick

ARRAN coastguard personnel was called to assist and towed the have been called out three times in the last week.

On Tuesday they answered an alarm call after a man in a small motor boat lost engine power en route from Ardrossan to Brodick, three-and-a-half miles out. Strathclyde police rescue launch,

Last Thursday the coastguards attended Corriecravie where a listening device had been washed ashore. David McKinnon of the Marine Coastguard Agency on Arran said a full team turned out and cordoned off the area between 6pm and 10pm.

On Saturday a military explosives ordnance team arrived to deal with the device and to ensure it was not explosive. It was removed after the team gave the allclear.

Later on Saturday coastguards searched for a jet skier reported missing between from Troon to Arran. They searched Brodick Bay and Lamlash Bay but the man was found safe near Troon. His machine had suffered engine failure.

Negotiations to purchase the Kilmory cemetery extension site are now under way with the General Trustees of the Church of Scotland.

Funds are being made available through the cemeteries revenue budget.

A fire brigade spokesman said the alarm had been faulty and there was no fire. However, fire fighters attended at 10.58am and left at 11am, with no action required.

On Friday June 23, retained personnel from Brodick and Lamlash were called to Alexander's shop in Main Street, Brodick, after a water heater exploded at 12.15pm. Fire fighters were on the scene within four minutes and left at 12.30pm. The fire was out by the time they arrived.

### Arran in line for sub sea cable?

PLANS to investigate the feasibility of a new electricity connection between Kintyre and the mainland, taking in Arran, have been announced.

Scottish Hyrdo Electric says several routes are being considered for the connection, which is needed to deliver power from new wind farms in Kintyre to the main electrical grid.

One option being considered is a subsea route from Carradale substation round the north of Arran and into the substation at Hunterston.

A route across Arran is also under consideration beginning further north on the Kintyre peninsula.

This latter option would involve the reconstruction of the existing overhead line from Carradale to the cable landing point.

Project manager Andrew Robertson emphasised that the utility company would work closely with any communities involved.

He said environmental issues were paramount in choosing the most appropriate route.

'We will be taking advice from the planning authorities and listening to local views to ensure we make the right decision,' he said.

#### Spin Off live in Brodick

MEMBERS of *Spin Off*, Arran Guild of Spinners, Weavers and Dyers, will be appearing live and inter-active on most Thursdays during July and August at the museum in Brodick.

Visitors can watch fleeces being turned into workable yarn through spinning and see how it is dyed using plant materials as well as an odd beetle or two. They can also see various ways of weaving being carried out and have a go themselves.

CalMac ties knot with new port manager at Brodick

There is a new face at Brodick Pier following the appointment by Caledonian MacBrayne (Cal-Mac) of a new port manager.

Two weeks ago Colin McCort took up the position at the Island's main ferry terminal, a role he says he is greatly looking forward to.

However, Colin is no stranger to Arran and is a familiar face to islanders, having been employed for the last 14 years with coach transport company Stagecoach. Seven of these have been spent on Arran as operations manager for the company.

Looking forward to his new role, Colin told *The Banner*: 'I am delighted to have joined CalMac.'

Colin has a long history of working with the Island's transport infastructure.

He said: 'I'm sure that my years in the transport industry will benefit me in my new position.'

Meanwhile, Arran's second ferry the *MV Saturn* has also been in service between Ardrossan and Brodick for the last fortnight. This is the second year the is-

land has benefited from two Cal-Mac ferries operating over the summer months.

CalMac's regional manager Robbie Brown told *The Banner*: 'Those of us involved on the Ardrossan to Brodick service are delighted to welcome *MV Saturn* and her crews back on the Arran service for the next 10 weeks.

'It is most important that both Islander's and visitors make use of our second vessel who although now an 'Old Lady' gives a completely different travelling experience when crossing to and from Scotland in minature.

