Chips with everything

£250,000 wood burning boiler will heat Kinloch Hotel

The Kinloch Hotel has taken a major step forward by installing a large-scale renewable energy heating system.

An innovative £250,000 woodchip-burning boiler arrived on Arran on Wednesday and was carefully transported to Blackwaterfoot. The 400kw heating station, looking something like a luxury henhouse, has a boiler room and fuel store with hydraulic roof and comes from Finland.

Duncan Mulholland of Arran Wood Fuels will be supplying about 100 tonnes of woodchips a year from Arran timber to feed the boiler. He said: 'The boiler was transported from Glasgow by road to Tarbert.

'We found that it would not fit onto the Caledonian Isles ramp at Ardrossan so had to arrange for it to come around by road then squeeze onto MV Loch Tarbert. I must thank all the CalMac staff for their help.'

Robert McNeice, project manager at the hotel, said: 'It will replace six existing oil boilers for all space heating, hot water and the swimming pool.

'The heating station will be installed by Highland Wood Energy of Fort William, with the help of local plumber Wil-

liam Bennet. We are keeping the oil boilers as back-up.'

Part of the cost was met by a Scottish Biomass Heat Scheme grant with funding coming from Forestry Commission Scotland and the European Regional Development Fund.

When the ferry arrived at Lochranza on Wednesday the low loader carrying the boiler tried several times unsuccessfully to drive off but kept fouling part of the boat's superstructure.

Crew reversed MV Loch Tarbert out into the bay and turned around. With a lot of difficulty and after several attempts, the driver managed to reverse off the boat and up the ramp. With a police escort he then started the slow journey through Catacol and Pirmill to Blackwaterfoot.

Hotel owner Robbie Crawford said: 'We couldn't have done this without the grant assistance. The new boiler should be up and running by mid January and starting to give us massive savings with a projected six-year payback.'

Gary Kennedy, project manager of Highland Wood Energy, said: 'Its very exciting to have this as our first big scheme on Arran. There are

a couple of other businesses interested to see how it goes. Modern woodchip boilers are fully automated and this one will be remotely monitored by the internet or text message.'

Energy Minister Jim Mather said: 'We have the forestry resource and the skills and there is a huge opportunity for Scottish businesses to use more biomass heating, especially in areas not connected to the gas grid.'

Robert McNeice said: 'The Crawfords have a long tradition of forward thinking and have been ahead of their time including being the first hotel on the island to install central

heating and double glazing. 'Solar panels were installed in the early 1970s along with a heat exchanger to heat what was only the third hotel swimming pool in Scotland.

'By using Arran timber to heat the hotel we will be helping the environment and helping to sustain another island business.'

Coastal group merges with Access Trust

At the extraordinary general meeting of the Arran Coastal Way Support Group in October 2009 it was decided to wind up the activities of this group and merge its interests

with the Arran Access Trust. In accordance with the constitution of the Arran Coastal Way Support Group all money belonging to this group on ceasing activity must be given

to a like-minded organisation. Accordingly, all the funds of the Arran Coastal Way Support Group are being transferred to the Arran Access Trust.

Union concerns at council cuts

North Ayrshire UNISON branch union leaders have reacted with mounting concern to the council's letter to the workforce about proposed job losses to combat budget cuts.

Union chairman Colin Turbett said: 'We know that this council is amongst many who face grave problems as a result

of the banking crisis. While we welcome the emphasis NAC is giving to their duty to address the fact that we have Scotland's worst unemployment, it is also of little comfort to our members to know that they may be added to these figures.

'We are also concerned that they may try and save money

by outsourcing or even privatising essential council services. They need not accept that we will simply roll over and accept all this as we know from experience that putting jobs out of the council results in poorer services for the public and poorer conditions for our members.'

Tourism tax hike could devastate Arran's economy

Owners of furnished holiday properties on Arran will see their tax relief slashed next year, as part of Chancellor Alistair Darling's Budget for the 2009/2010 tax year.

The Government is to abolish Furnished Holiday Let (FHL) relief from April next year, but many are concerned that the decision will have a serious impact on Arran's tourism.

Holiday lets will be treated as a property business similar to buy-to-let portfolios, bringing to an end what was a tax-friendly earner for many island residents, although the original idea was to aid rural communities like Arran.

Local SNP Westminster candidate, Councillor Patricia Gibson, said: 'This change was buried away in the small print of the last budget and could have a devastating effect on many small Arran businesses.

'It's implementation will mean that many people will be unable to let properties, leading to an increase in the number of second homes.

