Big Davy Ballantyne has set himself a new challenge, this time using heavy chains. The man who hauled an anvil up Goatfell - and back down again - is up to his fundraising efforts again.

His wife Annelies Slaats said: 'I take my hat off yet again. What a challenge!'

Davy, who works for North Ayrshire Council, spent 26 days dragging a 120kg anvil up Goatfell two years ago; a feat which raised nearly £17,000 for the JDRF.

Temporary bridge in place

The main Brodick to Lamlash road was due to have been closed again overnight on Thursday to allow the second section of the temporary bridge to be installed.

The first part of the bridge was put in place last Thursday at the landslide between the ferry terminal and Strathwillian which has led to weeks of temporary traffic lights.

The temporary bridge will allow the extensive repairs to the road and original bridge to go ahead over the coming weeks after the landslide caused serious subsidence which damaged the sandstone structure on the banks of the Strathwhillan Burn.

North Ayrshire Council gets n more childcare cas

Arran's MSP Kenneth Gibson has welcomed the SNP government's allocation of just less than £26 million

to North Ayrshire Council as its share of £1,043 million to local authorities across Scotland to sup-

port the expansion in entitlement to 1,140 hours of free childcare per year from August 2020.

This will almost double current provision and triple that inherited by the SNP on coming to office in 2007.

Councils will receive additional annual revenue funding of £567m and capital funding of £476m from this year to 2021-22.

The sums allocated are based on local authority finance estimates submitted in March 2018, uprat-

ed for inflation and agreed between Scottish ministers and local authority leaders.

Mr Gibson said: 'All experts agree that providing fully funded free childcare is essential to giving our children the best start in life, while enabling more women with young children who are keen to work to do so.

'This progressive SNP policy is therefore beneficial to both families and the economy. Indeed, at least 12,000 more jobs will be created across Scotland in the early learning and childcare sector it-

'To fund this policy, I am delighted that the SNP Government has allocated to North Ayrshire Council an additional £14.5m in revenue, to pay the salaries of additional early learning and childcare staff and £11.4m in capital to ensure we have the facilities available for the full rollout of this policy on Arran, North Ayrshire and across Scotland in August 2020.'

were told in a prompt response: 'Wee Davie is now resident in the new control booth for the linkspan which is situated adjacent to the linkspan.


'We may move him to the forward control panel if his fans cannot see him.'

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



premiere of his new film: I walk there every day, but never saw it that way. The second film, collectively titled Shore: How We See The Sea, was shot in Wester Ross by Margaret Salmond. Titled Chladach, it takes a very different look at the coastal community there.

Taking place in collaboration with COAST and Regional Screen Scotland, the launch event last Friday saw the films premiere in the mobile Screen Machine in Brodick. There were also storytelling sessions with Local Voices, the screening of feature documentary Chasing Coral and handson activities encouraging all ages to become citizen marine scientists, exploring rockpools and taking a microscopic look at the sea and its inhabitants.

Ed's film began with conversations with people from across a diverse range of Arran communities – a retired couple, children, a novelist, people from COAST conservationists cleaning a beach and those from much further afield, including a marine biologist, trawlers, creelers and legal professionals with a focus on water rights.

The aim of his video is not to resolve anything, but to provide a trigger to ask further questions and

continue the conversations seen happening on screen, to understand the role and impact of MPAs for those people who live near them and work with them.


Ed seeks to understand the various relationships



Lamlash notspot

I had a letter published in the Banner several years ago on the subject of poor phone coverage in Lamlash. To date, it appears the situation has not changed, despite numerous articles in the press.

A new Scottish government pilot scheme aiming to tackle so-called mobile phone signal 'notspots', was introduced in March, 2016 and included Arran.

I understand from an article in the Scotsman, April 25 2018, that EE are providing coverage in Lamlash as part of a bigger project, a new Emergency Services Network which will be piggybacked on the existing EE (BT) 4G system. The ESN is replacing the existing Airwave radio system used by the Emergency Services in the UK.

There is an article in the website ISPreview.co.uk, dated April 25 2018, which states that EE 4G has gone live in Lamlash, although there is no indication in Shore Road, near the council offices. I assume that 2G/3G is also being provided since not all phones have 4G capability.

This may be good news for users on the EE network, but no comfort to those on the other major phone networks.

Since there is Scottish Government involvement in improving phone coverage, I suggest the local MSPs investigate in order to find out what is the present state of play.

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
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












Viking extravaganza at Lochranza

After a difficult deliberation period the elaborately carved dragon by the McNamara family took the family award while in the children's category Sophie Macfarlane impressed with her masterpiece which was a bulbous mother whale with smaller baby whales swimming around it.

After a short prizegiving ceremony by members of Arran Visual Arts, the tired families who had enjoyed an afternoon of playing in the sun, sea and sand, and filled with food from the burger and hot dog tent, retired back home.





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

Obituary:

John Roberts

Salford on April 2, 1939. When John was only seven years old, his father died – partly from the effects of being gassed while fighting with the 2nd 6th Manchester regiment in the First World War.

This brought about a dramatic change in the family's circumstances and led to his being offered a place at the Royal Masonic School for Boys in Bushey, Hertfordshire, a charitable boarding school for the sons of deceased Freemasons, which he was to attend until he turned 18.

