Big ideas for former RAF base

Company looking at buying former
RAF base at Machrihanish

A COMPANY is considering buying the former RAF base at Machrihanish to help regenerate the area and create hundreds of job opportunities.

Military Asset Management (MAM) Limited buys redundant bases and redevelopments them, not primarily in their ongoing operation and running.

The company has already purchased Saxa Vord in Shetland and Buchan Base in Peterhead.

The former RAF base at Buchan was bought by the company less than six months ago but already it has seen significant changes and the area's gates have been opened once again to a new village of commercial enterprise and community spirit.

In Saxa Vord a distillery has been built and plans are underway to alter the main building complex into good quality accommodation.

Mark Abbs of MAM Ltd said: 'We're in discussion with Defence Estates and we've shown an interest in the base,' he said.

'I'd be lying if I said we didn't have any ideas for Machrihanish but of those we'll probably only go with three. Some of these ideas are compatible and some aren't so we have to come up with a formula that works for Machrihanish.'

Mr Abbs was keen to stress, however, that, if the sale goes ahead, the airport will remain.

'We'd want to keep the airfield open,' he said. 'Things established here are

here for a good reason and we want to maximise that.

'Tourism is a significant business in this area and we would be a fool if we weren't to try and expand on that.'

MAM Ltd is currently in talks with the Ministry of Defence regarding the former base and talks have already taken place between the company and the developers of the proposed new golf course at Machrihanish, Brightside Leisure Development Ltd with a view to including the golf course in its plans.

Mr Abbs also stressed that the company is not looking for grants or funding of any kind. 'We would rather funding went to businesses wanting to develop on the site,' he said.

Lightening sets old house ablaze

LIGHTENING struck the old Shipyard House in Low Askomil, Campbeltown, in the early hours of Wednesday morning, igniting a huge fire.

Fire crews from Campbeltown were called to the scene at around 1.30am to extinguish the blaze and

stayed at the house for several hours to ensure the fire was completely out.

The house, which has been unoccupied for several years, had its roof burnt off and all that remains of the building now is a shell.

The area has been declared unsafe and as *The*

Campbeltown Courier went to press a safety fence was to be erected to keep people out. Inspector David Lavery from Campbeltown Police Office is urging members of the public to stay away from this area and not attempt to go near the house.



Number using domestic abuse line rises

A HELPLINE for those caught up in domestic abuse received 154 calls from Argyll and Bute last year. The Scottish Domestic Abuse Helpline received a total of 20,410 calls, a rise of 38 per cent on the previous year. It is run by four permanent staff and supported by a team of more than 60 female volunteers across Scotland. The largest number of calls occurred between December and March, which is when there was a campaign against domestic abuse run by the Scottish Executive. Royal visit to Argyll islands

CROWDS at Port Ellen, Islay, had the chance to meet HM The Queen in a relaxed holiday mood as she boarded the Hebridean Princess on Friday for a summer cruise. The royal charter of the ship classed as one of the most luxurious liners in the world prompted a massive security operation in Oban when the ship arrived back in port the day before, to disembark passengers, revictual and recrew. The police search by officers and sniffer dogs, in an area of the South Pier which was sealed off drew a crowd of interested holiday makers who all wanted to know when the Queen would arrive. They left Oban disappointed because the royal party went on board at Port

Ellen after arriving at Islay Airport. Senior members of the Royal Family joined the Queen for the holiday, which recalls the traditional Hebridean cruise of the days of the *Royal Yacht Britannia*. The Queen, casually dressed in trousers, jacket and headscarf, chatted briefly with the islanders and holidaymakers who gathered before she went on board. On Monday the Queen, Princess Anne and her husband Rear Admiral Tim Laurence visited Achamore Gardens, Gigha, after spending time on one of the beaches at the north of the island. Russell Town at the island's Post Office was asked if he could provide a taxi service for the royal party and owner of the

house Don Dennis suddenly found himself pressed into service as a second taxi driver. 'Russell Town stopped by at noon to ask me if I would be able to be the second taxi,' said Mr Dennis. 'As the Queen wished to see Achamore Gardens again, having last been to see them, with her mother in

1969. After a walk around the gardens, I invited them in to see elements of the house that are believed to be the earliest architectural work of Charles Rennie Mackintosh. Russell and I then drove the party back to the north end where they walked to the beach to board the *Hebridean Princess* again.'