'Holiday lets bring tourists to Arran and spending on other local businesses, creating direct employment and providing an income to property owners. Sadly this hasn't registered with the Treasury.'

On Arran, 206 self-catering properties contribute £3.55 million directly and £4.6 million indirectly to the island economy, providing 80 direct and 110 indirect jobs in island restaurants, attractions, pubs and shops and through maintenance and cleaning work and transport.

While some properties will be sold to islanders, there are concerns that the majority will become second homes and revenue spent in the Arran economy will decline significantly.

Statistically second homeowners spend less on local attractions and facilities than tourists.

Refurbishment for Montrose House

Montrose House in Brodick is to undergo a complete refurbishment in the New Year that will reduce the number of beds from 24 to 13 permanent and six respite.

It has been confirmed by North Ayrshire Council that all the rooms at the residential care home will be upgraded to include a toilet and walk-in shower – but this will only be possible by cutting the total number of rooms.

Bernadette Docherty, corporate director of social services, said: 'Our community care initiatives are aimed at giving vulnerable people more choice to remain at home, while at the same time reducing long stay hospital bed use and introducing thorough assessments to ensure that all services meet the need. As a result this has also changed the direction of our older people's residential units.'

'Montrose House is no exception and in broad terms it now cares for older people with higher dependency needs than when it was built in the 1970s.'

Montrose house was built to accommodate 26 residents but in recent years reduced demand has enabled two rooms to be set aside; one for staff sleeper and one for storage of essential care equipment.

For many years a further two rooms have been designated and registered as respite rooms for older people who would normally be living at home – their use is usually given to carers with planned breaks.

Demand for bed use has fluctuated from as low as 14 permanent residents, to the

present level of 19 residents in long-term beds.

Kenneth Gibson MSP told *The Banner* that a reduction in beds does not necessarily mean reduced staff numbers.

'Although there will be a slight reduction in bed numbers, no consideration of staffing issues has taken place,' said Kenneth. 'This will be subject to an ongoing review and it is expected that, should any reduction in staffing take place, this will be dealt with through redeployment of displaced staff, where possible.'

Hospital will benefit from Christmas fayre

The Isle of Arran Hospital Supporters League held a successful Christmas Fayre last weekend.

A fantastic £820 was raised for the hospital.

Chairman of the league, Maurice Deighton, said: 'I would like to thank everyone who donated home baking and items for the raffle and tombola.'

Arran racing driver and artist sought

Robert and Lindsey Marr of Lamlash have received an unusual request through the post. And it seems to be perfectly genuine.

The airmail letter came from Germany and was addressed to Sir Leslie Marr, Isle of Arran, Firth of Clyde, West Schottland. The writer is Herr Jorg Walther and he says: 'Dear Mister Marr, I have been your fan for a long time I've always been impressed by your success in racing.'

He has enclosed two old photographs apparently showing

Sir Leslie racing in a Formula One Connaught car in the mid 1950s and goes on to ask him to sign the photos and return them in a stamped addressed envelope.

Herr Walther adds: 'I wish you health and also in the future a good relationship to motor racing,' and signs himself 'Your fan, Jorg Walther.'

Robert and Lindsey realised that the request was genuine and did a bit of delving.

Sir Leslie Marr was a racing driver in the 1950s with his best result coming fourth in

the New Zealand Grand Prix. And he did indeed live in Arran latterly.

Perhaps unusually, he was also a successful artist. He was born in 1922 and educated at Shrewsbury School and Cambridge University.

In February 1990 the Banner reported that Leslie Marr, who had dropped the title by then, lived and worked as an artist at his home between Brodick and Corrie and was to be the subject of the Observer Colour Magazine's weekly feature 'A Room of My Own' in March. The articles show the chosen person in their favourite room, and through what the room contains they discuss their life and work. At the time, Mr Marr had a solo exhibition of his paintings in London.

Robert and Lindsey are hanging on to Herr Walther's letter for the time being and ask if anyone knows the present whereabouts of Leslie Marr so that they can forward this request to him. They can be contacted at the Old Pier Tearoom.

Farmers rejoice as SFP cheques arrive early

Arran's farmers woke up to a silver lining after all the black clouds of late when they had their lifeline Single Farm Payment (SFP) paid into their bank accounts last week by the Scottish government.

There was jubilation among many when the government completed its promise to get Single Farm Payments out promptly before Christmas.

December 1 was the first day payments were permitted by European regulations and around 75 percent of claimants will have received payment by the end of the first week of December.

Arran's MSP Kenneth Gibson said: 'This injection of funds into the island's farm businesses is hugely important to the community as it helps to underpin the economic and environmental activity that farming generates.'

