

The Shore in Whiting Bay has closed its doors for the last time.

Last Saturday was the final day of trading for the coffee shop, takeaway and deli, and it was a sad time for the staff.

Boss Sheena McDonald said it was simply not paying its way.

'The whole island demographic has changed,' she told the Banner. 'There are a lot more day trippers now who are simply not using the facilities on the island.

'A lot of them stay in Brodick and if they do travel round the island they seem to head up north.'

It is three years since a major makeover saw the former Village Shop converted into the takeaway and coffee shop.

Sheena said: 'Initially we tried opening later to serve evening meals but when that didn't work we concentrated on the daytime trade, but there just wasn't the customers to keep us going.

'We've really tried to make it work but despite trying lots and lots of dif-

## Bid to breathe new life into Balmichael

A bid has been made to breathe new life into the Balmichael Visitor Centre near Shiskine.

A planning application has been made for the conversion of existing buildings to form up to nine self-catering accommodation units and install six camping pods with an amenity block and parking.

The application has been made by Steel Stone Holdings Ltd which also bears the name of Callum Ford, who was involved with the previous owner James L Clark.

Balmichael opened as Arran Family Fun Park in spring 2015 but closed in less than two years with the previous owner trying to raffle off the seven-acre estate in a prize draw. Balmichael is still on the market valued at £400,000. The new applicants say Mr Clark is not involved.

In a supporting statement dation on the island has been

with their two planning applications, which are under consideration by North Ayrshire Council planners, the company admits there have been problems.

It states: 'The Balmichael Visitor Centre has provided an outdoor leisure and play facility for many years.

'Over this time, there has been a succession of owners who have each added and changed the facility in an attempt to make it financially viable.

'These attempts have proved unsuccessful and the facility has remained closed for over a year while the current owner has marketed it for sale. It was closed for three years under the previous ownership.

'With the introduction of RET on the ferry service to Arran, there has been a significant increase in the number of visitors and accommo-

working at capacity, especially in the self-catering sector where visitors are finding accommodation difficult to obtain.'

The numerous outbuildings at Balmichael could be readily converted to form self-catering units for holiday lets, said the statement, as well as providing camping pods on an adjacent area of ground.

The pods would blend into the landscape and would be far less obtrusive than the 15-metre high adventure course, it was suggested.

It is anticipated employment would be created for four people.

'The proposal for a change of use to create self-catering holiday accommodation and camping pods will enable Balmichael to become viable again, providing much-needed visitor accommodation on Arran, and preserve the existing buildings,' the statement adds

The food outlet, in the Douglas Centre, which latterly was only operating as a pizzeria, never really got fully off the ground since opening last July and now The Douglas Hotel is to consider other options for the site.

Hotel manager Elaine Campbell said: 'We realised early on that margins were going to be very tight, and felt that we could cut no more corners on our product without affecting it too much, so when poor Corey Allan, who was running the deli, injured his leg during a football game, it just seemed that the time was right.

We feel sad, because we were very proud of our hand-rolled pizzas, they tasted delicious, and maybe these will become part of the Douglas Hotel menu repertoire. Who knows, as we have a new head chef who started with us this week too.

'We do want to thank everyone who bought from us, supported and visited us. We will be looking for a new tenant if anyone would like to rent the unit. We'd be delighted to hear from them. Ideally, for us, a sympathic business, such as a beauty/hair salon or maybe a niche retail unit.'

## New boss takes charge at Brodick Castle

A new boss has been appointed at Brodick Castle and Country Park.

Jared Bowers take up the post in early July. He is the third property manager at The National Trust for Scotland facility in five years.

He currently works as the general manager for Kelburn Castle and estate in Largs and is the ecotourism project manager for an initiative within Loch Lomond and the Trossachs

National Park. Jared has worked in sustainable tourism for more than 14 years. During this time he has held varied positions in tourism management, consultancy and academia, enabling him to live and work in 12 countries

across the globe.

He has worked with a mixture of local and instakeholder ternational groups and specialises in nature-based, cultural-heritage and adventure tourism.

Jared also has a PhD in sustainable tourism in Guyana from Newcastle University and a MSc in Ecotourism, with distinction, from Edinburgh Napier University.

