# Clauchlands is favoured site in search for new helipad

### 'No final decision will be taken until all potential options have been considered'

A site is being sought for a vital new helipad on Arran needed for medical emergencies.

The previous helipad in Brodick had to be closed to allow construction of the £22.2 million ferry terminal redevelopment. Air ambulance transfers and the new Coastguard search-and-rescue helicopter are presently using Sandbraes Park in Whiting Bay as a temporary landing site.

It had been thought that the helipad may reopen in Brodick once the terminal work was completed next summer. However, this has now been ruled out as the ferries will be too close to the flight path and the helipad in Market Road is in a rundown state.

Now the Scottish Ambulance Service, working with the Coastguard, North Ayrshire Council and Ayrshire and Arran Health Board, are on the search for a new permanent site and they are open to suggestions as to

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# Temporary repairs lead to 135 cancelled ferry sailings

The MV Isle of Arran has had a total of 135 cancelled sailings this summer on the main Arran ferry route, according to official figures supplied by operator Caledonian MacBrayne.

The ferry company revealed the figures this week, after a series of cancellations of the second summer ferry, which show that more than 17 per cent of sailings have been lost. While some are weather related, the mavessel operating with temporary repairs.

The figures were released following last week's row over the on-off decision to off the route to assist on the Islay route, a move that was called off at the 11th hour.

### SNP resign

This is the audited figures suffered technical problems for the routes up until August 8.

For the contract year Isles had just five cancelled sailings due to the weather out of 1.369.

A CalMac spokesman said: 'The current restricted performance of the MV Isle of Arran in certain weathdocumented. A decision was made to continue to deliver a service with restrictions in place, rather than the alternative which was the withdrawal of the vessel for dry docking repair during the height of the summer season.

'A permanent fix to the vessel will be undertaken during her scheduled dry dock maintenance period later in the year.'

### Man jailed for historic sex offences

A 55-year-old Arran man has been jailed after being found guilty of sexually abusing three young girls.


At Kilmarnock Sheriff Court on Monday Duncan Mulholland was sentenced to three and a half years imprisonment and placed on the Sex Offenders' Register.

He had earlier been found guilty after a jury trial of three charges of lewd and libidinous behaviour in his home at Torrylinn Farm, Kilmory and a house in Uplawmoor, Renfrewshire between April 1987 and September 2008.

Defence Advocate Maryam Labaki had asked for leniency for her client, saying he had been assessed as being a low risk of reoffending.









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# Arran pupils produce some excellent results

Arran High School head teacher Barry Smith has praised the efforts of pupils and staff at the school as they once again celebrate a successful year of exemplary results from pupils taking their SQA exams.

With the pupils back at school following their exam results last week, early indications are that the Higher results performance is the best for at least five years.

Mr Smith said: 'Although we do not yet have the official data release from the Scottish Government Insight Benchmarking tool, our own calculations tell us that once again this year the performance of our young people in SQA examinations has been very strong. For the third year in succession we have increased the number of Level 5 (National 5) and Level 6 (Higher) qualifications being attempted by our students, which demonstrates the high aspirations and ambitions we have for the young people of Arran. Whilst there is still room for further improvement in all areas, the quality of qualificain S4, S5 and S6 has improved again this year.


### **Drivers** hit by parking crackdown

A crackdown has seen a big rise in the number of parking tickets being handed out to drivers on Arran.

Police on the island have, in particular, been targeting car parks in Lamlash and Brodick as well as Market Road following public complaints regarding the misuse of spaces by motorhomes and other vehicles. They have been handing out tickets to cars which are badly parked in both car parks and where there are yellow line restrictions.

However, North Ayrshire Council says there has been no change to the parking restrictions which have been in place since 2010.

A council spokesman said: 'Police Scotland have the necessary powers to enforce parking restrictions under the North Ayrshire Council (Off Road Parking Places) (Controlling Regulations) Order, which has been in place since 2010.'

### A parking problem

Parking has become a big issue on the island. Since the introduction of RET fares, the number of cars, motorhomes and other vehicles coming to the island has increased dramatically.

But they all need somewhere to park. There is no doubt a lot of drivers come to Arran and throw the Highway Code and a good deal of common sense out the window when they drive off the ferry. They appear to think the laws of the road somehow don't apply on Arran.