However, for some there was also a big black cloud attached as new EU rules on cross-compliance breaches have knocked chunks out of some business's cheques.

For sometime the EU has wanted Scotland to toughen up the one percent SFP penalty

imposed on farmers caught with recording mistakes during livestock inspections.

Last month, it finally forced the issue saying that the level of penalty for non-compliance should be three percent.

So the Scottish government has been obliged to triple its penalties – and apply them retrospectively over 2009, hitting this week's eagerly

awaited payments.

As one affected farmer noted, it was like getting a £60 parking ticket in January, then receiving a demand for £180 in December.

Acknowledging that the penalties had taken the shine off the early SFP payout, the National Farmers Union Scotland pointedly did not blame the Scottish government.

Drivers must slow down

In the past year there have been a great deal of changes to the road system on Arran. Not to the road surface itself you understand, but to the general way in which drivers now navigate the island's highway system.

The island is now littered with road signs and speed warnings to a level that would have been unthinkable 10 years ago.

The first big change was in May when residents in Lamlash, Whiting Bay and Brodick were told traffic-calming measures were to be introduced in specific parts of the villages. This resulted in 'Twenty's plenty' signs being erected in some of the busier residential areas where children were often to be found playing in the street.

There are also flashing lights outside every primary school on Arran to reduce the driver's speed when passing at play times.

This was followed at the beginning of June by an advisory 30mph speed limit put in place between Brodick and Lochranza.

The speed limit was the result of a rigorous campaign to improve road safety for pedestrians and cyclists after two fatal accidents on that stretch in the past five years.

Just two weeks later the island got its first double-yellow lines in Brodick which are now policed twice a month by a visiting traffic warden.

In the past two weeks seven speed warning signs have appeared, this time on the hill as you drive into Lamlash from Brodick. The seventh sign will have an electronic feedback showing the actual speed of your vehicle. The first of their kind on Arran, they are designed to improve road safety.

This week in the national news it has been reported that local councils will be encouraged by the government to introduce 20mph speed limits in all residential areas.

Ministers also want councils to consider cutting the 60mph speed limit on the most accident-prone single-carriageway A and B roads - possibly to 50mph.

Until now, local authorities have only been able to bring in 20mph limits on roads requiring traffic-calming measures such as speed humps.

A report by a London University showed that the introduction of 20mph speed zones in London had reduced road injuries by more than 40 per cent over the period 1986 to 2006.

The government says more ambitious targets are needed for reducing deaths.

Tragically five people have died on Arran's roads in the past five years and as a result road safety measures have been stepped up several gears.

However, one cannot help but ask the question - have these traffic-calming measures really made a difference on Arran?

It remains to be seen whether they can force local drivers to slow down and be more aware that speed actually does kill.

Hospital setback frustration

Dear Madam,
It was with great concern and dissatisfaction that we learned through our local newspaper that a new hospital for Arran would be at least 10 years away.

In 2002 the community of Arran took part in NHS Ayrshire and Arran Property Strategy.

The people taking part were both professionals from the health service and laymen.

They all gave of their time in a serious effort to further identify the need for a new hospital on Arran - a need that had been first identified as far back as 1982.

Throughout the process, which took several months, it was decided that the 'Hub and Spoke' design would be best suited to Arran - the Hub being a new hospital and the spokes being the doctor's surgeries.

Through necessity and for various other reasons it was eventually decided by Ayrshire and Arran NHS to fast track two new doctors surgeries, but, as we understood it, it was essential that a new hospital also be built in the near future for the plan to work.

It was also the understanding that the building of the new surgeries would not be detrimental to the building of a new hospital.

It is therefore very disturbing to hear that because of the new surgeries the hospital has again been put on hold.

At every meeting with Ayrshire and Arran Health Trust officers from the chairman down we have emphasised the need for a new hospital and have been led to believe

that Arran is on the list.

Therefore you can understand our anger and frustration at this announcement in the press.

At any meetings we attend Arran is held up as an example of what can be done.

The health care we get on Arran is second to none but that is only because of the dedication of the professionals and staff employed, especially at the hospital.

They carry out their duties in a truly professional manner against all the odds of working in a building that is well past its best and definitely not suited to 21st century medicine.

This decision is not only letting down the people of Arran but must be most demoralising for your staff at the hospital and to the general practitioners who also happen to be the hospital doctors.

Having a copy of your prioritisation process I find it very hard to find any area in which Arran would not score heavily in your Weighting Process and would be very interested to see how it related to other proposed developments.