He takes over after a major round of redundancies at the castle which has led to 21 job losses. The castle is presently closed for major fire prevention works and will not reopen until 2019.

Interim property manager Chris Mills will remain at the castle in a new role.

## Late start to full summer service

The MV Isle of Arran started Arran's full summer service on Wednesday after a turbulent start to the season.

The island's second ferry has only been operating part-time on the Arran route for the past month after the breakdown of the MV Clansman saw the Arran timetable and others on the network face disruption as ferry operators CalMac hurried to redistribute ves-

MV Hebrides, which was due to enter dry dock for its annual service, was also delayed and pressed into further service owing to a

shortage of available ves-

sels to service other routes.

sels in the fleet.

Repairs to the MV Clansman – which suffered a breakdown because of a propulsion system failure – was delayed as parts had

to be created by a specialist

firm in Denmark. A tempo-

rary repair has been undertaken but a permanent repair will be needed in June when a new propeller shaft will be fitted.

Normal service on the Ardrossan to Brodick route has now started with a two-boat service which will continue until Monday September 24. The Campbeltown service, also operated by the MV Isle of Arran, has also started a month late.

## Road closures

Residents and drivers using MacKelvie Road and Arranton Place in Lamlash are being warned of closures next week. The affected area will be from the A841 junction to 24 MacKelvie Road, which will be closed from 9.30am to 4.30pm daily, from Monday, May 28 to June 1.

The closure may affect residents and those requiring vehicular access to Lamlash Primary School.







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## Consultation helps shape local plan

Arran residents have been voicing their opinion as part of a region-wide consultation on North Ayrshire Council's future development plans.

At a public meeting at the Ormidale Pavilion on Tuesday, residents, business owners and those with an interest in local development met with strategic planning manager Neale McIlvanney and planning officers Neil McAleer and Joanna Glacken.

Providing information on the proposed Local Development Plan - which sets out how the council will guide development and investment in the area over the next 20 years - the planners provided visitors with details on how their contributions can be lodged to be considered when finalising the document.

Once the consultation period is complete, the proposed plan is passed to Scottish ministers for examination. A reporter is then appointed who pub-

lishes a report of the findings and outlines whether any changes are required.

The proposed Local Development Plan is then

adopted and becomes the legal document consulted when considering planning applications in North Ayr-

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

## Talk-in held for subsea cable

Scottish and Southern Electricity Networks (SSEN) has been gathering information from Arran residents during its two-day consultation on its proposal to replace the existing submarine cable which connects Arran to Carradale.

The drop-in consultation, which took place at the Auchrannie Hotel on Monday and Tuesday this week, saw the SSEN project team laying out the plans and collating opinions, feedback and concerns which will be taken into account prior to

submitting a pre-application consultation report to Marine Scotland.

Demonstrating what its intentions are and how it wishes to implement them, the project team made use of a video presentation, a host of documents and an example of the marine cable that would be used.

Members of the public, including Howard Wood of the Community of Arran Seabed Trust (COAST) visited the consultation to find out more about the plans and to offer his local

knowledge and opinions on the subject.

Island businesses, marine users and visitors have until Thursday July 5 to submit comments to SSEN.

Consultees and members of the public will have a further opportunity to comment on the application as part of Marine Scotland's consultation process.

While no fixed dates for the replacement have been set, a timeline of two to five years for completion of the entire process is envisaged.









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## Arran Brewery flying high with new helipad

Arran Brewery's new helipad was in action for the first time last week with the first visitors for a brewery tour arriving by helicopter.

The brewery has planning permission to build a terminal on the site above Kildonan, which will consist of a passenger lounge and crew room, as well as offering a radio service for arrivals and departures.

Managing director Gerald Michaluk, a helicopter pilot himself, said: 'It is great to see our first visitors arriving by helicopter. We are hopeful more will

follow when it is known we have the facility available. We plan to begin groundworks on the new terminal this summer.'

Once completed, Mr

Michaluk said the brewery hoped to be offering sightseeing tours through its sister company, HJS helicopters, in the future.

He added: 'The regulations regarding flying helicopters over water are quite restricting, but never sav never.'

The brewery is allowing free landings with prior notification and fuel will be available on site after the terminal is complete. Anyone wishing to use the helipad should contact the brewery on 01770 302353 prior to arrival.