The school was run along the very traditional lines of an English public school with a lot of emphasis on sport and the army cadet

John Roberts was born in corps, neither of which interested John. As he progressed, however, his academic ability, together with his likeability and humour, became increasingly appreciated. His talents, together with hard work, culminated in his being awarded both a State Scholarship and an Exhibition to Keble College, Oxford. While maintaining very mixed feelings about the school as an institution, he made a number of firm friends there who he remained in close touch with throughout his life.

In 1965, John found a place teaching at Glasgow University where he specialised in mediaeval Germanic languages until taking early retirement in 1991. He was very involved in university life, making good friends at the university's staff 'College Club'. He married Diana, who he met through a friend at the university, and had two children - James and Peter.

John's connection to Arran began in the 1970s when he visited the island with his brother and stayed at a cottage in Whiting Bay. Through this link, John and his family became regular visitors before moving to Arran in 1987.

John's faith was important to him. Prior to moving to Arran, he was a regular visitor to the small Episcopalian church in Whiting Bay.

With a small congrega-tion and no permanent priest, the church was and remains heavily reliant on its dedicated congregation and John committed fully to this. He took on the role of Lay Leadership, also representing the church at

regular visitors to St Margaret's, and those who had left the island. Language and linguistics remained key interests. In retirement, he learnt Gaelic to teaching standard and was a committed member of a number of Gaelic groups - most recently as treasurer of Na h-Arrainn-


his love of German - continuing as an oral examiner in A-Level German, and teaching both evening classes and private tutees. John was equally passionate about and committed to his many other inter-

ests. Over the years, he was heavily involved in many community groups on Arran including the Arran Civic Trust, Music Arran, and a local food bank.

Extremely well-read and known for his extensive (often obscure) knowledge, John was crowned the first and only Arran Mastermind by Magnus Magnusson at the 1989 Corrie Capers. He also overcame lifelong stage fright in his 60s, first performing in the Life of Christ at Brodick Castle; later performing at drama festivals both on the island and in Argyll.

John was also a very keen and adventurous cook. He and his sister-in-law developed a tradition of birthday feasts, taking turns to cook a meal on a challenging theme chosen by the other.

Over the years these covered a range of unusual ideas, taking significant planning and research - including Roman, Mongolian, Mediaeval Mesopota-

mian and Filipino menus.

Family was very important to John. He was a close, loving and supportive father to his two sons, James and Peter, delighting in sharing their lives, and was thrilled to have become a grandfather to Adam just over a year ago.

His funeral was held on July 2. The full church reflected the breadth of John's life and the affection in which he was held. A collection raised £450 in aid of ArCaA. John's family would like to express

their thanks to everyone who came to the funeral or sent cards, to Rev Simon Mackenzie for performing the service, to Elizabeth Watson for making the church available and to all who helped at the church.

John is survived by his brother Bill and sister-inlaw Sandie, of Whiting Bay; his sons James and Peter; their partners Marie and Megan; and his grandson Adam.

Quick thinking

A nine-year-old boy is improving in hospital in Glasgow after a youth may have saved his life by giving him the kiss of life. The injured boy had fallen off the roof of the Douglas Hotel in Brodick on Wednesday. Andrew Kirk, who has just left school in Kilmaurs and is working at the Douglas Hotel over the summer, discovered the boy lying on the ground with a huge lump on his head. Seeing another boy on the roof in hysterics, he realised the boy had fallen. Realising that the boy was falling in and out of consciousness he alerted others to raise the alarm and recognising that the boy needed immediate treatment, he decided to act.

Soon the ambulance arrived and the boy was taken to Lamlash where he was airlifted to the Southern General Hospital in Glasgow with serious head injuries. Amazingly the two boys, who were both nine years old had travelled to Arran from Kilmarnock on their own. By Friday the injured boy's condition was improving while the friend was taken charge of by social workers.

Missing visitors

Looking along the front at Brodick this week - one thing is particularly striking - the apparent lack of visitors which has given rise to concerns about this year's tourist season.

Provisional figures from Caledonian MacBrayne make for uncomfortable reading, a 13.6 per cent drop in passenger numbers and a 14.6 per cent drop in vehicle numbers in comparison with figures from July last year. The coach tours operated by Stagecoach, around the island to Brodick Castle and by open top bus, have carried 20 per cent fewer passengers than last year. Alastair Dobson at Arran Dairies reports a 12 per cent fall in sales compared to last year.

Several possible explanations have been offered for the decline in numbers, with everything from increased ferry travel prices to the weather to the price of cheap holidays abroad owing to the strong pound. Whatever the real reasons - many blame the World Cup in France for it - the truth is that the tourist industry rises and falls and that annual figures from the Scottish Tourist Board's annual report shows that the tourist industry is currently on the wane across the whole of Scotland.

Ferry promotion

In an effort to attract further visitors, a local management team made up of skippers, pier manager and chief steward, have come up with a 7-2-7 fare. This will allow people to bring their car to Arran for the day at a reasonable cost. For £45 they can have a return car fare plus two adults plus full breakfast. Being 7-2-7 this has to be on the 7am sailing from Ardrossan and returning on the 7.20pm ferry from Brodick. Broadly it offers a full day out for two plus car plus breakfast for no more than the standard car only fare

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