Staff leave White Hart

ONE of Campbeltown's top hotels has lost around 12 members of staff in the last few weeks.

The White Hart Hotel in Campbeltown's Main Street was taken over last year by London and Edinburgh Swallow Group.

Initially the hotel was managed by Donald Brown, an employee of the former owners, Peter and Sarah Stogdale, owners of the hotel for 28 years. Donald had worked in the White Hart Hotel for 10 years and he managed it until October 2005.

Peter Stogdale said that the staff who had left the

hotel had accumulated over 100 years of service between them and he paid tribute to their support and dedication to the hotel, the community and visitors to Campbeltown.

One of the longest serving members of staff who left is Bunty Ferguson who worked at the White Hart for 39 years.

Bunty has worked with four different owners of the White Hart Hotel.

While many staff came and went, Bunty was a constant in the White Hart, greeting customers and remembering their likes and dislikes, and looking after

younger members of staff who were training. 'We felt we were one big happy family in the White Hart,' she said, 'and we were proud to work there.'

One member of staff who did not wish to be named said: 'Company policy was different and the atmosphere had changed.'

Staff said they were told they had 15 minutes to clean a bedroom and they said they were not allowed to sit in the bar with friends when they had finished work. London and Edinburgh Swallow Group were asked to make a statement but declined to comment.

Council increases roads budget

MORE money is to be given to Argyll and Bute Council's area committees to spend on capital projects and roads.

But councillors were in disagreement over whether or not the money should be spent immediately or wait until 2007-08 when a review of the council's corporate plan has been completed.

Argyll and Bute Council was criticised by Audit Scotland, the body which assesses councils' performance in a number of areas including best practice and best value, earlier this year for failing to follow its corporate vision for the area and not following 'best value' principles.

At the council's recent meeting councillor John Tacchi, seconded by councillor Alison Hay, argued that £750,000 that had been freed up after the actual capital ex-

penditure for 2005-2006 was calculated should not be used until the review was complete.

However, leader Councillor Allan Macaskill and deputy leader Councillor Robin Banks felt that £200,000 should be split equally between the four area committees for projects currently on the capital plan and £549,000 split between the four areas for roads and infrastructure. Councillor George Freeman said the council had already been criticised for not following best value and by doing what was suggested by the leader and deputy leader, the council would again not be following best value.

'The amount we are talking about is a pittance for roads,' he added. The main reason for the extra funding is the removal of £499,000 from the

capital plan to realign Feolin ferry terminal on Jura because it was decided after receiving advice from a consultant that the extension would not improve the situation. Head of Strategic Finance Bruce West had recommended to councillors that the money not be allocated anywhere specific until after the review of the corporate plan.

Councillor Allan Macaskill said nearly half the money had come from the sale of assets and was not being 'frittered away' but was being specifically targeted at the area committees' capital plans and that the rest was being put towards roads and infrastructure projects that were 'desperately needed'. Members voted 24 to four to accept Councillor Macaskill's motion.

Hotelier on Sex Offenders Register

A HOTELIER from Kintyre was put on probation for one year at Campbeltown Sheriff Court last week and was placed on the Sex Offenders Register.

Sentence had been deferred on Stuibhard Kerr-Liddle, aged 61, of The Hunting Lodge, Putechan, after he was found guilty at an earlier trial of committing a breach of the peace by making remarks of a sexual nature to a 25-year-old man in December 2001.

It was also found not proven that he had committed a breach of the peace on June 19 last year by making remarks of a grossly indecent nature to a 15-year-old boy. Sentencing Kerr-Liddle last week, Sheriff Leslie said: 'I deferred sentence to research whether or not there were any problems which needed to be addressed within the community. It was clear there was a history of alcohol abuse which you may have now dealt with but may still need require support. There also may be personal issues which you need counselling on.'

Sentence deferred

SENTENCE had been deferred on a young man who admitted committing a breach of the peace in a Machrihanish bar.

At Campbeltown Sheriff Court last week, Aaron Colin Grogan of 21 Bayview, Machrihanish, pled guilty to committing the offence in the

Beachcomber on June 5 last year. The court heard that Grogan, age 24, had been drinking in the bar with his brother when an incident occurred at around 12.45am. Grogan began swearing and was warned about his behaviour. However, he continued to shout and refused to leave the bar so the police were called.

