Dedicated Brodick parking spaces to be repainted – at last

Pier hope for disabled drivers

Caledonian MacBrayne is finally to repaint the disabled parking spaces at Brodick Pier because of having to park elsewhere. – a year after first promising to do so.

It follows renewed complaints from Arran residents.

Last December disabled drivers appealed to the ferry operator to freshen the paint markparking there.

The yellow paint marking the spaces in the short-term car park has been gradually wearing away for more than a year and there is no way to tell that they are allocated places.

In the meantime, drivers who are not registered disabled keep using the spaces.

A CalMac spokesman said: 'Remedial work to eliminate the potholes has been carried out at a cost to CalMac in excess of £6,000 and the next stage is to re-mark the disabled parking bays which will be carried out – again at our expense – whenever the lining vehicle comes back onto the island.

Rob Blythe, from Shiskine, who has a blue badge on his car windscreen enabling him to park in the disabled spaces, said that despite bringing this to the attention of the ferry operator more than a year ago, he still struggles to park there.

'I can't believe that after a whole year Cal-Mac still has not done anything about this,' he said. 'As a registered disabled driver, time and again I am unable to park in the spaces abandoned their cars. I have asked CalMac, be aware that options are limited.' > Since Caledonian MacBrayne owns the ground, police do not have the jurisdiction to move unauthorised vehicles along.

> However, the CalMac spokesman said discussions were underway with NAC about the council adopting the land and therefore being able to enforce parking regulations on it.

> 'These are linked to the redevelopment plans for the site which we understand are progressing,' he said. 'We share everyone's frustration that this is proving a more lengthy process than we would all like, but would like to assure everyone that we are doing what we can to move forward.

> He added that CalMac is aware of the difficulties facing disabled motorists. 'While this work is underway we are keen to do what we can to minimise the inconvenience to them,' he said. We would ask non-disabled people to respect the spaces and needs of disabled drivers, and ask for everyone's continuing patience while this is resolved.

Curries descended from Gaelic hero

links to the Curries of Arran has traced the family tree back more than 800 years to one of the greatest names in Gaelic literature.

Harry Currie was born in Canada but after serving in Britain during the Second World War he became fascinated with his family history.

Harry's great-grandfather, Ronald Currie, emigrated from Arran to Canada in 1849, and he and his wife Margaret Mc-Curdy, also from Arran, had 12 children.

After establishing links with the family of James Currie at Drumadoon Farm, Blackwaterfoot, in the late 1940s, Harry has traced the family tree back to one of the greatest ancient Irish poets.

He said: 'There is no doubt that the name Currie evolved from the Gaelic name MacMhurrigh and that the person the more than 800 years ago was Muireadhach Albanach.

Born in Ireland around 1180, Muireadhach Albanach is considered to be one of the greatest names in Gaelic literature.

In the Book of Arran it states that after the Battle of Largs in 1263, the King of Norway, who was the patron and ally of the Lord of the Isles, granted the island to one named Murdach.

'Tradition' 'Exactly how long Muireadhach remained in Scotland is uncertain,' said Harry. 'That he married and had children in Scotland is a certainty. How many children he had is unknown, and the probability is great that his children spread across the Western Isles of Scotland, some continuing the family tradition of poet/bard.'

According to Harry, the anglicised Murdach is without a doubt a version of Murach progenitor of the Curries of Arran.

Harry explains: 'The change from the Gaelic MacMhurrich to MacCurrie and Currie on Arran happened around 1700. My own direct unbroken family line back to Arran in 1680 lists our name as MacMhurrich in that year.'

In 1981 the Canadian designed a special tartan called

A Canadian man with direct Gaelic name was derived from or Muireadhach, so he is the Currie of Arran, a tartan for everyone of the name to wear if they so wished.

'I like to feel I have carried on the tradition of warrior/poet/ bard of our distant ancestor Muireadhach Albanach, and I will always love Arran. It is my spiritual home,' he said.