Residents enjoyed holistic therapies and massages from Jill McKillop as everyone was entertained



## MP vows to continue ticket tout campaign

Local MP Patricia Gibson has welcomed UK Government moves to clamp down on ticket touts, but says they must go further to protect consumers from being ripped off by unscrupulous secondary ticketing platforms.

New rules that came into effect last month make it an offence for online ticket touts to use computer 'bots' which allow them to purchase tickets from official sellers faster than members of the public. The legislation also requires ticket resellers to provide information such as the face value of the ticket, identity of the original buyer, exact seat location and any restrictions on the ticket user, such as a minimum age.

Mrs Gibson, the SNP spokeswoman for consumer affairs, said: 'For far too long now ordinary fans have been locked out of events, or forced to purchase tickets at hugely inflated prices because ticket touts using software buy up all the tickets.'







## How tomorrow's technology can aid Arran farmers today

Around 30 farmers gathered in Kilmory hall to discuss the future of farming and the latest technological developments that can help them remain competitive and viable in the modern age. The hi-tech talks were organised by technology consultant Andrew Stirling of Larkhill Consul-

Speakers included representatives from Strathclyde University who discussed advances in dairy herd monitoring using smart collars. There was also an interesting talk from CENSIS, a special institute which supports advanced sensing technology development as well as by Broadway Partners, the company behind Arran Broadband. Here is Mr Stirling's report:

Farming stands at a crossroads. It needs to answer questions about how the growing world population can be fed, how the environment can be protected and how it can remain viable as a rural business.

Farmers need to embrace advances in science, adapt to changing market requirements and help sustain the rural society and culture of which they are part-custodians. The extent to which they adopt new data-driven approaches to business is likely to affect their future viability as well as the communities that depend on them. At the same time, farmers must preserve the trust in the quality of their products and safety of their processes, resisting the temptation to sacrifice standards by a narrow focus on lower operating costs.

Digital technology has helped power a new generation of small independent food producers, shops and cafes. The artisan experience offers a personal touch with excellent presentation and fulsome taste which consumers are increasingly prepared to pay a premium for.

Arran's scenic setting, colourful history and focus on growing tourism would appear to give its farmers a headstart along this road.

The island is a good example of a rural area with a long-established farming tradition supporting a number of communities and hosts a wide range of farm types. The varied nature of the terrain poses practical challenges to farming, limiting the efficiencies that can be achieved – especially in arable production. At the same time, the island is benefiting from growth in tourism, which appears to offer excellent scope for business diversification and direct marketing of food products to consumers.

## Revolutionising

The Future of Farming event attracted a strong showing of Arran farmers, to hear industry and academic experts paint a picture of how more effective techniques for gathering and analysing data are revolutionising the farming and food production industry. The speakers also looked at improvements in connectivity and digital skills, as foundations for future farming success.

The event had been organised under an initiative called the Digital Blacksmith, aimed at applying

digital technology to local business and service needs and fostering local development of digital skills.

The core of the presentations were concerned with how data can now be gathered more intensely and analysed to help farmers get the most out of their land and livestock.

Highlights included wearables for animals, robot milking parlours and multi-skilled drones – enabling farm staff to improve efficiency and spot problems before they become serious for the animals' health and expensive to rectify.

Our farmer audience engaged the experts with detailed questions on costs, reliability and practicalities of the new digital tools, particularly for the smaller farms which are prevalent on Arran, and many other parts of Scotland.

Farmers suggested features, such as potential alternative forms of animal tagging, that would be kinder to animals and improve safety.

The recent announcement that Arran's iconic Torylinn Creamery is up for sale has raised questions about the potential for increased future cooperation between creamery with the farms that supply it with milk. With growth in Arran's tourism and strong Scottish government interest in securing a future for the creamery and supporting local farms, there's an opportunity to look at how innovation could yield a sustainable future for the creamery.

## Opportunity

The technology in its current stage is not cheap and tends to appeal more to owners of larger farms, who have more budget and staff flexibility to evaluate the benefits. However, as with previous generations of farm technology, there's an opportunity for smaller units to co-operate – acting effectively as a larger virtu-

Digital technologies have much to offer towards integration of food production, distribution and marketing as Graham's Dairies have so expertly demonstrated.