Defence agent Hugh Duncan said the incident was sparked off after Grogan's brother was accused of knocking someone's drink over and as a result his brother sustained various injuries that night, including a broken arm. Sentence was deferred until August 17.

Brandishing a stool

A MAN was fined £200 after he admitted brandishing a bar stool and challenging a pensioner to a fight.

Stuart Robertson, aged 34, of 3B Hillside Road, Campbeltown, pled guilty of committing the breach of the peace in the Kilbrannan Bar, Campbeltown, on January 3 this year. At Campbeltown Sheriff Court last week, depute fiscal David Glancy told the court that Robertson was in the bar in Longrow when he challenged a 67-year-old man to a fight. The man refused so Robertson picked up a stool. The man asked him what his problem was and he replied, 'I'm going to have you.'

Defence agent David Watt said Robertson was still recovering from New Year celebrations and was still under the influence of alcohol.

'When he was told to sit down he did,' said Mr Watt. 'He's not been in trouble for 10 years.'

Pensioner gets penalty points

A PENSIONER from Campbeltown has been given five penalty points and had his licence endorsed after he admitted colliding with stationary cars.

Charles McKinlay McDougall, aged 80, of Northview, Lochpark House, Carradale East, pled guilty to driving without due care and attention, failing to report an accident within 24 hours and failing to stop and give his name and address.

The court heard McDougall was driving on High Askomil in Campbeltown when he knocked the wing mirrors off two vehicles which were parked at the side of the road.

The owners of the vehicles were in their gardens when they heard a bang. The wing mirrors were lying broken on the road and there was a bit from another vehicle.

The piece was taken to Campbeltown Police Office and a local garage said that

someone had been in to buy a replacement mirror. McDougall was approached and admitted it was him.

Sheriff Leslie urged McDougall to consider whether or not he should continue driving and also fined him £150.

Five points

A MAN was given five penalty points last week when he pled guilty to driving without due care and attention.

Stuart McKenzie, aged 21, of 3F High Street, Campbeltown, admitted committing the offence on April 28 this year.

Depute fiscal David Glancy said at around 7.10pm police officers were sitting at the pier head in Campbeltown when they saw McKenzie driving a red car along Kinloch Road and going onto the roundabout without stopping at the give way signs. It went round the roundabout without indicating and at speed.

Police followed the car up Main Street and as they got closer they noticed the engine was being revved excessively. He was pulled over.

Defending himself, McKenzie said nothing in his defence and was also fined £140.

Embezzling from bank

SENTENCE has been deferred for four weeks on a man who admitted embezzling £7,000 from The Royal Bank of Scotland in Campbeltown.

Douglas McLatchie, aged 50, of Flat 12, 299 Clarkston Road, Glasgow, admitted committing the offence between May 1 2005 and August 1 2003.

Sentence was previously deferred for the sale of McLatchie's home to go ahead and has been further deferred until August 17 for reports.

Teenager bites officer

A TEENAGE girl from Campbeltown was placed on probation for 18 months after she admitted biting a police officer on the body.

Jean Elizabeth Townsley, aged 19, of Flat 6, Dalintober House, North Shore Street, also admitted committing a breach of the peace, threatening to bite two female officers on the body and assaulting one of them.

Depute fiscal David Glancy told the court that at around 11.40pm on February 18 this year, police received a call from a 40-year-old woman to say someone was outside her home in North Shore Street, shouting at her.

When officers arrived they saw Townsley walking away. They approached her and she became aggressive. She was warned about her behaviour

and as one of the male officers attempted to arrest her, she bit him and another officer had to prise her jaws apart. At Campbeltown Police Office Townsley threatened to bite two female officers before assaulting one of them. Defence agent Christian Kane said Townsley was a first offender and her recollection of events is vague.

'It was completely out of character for her,' he said.

Man drives into fence

A MAN who drove into a fence was given five penalty points and fined a total of £360.

Gary Shields, aged 21, of 17 Princes Street, Campbeltown, admitted driving without due care and attention on September 10 last year and failing to give his name and address after the incident had occurred.

The court heard Shields was driving in Hutcheon Road when his vehicle collided with a fence at Woodlands Resource Centre. Shields left the scene but was traced by police after a piece of debris from the vehicle was found. Shields was also fined £170 and had his licence endorsed with six penalty points after he admitted driving without insurance.

Defence agent Hugh Duncan said Shields was driving in Hutcheon Road when he noticed his boot was open. He stopped to close it but had not put his handbrake on properly and the car rolled back.