*'MV Saturn* also enables us to carry the many vehicles that arrive at Ardrossan without a reservation and if weather conditions are kind gives us the opportunity to enhance the service we are able to offer our customers.' He added: 'Please help prove that the Islanders want the facility of a longer day on the mainland by travelling on *MV Saturn's* first and last sailings 7.15am ex Brodick and 6.30pm





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### Mountains climbed to raise cash for AMRT

Ben Nevis, Scafell and Snowdonia have all been conquered in an effort to raise funds for Arran Mountain Rescue Team.

Volunters from the Cushman and Wakefield company, which specialises in the industrial property market, took part in a marathon climb which involved tackling all three peaks in one day.

The nine intrepid climbers, Tori Alldred, Karl Alldred, Jon Lock, Steve Dolecki, Sonia Thomas, Lucy Whittaker, Elayne Wilks, Gary Wilks and Paul Kirman, wanted to raise cash for Arran Mountain Rescue Team (AMRT) after work colleague Graham McPhie fell on Goat Fell last September and was rescued by AMRT.

Although suffering serious neck and back injuries, Graham made a full recovery and the group wished to register their admiration for the volunteer rescue team which had come to their friend's aid.

Ben Nevis was conquered in five hours despite a good deal of snow on the top - and plenty of midges, and there then followed an overnight drive to Scafell for a 3:30am start.

Then it was off to Snowdonia where the team walked out from Pen-y-pass and reached the summit some two hours later.

The three mountains had been climbed in total of 22 hours and 25 minutes, with the exhausted team aiming to raise more than £1,000 for AMRT. However, such has been the responce to their fundraising effort, the group believe that they may achieve as much as three times their target.

Arran Mountain Rescue Team is almost totally supported by fund raising by team members and donations from the public.



## Kilmory gains £41,000 towards community transport project

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A community transport project based at Kilmory is among 15 projects throughout Scotland to share in over one million pounds funding.

The Kilmory Community Fund is to receive more than £41.000 from the Executive's Rural Community Transport Initiative to replace an existing community bus which is now more than 10 years old.

The 1996 yellow Ford Transit has served the southern end of the Island well but is becoming too expensive to maintain.

The newly announced Rural Community Transport Initiative funding will be phased over three years with £2,087 being released in 2006/07, £3,920 in 2007/08, with the remaining £5,175 being made available in 2008/09. Transport Minister Tavish Scott said: 'This devolved government is committed to improving transport links for people living in areas where they are limited.

'Already community minibuses, dial-a-bus services and car sharing schemes are making a real difference for people living in Scotland's rural and remote areas.

'This latest funding for areas of North Ayrshire will help bridge the transport gap for groups such as the elderly and the disabled.'

Kilmory villagers have been busy fundraising for their new bus with a £100 sweepstake on the island and the group recently took part in a bagpacking session at Marks and Spencer's Braehead store when one generous customer donated the £100 note which became the sweepstake prize.

In the Ladies Final, the match between former champions Carol Arthur and Fiona Crawford also went to the last green where Fiona emerged victorious and clinch her fourth title.



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### Seal of approval to postcard talk

A TALK entitled Arran Postcards was the subject of a fascinating talk to members of Arran Antiquarians and several visitors by Stewart Gough of Brodick on Monday June 19.

Stewart talked about being given a book of postcards in 1980, which led to his wanting to collect mail with the franking of all of the island's post offices.

These were often on postcards and this progressed to his interest in Arran's postal history and the start of his collection which now totals 4000.

Ten years ago he joined Strathclyde Postcard Club of which he is now secretary.

He told the assembled that the first postcards were issued in 1870 and in 1899 became a standard size with the address on one side and the message on the other.

In 1902 the back was split for both the address and message, with a picture on the front. this was the gold age of postcards. Many people communicated by postcards, the card frequently being delivered the next morning.

One of Stewart's prize possessions is a card from 1920 signed by the Duke of Montrose. His collection is in topographical albums although he does collect modern cards as well but he believes they are not so interesting as they only show landscapes and seascapes.

Stewart's enthusiasm and good humour was evident from the beginning of his illustrated talk and he allowed us the privilege of seeing his collection afterwards. Altogether a splendid talk and all too quickly over.