BT finally gets southend internet message

Residents in the southern end of Arran were left with no internet connection for more than a week after British Telecom refused to believe there was a fault.

More than 20 people in Sliddery and Kilmory including the village hall, post office and Torylinn Creamery were affected.

Jean Fitzpatrick from Sliddery said that her broadband connection failed early last week and despite reporting the fault to BT they repeatedly told her there was no problem.

'I must have phoned them a dozen times,' said Jean. 'Every time you phone you get straight through to a call centre in India. They kept telling me that there was no fault. It was like they didn't believe me.'

A spokesman from British Telecom said: 'I believe customer


service was restored on Friday. One of our engineers lives there and was affected also, but his is back up and running.

'This was a complex fault, which initially when remotely tested gave our technicians the indication that there was no problem. We had specialists on the island investigating the difficulty. Ultimately the fault wasn't traced to Sliddery telephone exchange, but one of our main exchanges in Glasgow, which feeds broadband to the island. This required a reset of the electronics and a new component. We apologise to our customers for any inconvenience caused.'

There's hope yet for Valdete

Three weeks ago a young woman from Albania was brought to Arran by a couple from Whiting Bay who hoped that a life changing operation would enable her to walk again.

While here specialist orthopedic surgeons told Valdete Gjonpalaj that surgery would be too invasive and that they were unable to give her the treatment she had hoped for.

Valdete is now back in Albania and will return to Arran early next year.

She is very positive and is determined to walk even if it is with a walking frame. We were given an exercise programme to follow by our physiotherapist here and she will make enquiries about sending Valdete to a specialist physiotherapy department on her return to the UK. She may also be able to be fitted with special shoes to help give her support.

We had a busy couple of days in Albania. First, we went to see Dr Qemali who did the initial scan and X-rays for us in Tirana. He translated a letter from the surgeon here for Valdete's' parents and told us about places to try and find a good physiotherapist.

I couldn't begin to describe the two hospitals we visited but I think our prisons are probably much more comfortable and inviting than these two places. The third place was much better, a private hospital financed partly with government aid and the Catholic Church.

Here, we met an Albanian physiotherapist who had spent seventeen years in Italy gaining experience to bring back to help his own country. This is the only centre like this in Albania and it just opened that day.

The Albanian minister of Health and the Vice President were there for the opening ceremony and asked Valdete to have her photograph taken with them because they thought she had a lovely smile.

They now have their first properly trained staff from Tirana University and they have all been to Italy for clinical experience.

She was assessed and began her rehabilitation programme the very next day. They will see her three times a week at a cost of ten Euros per hourly session.

I'm sure it is less than we would pay here but for Albanians it is a lot of money.

The next day we spent looking at what is needed in her home to help her become more independent and make life

Pensions and Divorce

The number of divorces granted in the UK has seen a steady increase over the decades, peaking in 2004 at 168,000, the highest recorded since 1981. Happily, since 2004, there has been a slight fall of around 2.6% although it is still a fairly alarming figure. Earmarking

Effectively a form of deferred maintenance payment.

Pension sharing


Available as an option within the financial settlement on divorce (must be post December 2000).

All of the above carry their own advantages and disadvantages and advice should be sought from a suitably experienced lawyer, and perhaps more especially an experienced pensions professional, who will substantially compliment the advice you choose to take from a family lawyer.

In conclusion, satisfy yourself all the options are clearly explained to you prior to making any final decision as once you have done this it may not be reconsidered at a future date.

astonishing to our eyes. On a boat trip on the Ganges we saw the Indians washing and worshipping on the banks of their most holy river.

We were then on our way to Bhutan to its only airport at Paro, an hour's drive from the capital of Thimphu.

Between these two places live most of the 700,000 people

of this small country roughly the size of Switzerland. Sandwiched between India and China, Bhutan has never been colonised.

As we arrived an amazing event was taking place in the vast, ancient white-walled palace overlooking the Thimphu valley – the 28 year old bachelor, Oxford educated Jigme Khasar Namgyel Wangchuck was becoming the youngest monarch in the world!