With regards to driving without insurance, Mr Duncan said there was a mix up with Shield's providers.

Driving without due care and attention

DRIVING without due care and attention resulted in a man having his licence endorsed with four penalty points.

Craig Angus Gillies, aged 20, of Ballochgar Farmhouse, Campbeltown, was also fined £180 when he admitted committing the offence on September 16 last year. The court heard that traffic police officers were travelling down Longrow in Campbeltown when they saw Gillies accelerate quickly. Police officers followed him and he was cautioned and charged.

Defence agent Whiteford said Gillies turned into the junction at Longrow and as he did so the vehicle in front stopped at the side of the road to use a cash machine. As a result Gillies accelerated past him. 'He accepts his speed was excessive,' said Mr Whiteford.

New legislation came into force on July 3, introducing a risk assessment


scheme for private water supplies along with provision for a grant of up to £800 from the Scottish Executive to improve supplies where needed.

End of the road for Templars Hall?

COMPLAINTS from Campbeltown shopkeepers have led to an enforcement action being taken by Argyll and Bute District Council against the owners of the Templars Hall in Longrow, Campbeltown.

A former church hall, the Templars Hall is used almost daily as a saleroom, without planning permission, and, as a breach of planning control has occurred, the planning committee decided last month to take enforcement action.

A year ago the council followed up shopkeepers' complaints by writing to the solicitors acting for the Grand Templars but no reply was received.

A preliminary notice has been issued seeking information about the owners who will be allowed 30 days to cease retail sales in the hall.

Complaints have escalated recently following the 'Super Sale' held recently in the Victoria Hall, when a local businessman defended the 'beleaguered shopkeepers' of Campbeltown. They face high interest rates, escalating rates' bills and tighter credit, he said, yet they provide employment, donate raffle prizes and pay for advertising space. A spokesman for the District Council said that the owners of the Templars Hall would have the right of appeal against the decision.



Eye to Eye with John Wallace



Starting School

It is incredible how quickly time passes. Just over five years ago my young son David was born. In three weeks time he starts school. No doubt, like all parents with a child starting school, we have a check list of things to do and buy.

My wife has been busy organising his school uniform and all the other essentials of school life. One thing that has always been

a top priority for us has been ensuring David has excellent vision. Let's face it - if a child cannot see clearly to read there is little they will gain from education. If they cannot participate in class they can easily go on to become disruptive. Did you know that well over 50 per cent of adults in prison either are illiterate or have significant difficulty reading?

Many parents don't realise it is possible to accu-

rately examine the eyes of a child who has yet to learn to read and write. Most optometrists enjoy examining children and have all the necessary equipment to perform an accurate assessment of your child's vision. Not all optometrists do enjoy examining children and you should always check before making an appointment.

I regularly examine children from a few months of age. By using a specialised

technique called preferential looking, I can check for a variety of vision problems. Once a child is due to start school they can often recognise letters and have even been known to sit still long enough to check for long sightedness or myopia.

Perhaps the most important aspect of a youngster's vision is being able to see to read. Distance vision is not quite as important as they tend not to sit still in large classes concentrating

on a blackboard. However, excessive close work can lead to myopia (short-sightedness) and all school age children should have a thorough eye examination at least every two years.



THERE'S no denying the current trend for melodic guitar based intelligent rock. Even a quick glance at this year's T In The Park line up will confirm that, and if Argyll's 32 Miles to Breakfast aren't yet rubbing shoulders with The Zutons or Hard-Fi it may only be a matter of time. 32 Miles will be opening Stage 2 at Dunstaffnage Music Festival tonight (Friday July 28) with a set of their own self written material, songs with a poetic depth that still rock out with infectious hook lines and anthemic choruses where the mood takes.

This is a young band, there's no mistaking that, but there are none of the copycat excesses here that

many teenage musicians fall prey to. The secret of the unique 32 Miles to Breakfast sound is a passion for great music, with a range of influences from Paul Simon to Cat Stevens and Coldplay.

Talented

It's a rarity to find such a talented line up so close to home; singer songwriter Alex McMahon and brother William, lead guitar, are both from Ardrishaig and drummer Scott Rolland is also native to Mid Argyll. Bass player and co-writer John Kennedy (the senior member at the age of 21) has returned to Lochgilphead after studying music performance at James Watt college, and also works

with many aspiring young musicians at the Mid Argyll Youth Project.

