MacLean saw the worst of Campbeltown last week when sick thugs carried out a fire attack on her home but this week she saw the best.

The Courier reported Melanie's plight last week and within hours of the paper going on sale offers of help came

Melanie, 25, her partner and three children aged six and two years old and 15-months were trapped in their top floor flat on Longrow when someone set fire to her children's buggies which had been left on the ground floor of the close.

Both buggies were burned out and completely destroyed. This left the Kintyre Cancer Con-Melanie having to save hard to get a new pram.

'I lived on some of the roughest estates in Manchester and have never

Cargo ship runs aground

A LARGE scale sea rescue was launched after a cargo ship ran aground late Tuesday evening in the Gulf of Corryvreckan.

Clyde Coastguard received a call from the skipper of the Fingal and its owner at approximately 9.30pm on Tuesday, stating the vessel had gone aground with six people aboard and was taking in water.

Coastguard rescue teams from Jura and Crinan were sent to the area, as were RNLI lifeboats from Oban and Islay and a Royal Navy Rescue helicopter from HMS Gannet.

The Fingal was stabilised and escorted into Oban.

The Fingal was also involved in another incident when she ran aground on rocks off Kintyre in September, when it was feared that 1,400 tonnes of timber, fuel and oil would end up in the sea.

A Marine Coastguard Agency spokesman said there has been no threat of pollution to the area and all six crew aboard are safe and well, following Tuesday's incident.

With the shops all under cover there are no worries about the weather and motobility supplies wheelchairs for the members who need a chair for the marathon shopping session.

Suitable transport

Over the years the group, which meets on a Tuesday afternoon, has increased and so has the problem of getting suitable transport for them.

Fortunately the Red Cross has two vehicles with a rear lift for those confined to wheelchairs or who cannot manage steps.

The added bonus for the trip organiser is that the drivers have training in first aid, risk assessment and moving and handling people so everyone knows they are in good, capable hands.

Afternoon teas

The group also makes use of Red Cross transport throughout the year, going out for lunches and afternoon teas in the summer.

The ladies say they would not be able to go on these trips if they did not have the suitable transport.

Thousands will benefit from new pontoons

'More than 4,000 visitors to Campbeltown spending money in the town'

THOUSANDS of visitors and locals who use Campbeltown pontoons will benefit from the installation of new ones with additional features.

As well as boasting a new non-slip surface and fenders, the new pontoons will have a separate 'finger' where Kintyre Express and Kintyre Seatours will be based. This will also provide a landing place for passengers from cruise liners and boats.

Scottish Water has made a substantial contribution to the project by way of an ex gratia payment in recognition of difficulties in the past. This payment has been made with the understanding that the money will be used to replace the old pontoons.

Campbeltown Loch Berthing Company Ltd has provided the balance of the cost from its own resources. No grant finance is involved with the

project. This year 1361 visiting boats, as opposed to locally based boats, have used the pontoons usually for overnight stays.

A spokesman for Campbeltown Loch Berthing Company Ltd told The Courier: 'If you take into account the yachts that use the pontoons, with an average figure of three persons per yacht, this would amount to more than 4000 visitors to Campbeltown per annum spending money in the town.'

Removal

The main contractors for the project are Varis Engineering of Forres, who have sub-contracted the removal of the old pontoons and the fitting of the new ones to locally based underwater contractors Fish Dive.

The old pontoons have found a new home with the Sandbarr Cruising Club, River Leven in Balloch.

Jura road repairs make matters worse

WORK to resurface Jura's only main road has left it in a worse condition, according to one island councillor.

Argyll and Bute Council took on an outside contractor in October to use an innovative process to resurface the A846 road using recycled materials.

Senior engineer Stewart Clark said at last week's Mid Argyll, Kintyre and the Islands Area Committee the road surface had suffered from 'an unusual effect we hadn't expected'. He added 'It's a bit disappointing,' and said the contractors would make amends in the spring.

But Councillor Robin Currie responded: 'A bit disappointing is the understatement of the year. It is a complete disaster, to wait until next year to fix a problem we could have done ourselves.

Materials

'People and businesses on Jura use that road every single day, sometimes two or three times a day.'

Mr Clark said that it would not be possible to get materials to the island at this time of the year and defending the decision to try the new technique to solve problems on the island's roads.

Conservation moves ahead, no thanks to the council

the pipeline, the village of Tarbert finally has its conservation area appraisal. The document

AFTER two years in lists the village's heritage assets and prepares the way for a plan to look after them.

> It could unlock valuable funding for restoration and improvements, believes Robert McPhail, who co-ordinated the team of volunteers who put together the report.

> 'We have already used the document in draft form to get funds for Tarbert's regeneration,' he said. Next week, Tarbert and Skipness Community Council will be asked to form three groups to press forward with the appraisal's recommendations.

> But Mr McPhail said the hard work and dedication of the village's volunteers has been frustrated time and again by Argyll and Bute Council's inaction.

> A draft was submitted to the council for their comment and approval in June 2008, but staff changes and other delays meant that the trust had to wait until this autumn to receive a response.

The appraisal is yet to be formally adopted by the council; it is expected to come before a future meeting of Mid Argyll, Kintyre and the Islands Area Committee.

Now those who have put in the work in the village feel they can no longer let the council's timetable hold back improvements in Tarbert's conservation. 'We are simply getting on with it. The council is an irrelevance,' said Mr McPhail, who spent an afternoon desk top publishing the final report himself after officials had taken months to produce it. 'It's now two years since we started this and the whole thing could have been done and wrapped up in six months, but it is typical of what happens with the local authority.'

A council spokeswoman said: 'We have progressed this matter as quickly as we could have, given the department's other commitments and the staff resources available.

A NEW hand-held device is helping stroke patients in Argyll and Bute feel more involved in managing their condi-

Developed by local health professionals, the hand held record pulls together information about treatment, diagnosis and test results and stays with the patient when they are discharged from hospital. Hazel Hamilton, Ar-

gyll and Bute Community Health Partnership's stroke co-ordinator, said the new system encouraged those who had suffered a stroke to take control.

'Some patients feel that they are not involved in the planning of their discharge. The hand held record has been a

perfect opportunity to encourage patients to feel involved and to take control of their condition.

'The views and experiences of the individuals involved in the development of the hand held record should underpin service development to bring about improvements to stroke prac-


The colourful show featured World, Scottish, British, European and Champion of Champion drum majors of the world.

Bad news never rains ... it pours

THE local whisky industry has been left with a nasty hangover – after the mini-budget put 26p onto the price of a bottle of whisky.

Chancellor Kenneth Clarke also stunned rural areas with bad news for motorists – petrol will be pumped up by around 5p a gallon.

Hydo chief warns power cuts

THE chief executive of Hydro- Electric is warning that there will be power cuts if the company is forced to accept th recommendations of Government's electricity prices watchdog.

Mr Roger Young claims the Director Gerneral of Electricity Supply, Professor Stephen Littlechild, has not taken enough account of the costs of refurbishing the ageing power line network in his recommendations.

Prof Littlechild had calculated his proposals would save the average customer about £20 a year. But Mr Young says 'If Littlechild's recommendations go it will hit out plans for refurbishing the wire network.

'A fall in the reliability of the lines means more powers cuts that is something we cannot accept.

'We have to fight the regulator on this - there has got to be a balance between prices and reliability of sevice'.

He said that investors would see Prof Littlechild's proposal return of less that two per cent on the company's distribution business as unattractive and would not put money into Hydro-Electric.