It took a little time for our rather cynical jaundiced Western eyes to realise what an enormous event this was in the lives of the Bhutanese people.

We had gone back in time to a world where people truly loved their King and apparently wished for his supremacy over the newly elected democratic parliament.

Bhutan's enlightened royalty promotes a programme of Gross National Happiness among its subjects which is regularly assessed by officials who try to find out how the people in the country are feeling.

There is a fear now, however, that television, the internet and tourism (though strictly controlled at the moment) may begin to chip away at this stronghold of Buddhist purity.

The group left Bhutan by road, a road that brought about some severe palpitations all the way down from the heights of Bhutan to the plain below and then not quite so far up again

Help put an end to abuse of parking spaces for disabled

In June of this year the Scottish government announced a crackdown on those who abuse the disabled parking badge system.

At first glance it is a relatively simple arrangement. If you have a blue badge that designates you as a disabled driver you can park in certain areas that other motorists cannot.

Apparently Tesco stores around Britain have recently been urging customers to show consideration to disabled customers amid complaints about the abuse of special parking bays.

Tesco also apologised to its customers and is considering bringing in parking attendants to issue tickets to tackle this problem. It is sad that people even here are abusing the use of this concession for less-abled drivers on Arran, and the short-term car park at Brodick Pier is abused in many different ways.

Signs at the pier clearly state that drivers must only use the space to park for a minimum of half an hour, but vehicles are frequently abandoned for days at a time.

The spaces allocated for disabled drivers can barely be seen as the vellow paint has gradually faded away.

To this end, drivers get away with parking there because it is very difficult to see the yellow lines.

The only solution, until these bays are repainted, is for CalMac to police the land. It is outwith the police's jurisdiction, so unless the ferry operator moves drivers along people will keep abusing the scheme.

These spaces are only for those that really need them and to use them for the sake of convenience can have all kinds of complications for those unable to walk the extra distance to the boat.

So if you see someone parking in these spaces that should not please don't ignore it, report them to CalMac which will try to put an end to it.

Arran man living the dream in Peru

Simon Ross-Gill from Brodick has wanted to go to South America since he was a child and now the 22-year-old is living his dream in the Peruvian capital of Lima.

He moved to Peru in August this year after completing a degree in history and politics at the University of Aberdeen.

'I've wanted to go to South America since I was at Arran High School and I've always had a fascination with the politics and culture of the continent,' said Simon. 'I guess this was the reason I studied the Incas at university and why I became so interested in Peruvian history.'

Working for the travel agency 'Peru for Less' based in Lima, Simon spends most days writing content for the website and planning tours to visit the vast Peruvian jungle or famous sites like Machu Picchu.

As Peru is a Spanish speaking country Simon has spent the major part of his first four months learning to speak to the language.

'The best thing about living abroad is learning a foreign language every day,' he said.

Lima is the capital of Peru and also one of the largest cities in the world. Located in the valleys of the Chillón, Rímac and Lurín rivers, the city is sprawled along the Pacific coast

Founded by the Spanish conquistador Francisco Pizarro in 1535, it became the most important city in the Spanish Viceroyalty of Peru.

The country has had a troubled relationship with its Span-

ish conquerors and despite gaining independence in the 1820s many still resent this colonial past.

Today around one-third of the Peruvian population lives in the area.

For Simon the best thing about Lima is the food. Known as the Gastronomical Capital of the Americas, Peruvian cuisine is considered one of the most diverse in the world.

Thanks to its pre-Inca and Inca heritage combined with the Spanish, Basque, African, Japanese, French, Italian and British immigration throughout the 19th century, Peruvian cuisine combines the flavours of four continents.

One of Simon's favourites

is the national dish cerviche, which is a combination of raw seafood marinated in limejuice and chilli.

'I miss so many things from home though,' said Simon. 'Irn Bru, Neighbours, Guinness, tattie scones, the list goes on. I also miss good coffee, Peru exports almost all of it's coffee.'