Like most new bands they have commandeered any available space to write and rehearse, and the hard work and determination is paying off.

32 Miles begin recording a new EP in September which will almost certainly catch the ear of Scotland's music industry in a very short space of time, and hopefully further gigs will follow showing that this is a band with a promising future in these days of pop music with substance.

Tiree Show gets the Kintyre touch

TIREE show had the Kintyre touch last week when three of the area's farming community were asked to judge at the show and were amongst a good contingent of Kintyre folk who went to the island for the event.

Three of the judges were Kintyre men, Duncan Semple, Rory Colville and Duncan MacCallum, Strathnafanaig who judged the crossbred sheep.

Lorne Kennedy's stylish Charolais cross March-born heifer calf, Lady Jane, out of a Limousin/Friesian cross cow and by Carradale Toyboy, was judged the cattle champion.

Reserve cattle and pure bred champion was a seven-year-old Saler cow from Tiree's vet Pat Boyd. The cow was out Foxtrot and by the home-bred bull Drumaglea Cornaigmore.

Standards in the cattle classes were exceptionally high with judge Duncan Semple, Dippen, Carradale, enthusing about the quality of stock shown.

Mr Semple congratulated

the exhibitors on their entries and said it had been a difficult task in placing the final line-ups.

He took a particular time in placing the best bullock calf saying every animal entered displayed genuine quality.

Decisions

After making his decisions, Mr Semple took spectators through his choices highlighting points on confirmation, where the cattle had been marked down and making reference to heads as well as 'immaturity' in a young but very classy calf.

Pure bred sheep judge Rory Colville of Langa, Kilkenzie, also praised the stock's 'tremendous quality' which he said would have graced any show.

Mr Colville judged the young stockman competition for under-18s which he awarded to Colin MacKinnon, Balevullin, praising him for his subtle handling of the sheep he was presenting.

Kintyre milk in 'mix of markets'

THE LATEST round of cuts in milk prices could be the final blow for some farmers.

The decision by Robert Wiseman Dairies' to follow other milk processors in cutting its milk price is being seen as another huge blow across the dairy industry.

The irony for Kintyre is that none of its milk goes to Robert Wiseman yet there is every likelihood that the local dairy industry will see a drop in prices.

All the area's farms are in the First Milk co-operative which acts as broker; while the Kintyre, Bute and Arran milk all goes to its respective creameries, 35 per cent of First Milk produce goes

to Robert Wiseman, making the firm First Milk's biggest customer.

'We're all in the mix of markets together,' said John Smith Jnr of Drumalea Farm.

'The converse of this is that if the price fell for milk for cheese then the dairy farms would also help to bear the cut.'

Cheese market

Elsewhere in the cheese market major producer Dairy Crest has announced price cuts.

Mr Smith added: 'This could be one cut too many for a lot of people.'

At present the price stands at 15 pence per litre.

'That's not a lot when you consider the retail price of cheese and milk,' said Mr Smith. 'There is a genuine need for arbitration.'

A cut of nearly one penny per litre by Wiseman will take effect from August 1 and this move has been criticised within the farming community in light of rising retail prices and also the role of the major supermarkets, at least one of which, Sainsbury's, is currently tendering for its liquid milk business.

The National Farmers Union of Scotland has expressed serious reservations about the role of producer groups which are supposed to represent suppliers interests in negotiations with processors; a role they are struggling to perform.

Vice president Jim McLaren said: 'The producers selling direct to liquid milk dairies are supplying what should be the premium end of the market. Unfortunately their weakness and inability to drive a

fair price from this market is undermining the entire industry.

'They are doing nothing to drive the dairy industry forward and are making a mockery of the suggestion of a genuine partnership between farmers and processors.'

Price takers

'These groups are simply price-takers at the moment. The tit-for-tat price cuts by the major milk processors are destroying what little confidence is left in the industry.'

If processors want to jeopardise the future of the Scottish dairy industry, while at the same time boosting their own short term profitability, they are going about it the right way.'

'We hear constantly of supermarkets' support for the British dairy industry yet they have created a climate in which supposed market-leaders have to cut the throats of their farmer

suppliers to try and win business. Retailers need to open their eyes, look at the current crisis and give genuine commitment to the supply chain rather than simply pay lip service to a dwindling number of cash-strapped producers.'






