dredged for the foundations of the new pier and which would have been dumped at sea if agreement had not been reached before the dredger MV Grete Fighter left the site.

Over the weekend she began dredging what has been described as 'good quality sand' and on Monday the firm, with the help of Thomson Construction, began transporting the material along Brodick shorefront to the beach. By Wednesday there was more than 3,100 tonnes of sand stockpiled above the high tide mark on the low green and the dredger still has one or two more loads to dredge - approximately 1,000 tonnes - which will be transported to the storage area over the next few days. This will leave approximately 2,000 tonnes to be excavated and transported towards the end of May which will be used to reinstate the beach in front of The Boathouse and putting

Welcomed

The sand will be fenced off when the transfer is complete to prevent children playing on it. And while the gift is being warmly welcomed it is not enough sand to completely cover the exposed geotextile bags and, as a result, priority will be given to the beach area nearest the village.

George Leslie Ltd director Neil Doherty said: 'George Leslie Ltd are delighted to have assisted the Brodick Improvement Committee in bringing this sensible proposal to fruition and wish them every success with the reinstatement of Brodick Beach. This tangible benefit meets with our objective of making a positive contribution in the communities where we work.'

A spokesman for CMAL, the terminal redevelopment project client, confirmed: 'CMAL is delighted that George Leslie Ltd, North Ayrshire Council, SEPA and Marine Scotland have been able to reach a mutually beneficial agreement with the Brodick Improvements Committee to re-use the dredged material from our site for such an important local project.'

The support and co-operation from the contractor, Thomson Consturction, CMAL, CalMac, SEPA, Marine Scotland, Arran Estates and various groups within North Ayrshire Council working with Ian Small, Kenny Morrison and Murray Boal has ensured that we have a great start to the refurbishment of the beach when the Marine Licence application is finalized.

Action plan

'We anticipate moving the sand on to the beach in early May and will be discussing the action plan further with Marine Scotland over the next few weeks as they consider the licence application.

'Brodick Improvements Committee hopes this work, together with the planned protection work for the Cloy Shore and Fisherman's walk, currently being progressed by North Ayrshire Council, and the anticipated new section of walkway being undertaken by the Coastal Way staff will be welcomed by residents and visitors alike.'

A spokeswoman for North Ayrshire Council said: 'We have been working with Brodick Improvements Committee (BIC) for the last few years to

help them realise their ambitions for Brodick Beach.

'We recognise the great opportunity that the dredged sand provides for BIC and that's why we are delighted that a temporary solution has been reached which will see the dredged sand transferred from Brodick Bay over the coming weeks.

'This temporary solution will allow the sand to be stored on the land for a period of 28 days without the need for planning permission, allowing time for Marine Scotland to make their decision on granting a licence.

'We will continue to work with Marine Scotland to help secure approvals for the transfer of the sand from its temporary location onto the beach.'



The final approval being sought from Marine Scotland is also expected to include the conclusion of their deliberations for the application associated with the installation of the two fishtail groynes to stop erosion at the beach, but these would cost up to £1 million to install.





Communities can be 'eyes and ears' in fight against rogue trader crime

traders and cold callers trying to operate on Arran and throughout North Avrshire.

That's the message from the council's trading standards team as they gear up for a major crackdown on the area's fraudsters.

The drive comes in response to increasing reports of people falling victim to unscrupulous tradesmen, mail and telephone scammers and dodgy dealers. Traditionally the number of incidents of

The game is up for rogue wary of any uninvited visitors. Often rogue traders who arrive at your door unannounced will attempt to use high pressure tactics to get people to sign up for a service or buy their goods.

This includes traders who claim that your home or garden is in need of urgent remedial work, those who charge unreasonable prices or increase the price as the work is undertaken, or those who take your deposit and don't return. Residents should never feel forced into letting someone into their home and should always ask any cold caller to produce a valid identification card. Additionally, you should never sign any paperwork without a witness present.

Working with Police Scotland, the crime busting partnership will be carrying out street patrols to 'catch' bogus workers on the job. The trading standards team is also keen to engage with local community groups and third sector organisations to act as the 'eyes and ears' to detect this sort of crime, while raising awareness within the local community.

Scott McKenzie, protective services manager, said: 'We

would like to reassure people that we are firmly committed to making sure that we protect the public and will target anyone who chooses to flout consumer laws and regulations. We will be working very closely with a number of partner agencies from across the UK to ensure effective compliance.

Chief Inspector Brian Shaw, area commander for North Ayrshire, said: 'We will not tolerate bogus callers and doorstep crime in our communities. It is totally unacceptable to gain the trust of someone only to turn it against them.

This is in advance of Operation Monarda launching next week, the second year of our national campaign aimed at raising awareness of doorstep crime. We look forward to continuing to work in partnership with North Ayrshire Council, and others, in an effort to raise awareness and keep people safe.

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Sands across the water

So there is, at last, sand on Brodick Beach and there is much to celebrate.

The fact that commerce, community and the authorities were able to come together and find a solution – which has seen sand from the seabed at the new ferry terminal across the bay to provide, much needed, sand cover on the once popular beach – has been a remarkable achievement.

Certainly the generosity of George Leslie Ltd to pay for the dredging and transfer of the sand is to be applauded. The company is committed to helping communities where it is working and it has certainly made a grand, and lasting, gesture on Arran.

But perhaps the biggest praise has to be saved for the community, and one organisation stands out by a mile -Brodick Improvements Committee. They have shown over the past days that they simply wouldn't take no for an answer. Their dogged determination to get all the permissions and permits needed to keep the sand in Brodick is testament to the administrative talent they have in their ranks. Other volunteers gave up their own time to help on the ground.

Could this have achieved on the mainland? Probably in the right places, but not, sadly, in the likes of Dumfries and Galloway where dozens of community councils were dissolved this week leaving whole communities without a voice.

Then there are the authorities. For North Ayrshire to waive planning permission for the sand to be stored on the low green, shows it has a real determination to allow this to happen. And it is no state secret that SEPA, and particularly Marine Scotland, are not the easiest of agencies to deal with, but it all came good in the end.

But there is still work to be done. We still need the final go ahead from Marine Scotland to get the sand spread on the beach, which we should have by the end of the month. Then we can all enjoy, with some satisfaction, a new beach for Brodick.

That will be a sight for sore eyes.

I don't think it's the badgers, as there were plenty of badgers around in Arran along with hedgehogs. I used to drive through from Kildonan to Brodick at about 6am and see a few every morning wandering or squashed on the roads. Countryside file says: 'Badgers and hedgehogs have lived in ecological balance for hundreds of thousands of years. It is mankind and modern farming practices in particular that are causing hedgehog numbers to

Neat gardens give no food and slug pellets can poison them - so use beer traps if possible and leave a wild area. An old Arran Voice article suggested it could have been the seal virus, that also wiped out the mink, that could have affected them.

On Arran there is enough wild habitat, so I don't think that is the problem here. I have noticed less earthworms when I dig. Maybe we should be trying to find out the real cause on Arran and what we can do to bring them back? Is there a breeding programme? Has anyone seen a hedgehog in the last five years? Are there any left on Arran? Can we reintroduce them?

If you make a hedgehog size hole on either side of your fence in garden it will allow them to wander. I think we need to study worms and insects and see if that's what is making the bird and hedgehog numbers decline.

Club and attracted around 25 youngsters, who took part in the fun activities.





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