Simon is planning to spend another six months in Peru before moving onto another South American country.

'I'm going to travel around Peru with money I save from working, and then I want to go to Bolivia and Ecuador too. Eventually I'm going to go to the USA to see my brother. After that, who knows!'

Durability is also important however because if it only lasts five minutes, it is patently a waste of money. Cheap toys are no economy.

The perfect toy educates, amuses and encourages original thought. At Christmas this is especially important because children get bored very quickly. There is after all, only so much that can be done with a doll or a toy car. Look for gifts that give the youngster something to do. For the very young there are toys that hang over the cot and which the baby can touch and move. For the slightly older there are dolls with attached clothes that open in all sorts of ways - with Velcro, buttons, zips and other fasteners. For the yet older there are toys that make noises, books that make noises appropriate to the story within, construction toys, shaped blocks that can build into all sorts of things, and for children even older, the suitable blocks are smaller and more intricate but just as fascinating.

Kits of all sorts are worth considering. These include felt pictures to make, stencils to draw round, printing blocks, modelling clay with moulds and shaping tools, clock making outfits, electrical circuitry, and that old favourite, the paint box.

But children also like clothes, new furnishings for their rooms, their own clock, mobile phone, radio, TV, computer, games console, or cassette player - most of which come in age specific designs.

With an eye to the future, you could give a youngster music in the form of a musical instrument and a series of lessons, your local music shop will

be able to advise. Or, for a really vocal child, singing lessons would help develop that voice. A natural progression from this would be dancing lessons or coaching in some special sport which of course, would call for special clothes and equipment as well.

GIFTS FOR THE NOT SO YOUNG

Buying for the no-so-young is no easier than buying for anyone else, though like the gifts for 'him', they can fall into those boring stereotypes. We buy what we imagine those older than ourselves would prefer. So they get things like slippers (boring ones at that), handkerchiefs (most people use tissues these days), sticky sweets (that get stuck in dentures), cheap booze (that gives indigestion), old-fashioned aftershave (that they never use) and toilet waters that more nearly resemble disinfectant.

Ageing in a healthy person is seldom accompanied by a similar ageing of the mind. Many elderly folk will say they think and feel much as they did in their teens, though their attitudes are coloured by the experience inevitably gathered over the years. It follows therefore, that they probably have similar tastes to their younger relatives. Gifts therefore, should be chosen accordingly, but with due thought given to some of the physical changes that may have taken place.

Give a superb bottle of wine, a delectably aged brandy or whisky with perhaps some beautiful glasses to drink it from. A mouth-watering selection of crystallized fruits and ginger, stem ginger in a beautiful porcelain jar, or a bottle of their favourite fruit deliciously preserved in brandy, could really 'make' their Christmas. Or why not give a hand-raised pork pie; game pie; smoked turkey, salmon or eel; exotic pickles; some traditionally cured ham; smoked kippers straight from Aberdeen, the Isle of Man or Whitby; or a specially commissioned and decorated cake or pudding? A beautiful basket of fruit, a luxury wicker hamper, a dozen half bottles of Champagne, or a casket of handmade chocolates, would add the seal of pleasure on the day. They are all the traditional gifts those with long memories will cherish and enjoy.

Something a little more practical could include a shooting stick, pocket hand

warmer, cashmere scarf, sheepskin gloves or mitts (for the very arthritic). A portable electric fan for warmer days, a photo of the grandchildren in a solid silver frame or a framed pencilsketch portrait of their favourite pet, would all give pleasure throughout the year. Pleasure and comfort would also be provided by a clock that speaks the time or which responds to the human voice. And for the really irascible, there is one on the market that shuts up when you shout at it.

Many elderly people like to read, a set of books by their favourite author would give pleasure, as would a year's subscription to their favourite magazine. For those who like to read but whose eyes are not as good as they were, how about a magnifying book scanner, or large print books? Even better, buy them a CD and player with a set of recordings of their favourite books professionally read. They can then just sit back and listen.