The next meeting will be on July 17 when Peter Aitcheson of Lochwinnoch will talk about Revolution! The Extraordinary First World War Adventures of Charles Mackinnon Hendry of Brodick. The meeting will be at 2pm in Brodick hall. All welcome.

## Island beaches on SNH survey list

ARRAN'S loveliest beaches are now included in an environmental survey which has now been launched on the worldwide web.

The survey, by Scottish Natural Heritage (SNH), is one of the most comprehensive of the nation's beaches ever undertaken.

Details of the 647 sandy beaches noted in the survey include the particle size of sand to sand dunes and other features.

Reports for the survey conclude that beaches in the north, south and west of Scotland all showed a high proportion of erosion.

Among Arran's best beaches are Blackwaterfoot and Kildonan. They form part of important tourism research, says SNH advisory

### First Responders play their part

North Arran First Responders has been up and running very successfully for three years now, giving valuable service and support not only to the north end of Arran, but, on occasion, much farther afield on the island when called upon.

However, through natural wastage, people leaving the area, injury etc the original magnificent dozen has been reduced to nine.

With two responders on duty 24 hours a day, and allowing for holidays, the commitment has been severely increased.

Fortunately the group have had a number of volunteers awaiting training and on the first weekend in May a paramedic/training officer came over to the island and conducted a training course for the new volunteers in tandem with a refresher course for the existing responders.

Having completed the final written examination all responders are now awaiting the arrival of two invigilators for the practical examinations, which are expected to be conducted within the next few weeks.

Once having cleared that hurdle the new responders will become operational as soon as the appropriate paperwork is complete.

The course was held with the generous co-operation of the Field Study Centre, who provided the venue.

'They were originally written to help assess suitability of Scotland's beaches for tourism, but they have become the definitive comparative study of our beaches that are extremely valuable in their own right.

'They will be of interest to people who want to find out a bit more about their favourite beach or the number and types of beaches in their area."

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Walking up the Auchrannie Road the other day, I was surprised at just how built up it has become. Unsurprisingly with so many new dwellings it has also become very busy. Two of us, plus dog, spent much of the time hard-pressed against the hedges to allow vehicles to pass. More often it was to allow two vehicles to pass each other, for this track, which has recently gained a proper road sign at the bottom, has no regular passing places, but rather occasional widenings which permit drivers, after much manoevering and reversing, to get up and down.

At the top one comes to the entrance to the new houses. It may well be that the access road is at the other side. One would hope so, for to gain access from Auchrannie Road would merely put further strain on it.

Wherever one goes these days there are problems of movement, from traffic jams, to diverted ferries, to airport delays, to shortage of parking spaces and there isn't a lot of point in huffing and puffing about it. Indeed, it's all part of life's rich tapestry. But when it comes to new developments there is a whole army of planners to ensure that whatever is approved will not unnecessarily increase inconvenience, or danger, and that it does meet minimal standards of safety. These planners have a host of rules about where properties might and might not be built, to putting in finished access roads before completion, to the types of materials used, to lines of sight for approaching traffic.

There also appear to be rather a large number of items about which they will not express an opinion, things which are ostentatiously dismissed as not being planning matters. However, all the unseemly crush in Auchrannie Road looks to my untrained eye as if it comes well within what are planning matters. For many people getting something passed by planning is quite a challenge. I know a couple at the southend who have been refused permission to build a house for their own occupancy, on their own land, and almost out of sight of the road. Had it been within a village envelope, or had they been able to convince the planners that they were agricultural workers, as many do, it might have been permitted. On Arran for almost 30 years and now at retirement age, yet unable to afford an existing house - whose

prices are being forced up by building limitations they have had to leave the Island.

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## Arran schools rise to jewellery challenge

All schools on Arran have had the chance to work with professional jewellery maker Suilven Plazalska this year as part of the Elements of Change residency project.

Suilven has spent one day a week with pupils creating exciting and unique pieces of jewellery. The work produced by Brodick, Corrie, Pirnmill, Shiskine, Kilmory, Whiting Bay and Lamlash Primaries and Arran High School will be exhibited at The Burnside Gallery alongside Suilven's work.