In summary, Arran's farmers seem interested to be open to learning more about the options that new farming technology could open for them. It seems that there's plenty of scope for applying new digital technologies to enhance farming in this beautiful, tranquil and rugged setting.

A new children's book set on Arran and written by well-known fundraiser Alison Page is due to be published this summer.





## **Arran Community Land Initiative**

Arran Community Land Initiative set up as a Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation in 2013 and bought an 80 acre site of disused farmland for the community to use for the purposes of education, recreation and sport with a grant from the Scottish Land Fund. This acquisition happened after a public consultation using a Community Engagement Officer who found out that the most popular choice of activity for the site was a recreation and gardening space. The site now boasts 12 community allotments, a community garden with orchard, two large polytunnels, an apiary run by the Arran Bee Group, larger crop growing areas, grazing lets for local pony owners, a compass course for teaching map reading skills, an endangered Arran Whitebeam tree plantation and walking paths.

For the past two years, there have been twice-weekly visits by local primary and high schools and North Ayrshire Schools via the Arran Outdoor Education Centre, and the children have helped to start planting up different areas of the site. There are now many users with regular dog walkers, runners, mountain bikers, school and outdoor centre groups, Duke of Edinburgh participants, volunteer gardeners and allotment holders.

The aim for this year is to build on recent successes, in particular, educating children about where their food comes from and healthy eating options. They have a strong team of trustees and gardeners with considerable charity and business acumen who have a passion to further the aims of the project, in particular, providing further horticultural and outdoor skills training for all ages. The proudest achievement of the Arran Community Land Initiative is getting an infrastructure designed and put in place which includes a hub building, composting toilet and polytunnels. Without these, it would have been hard to accommodate year-round learners and visitors to the site.

What started out as a cycling group to encourage healthy outdoor pursuits has blossomed into a burgeoning club which operates from its own incredibly well stocked workshop which has not only offered cycling proficiency lessons to primary schools in the area, but through their mechanic qualification courses, have offered free bicycle MOTs to school children and the public at their open days.

In addition to this, members of the group are given the opportunity to visit cycling camps held throughout the country and the group have also established a public bike repair station at the high school where passing cyclists can use the equipment to perform minor repairs and maintenance on their bicycles.





## Tom is king of the hill

It may have been a glorious day for the Goatfell hill race last Saturday but the temperatures, in the mid-20°Cs, were too hot for the runners.

That did not deter 175 hardy souls to take on the 874m Goat-fell challenge - now organised by the Shettleston Harriers - with only six people unable to finish the gruelling 15.5 km race. But

there was to be no record breaking runs this year.

Arran was well represented by around 16 runners, including a number of first-time participants.

They included Danny Head, who chose to celebrate his 27th birthday by running the race, and Juliette Walsh, who joined her husband Andrew for the first time. Several also sported bright yellow Arran Fell Runners t-shirts.

After a mass start at Ormidale Park the runners headed out the

castle drive and up the tourist path to the top of Goatfell and back which this year, given the fine day, was busy with walkers making another obstacle for the runners to have to avoid.

In first place, with a remarkable time of 1:17:19, was Shettleston Harriers runner Tom Owens, followed, by some distance, by John Yells of Lochaber Athletic Club with a time of 1:22:37, while Lochaber fellow Richard Macleod took third spot with a time of 1:27:43. First female over the

line was Ruth Crewe of Westerlands Cross Country Club, who finished with a time of 1:40:44.

Trophies are also awarded in a local category for the first male and female to cross the line. Taking the honours were Malcolm Wilkinson, who came in first place with a time of 1:44:47, while the first female was Corinna Goeckeritz with a time of 1:55:26.

Race organiser Peter Mackie of the Shettleston Harriers said: 'A great day out was had by all, with special thanks to our helpers from the club, the Arran Mountain Rescue Team, Arran Pipe Band, Brodick Improvements Committee and our friends at Salomon for generously donating some cracking prizes.'

The course record, which had stood for 23 years, was broken by not one but two runners last year, with Murray Strain of Hunters Bog Trotters now holding the record of 1:12:11.