Each school was given a different design brief, tailored to the class age range and size, to increase confidence, encourage expression and develop skills in an enjoyable way.

All the pupils went through the same design and making processes and techniques over the seven-week blocks.

Suilven said: 'I wanted to challenge preconceived ideas about

craft but also provide staff, whom I encouraged to take a hands-on approach, with skills and strategies to facilitate projects once the residency is complete.

'I hope the young people will have a greater understanding of jewellery and perhaps consider a career in art, craft or design.

Hazel Townsend of Develop Craft Ayrshire said: 'The work produced by the schools is outstanding.

#### Island farmers invited to environment conference

Farmers and crofters on Arran are being encouraged to attend a European environment conference being held on the island of Uist in the Outer Hebrides.

The machairs, or shoreline grazing land similar to that found around the coast of Arran, of the Uists are the venue for a major two-day conference focusing on the role of agriculture in the management of environmentally significant areas. The Uist machairs are designated under European legislation designed to protect habitats and species of international importance and the event will discuss how current policies are influencing the management of these important sites.

Ena MacDonald, a well-known North Uist livestock breeder and one of the conference organisers told *The Banner*: 'It is particularly relevant that this European conference is being held now when decisions are being made on how rural development funding is spent over the next six years.

'Mechanisms such as support for Less Favoured Areas and agrienvironment assistance are a crucial part of ensuring that High Nature Value farming systems are viable in the Uists. The machairs are important largely because of the way that they are managed by crofters and we need to ensure that rural development funding is welltargeted to help crofters continue to manage these important sites in the best way for their conservation.

'High Nature Value farming is now firmly on the European agenda and we will be looking at ways in which policies can help ensure that these farming systems are sustainable into the future.'

The conference, jointly organised by the Scottish Crofting Foundation and the European Forum for Nature Conservation and Pastoralism brings together crofters, farmers, policy makers and conservationists from Scotland, Ireland and Spain.

#### Breeze decides Middleton Cup

It's an ill wind that blows nobody any good, so the saying goes, and it was certainly the case with Arran Yacht Club's Middleton Cup race round Holy Isle on Saturday. Seven boats set out in a light but

steady breeze towards the Hamilton rock buoy. Malcolm Kerr, with a brand new set of sails, decided that the direct route was the best and tacked out directly towards the buoy. Angus Campbell, Gavin Fulton, Iain Hunter, Davy Boyle and Gus MacLeod all decided to hug the Clauchland shore as the wind started to fail.

Meanwhile the young ones, Neil Hunter and Scott Curie, followed in Malcolm's wake. First round the buoy was Malcolm and as there was virtually no wind he headed off into mid channel, followed later by most of the others, who thought they were leaving Hamilton Rock close to port rather than the buoy to starboard. Gus changed his mind halfway up the bay and followed Malcolm's lead but, on rounding the buoy, headed off towards Holy Isle to catch the tide running up the shore.

After a desperate struggle to find wind Malcolm re-entered Lamlash Bay at Kings Cross nearly two hours after starting with a substantial lead over the rest. Neil and Scott, having made it to the Hamilton Rock buoy. could see the becalmed fleet in mid channel; decided discretion was the better part of valour and accepted a tow home from Neil's mum Sally.

Malcolm was well down Lamlash Bay when the rest of the fleet, led by Gavin in his new white GP14, appeared some 20 minutes behind him and started the run down to the finish. Then the breeze started to become patchy, leaving areas of mirrorcalm sea between them and the finishing line. Malcolm maintained his lead and eventually, over an hour-and-a-half after coming round the corner at Kings Cross, drifted across the line.

Now comes the sting in the tail and the reason for the saying.

As he crossed the line a breeze sprang up and the following boats all accelerated and wiped out Malcolm's substantial lead so that when handicaps were applied Gavin Fulton was the winner, followed by Angus Campbell.

> She competed in the colours of her mainland club Centrat AC, which is based in Stirling, where she is at university.


> Back in Arran for the summer, Jennifer will be competing in local races, including Brodick Highland Games, and other track events on the mainland.