The situation has been compounded in Brodick by the closure of the car park at the ferry to allow construction of the new terminal. This has seen cars using and abusing Market Road as well as other car parks near the ferry terminal never designed for ferry traffic. And it's not just visitors who are causing problems but local residents too.

The Banner also recently highlighted the problems in Lamlash so it is not surprising that the police on Arran have been taking action to try and alleviate the problem. That has upset some people but it is our view that any action that can be taken to make the roads and car parks safer should be applauded.

Every North Ayrshire car park has a list of the restrictions which apply, so there is no excuse for any drivers caught where and when they shouldn't be. But the police can only do so much. It is up to everyone to show some consideration to other road users to make driving on the island a more pleasurable experience.

### Lessons can be learned

After reading your coverage of the proposed redeployment of the MV Isle of Arran to temporarily cover the Islay route, I would like to reinforce our efforts to provide clarity and confirmation of what our plans were during this period.

Having to withdraw the MV Hebridean Isles from the Islay route caused serious capacity issues for the island. We had to work hard to redeploy thousands of passengers booked on the service, no easy task. To manage the situation we took a number of steps including the chartering of a freight vessel to carry cars and moving the MV Finlaggan on to 24-hour operations.

However, we felt there was still going to be serious capacity issues on the route during one of the island's busiest periods of the year, the Islay Show week.

To provide additional cover, plans were started to redeploy the MV Isle of Arran in the event of the MV Hebridean Isles still being out of service during this period. While acknowledging this would cause disruption to the communities of Arran, the island's ferry committee agreed this was a necessary move in the circumstances.

can assure customers that we informed them as soon as a final decision was made to move the MVIsle of Arran. This was announced on the Friday with the vessel due to move to the Islay route on the Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday of the following week.

Bookings were closed earlier than this to allow us to manage traffic and passenger demand, but we could not inform customers that the vessel was definitely

moving because this deci- land we were faced with this time. We could not confirm the decision to move my party heading north. the vessel any sooner than we did.

In the event, repairs to the MV Hebridean Isles were completed and the redeployment of the MV Isle of Arran was not required.

Redeploying vessels is never a easy task. It takes time and planning, sometimes for eventualities that never happen, as in this case. We felt that telling customers the vessel was moving before we had explored all options would add nothing to their ability to base their travel plans on accurate information.

We are continually striving to improve how we communicate with customers. This was a extraordinary set of circumstances that we had to try and manage as best we could within the limited fleet resource we have available. We will, as always, be looking at what lessons can be learned for the future to improve the way we communicate our decisions with customers.

### **Delayed ferries**

Below is a copy of the letter sent to the customer care department at CalMac.

On the evening of Monday August 8 this year I was unfortunate to be on the delayed 6pm sailing from Ardrossan to Brodick.

Before the end of the journey an announcement was made that because the vessel was running late the only public transport available was a bus running to Lamlash and Whiting Bay.

As I and my party all live on the north end of the is-

sion had not been taken at the dilemma of how to get home - and it was not only

There were others trying to cross the island to Shiskine and Blackwaterfoot, people trying to travel beyond Whiting Bay as far as Blackwaterfoot and around the north end of the island again to Blackwater-

I have contacted the bus operator and received a reply stating it is contracted to wait no longer than 31 minutes after the scheduled departure time for a delayed ferry but often would endeavour to get passengers to their destination but on this occasion there were no spare drivers/buses to make this possible.

He further suggested that it was up to yourselves, as the ferry operator, to ensure your ferries sailed to schedule. Invariably ferry delays outwith weather conditions are caused by the volume of traffic during that day's sailings.

You do state quite clearly in all your timetables, vehicle booking confirmation slips and on the web site that all vehicle for convevance should be at the terminal 30 minutes prior to the programmed ferry departure time. There can only be two reasons for a backlog of traffic waiting past the ferries scheduled departure time is that vehicles are arriving too late to be processed or there are not enough personnel on duty at the marshalling area to handle the traffic prior to the vessels scheduled departure time.

Foot passengers must be onboard 10 minutes prior to departure in order that the door can be closed and safety checks and announcements can be carried out. This should also apply to motor vehicles, if they

are not booked in and in the marshalling area 30 minutes prior to departure they should be left behind.

As mentioned earlier it is they who cause the ferry to sail late, not the foot passenger, but it is the foot passenger who suffers because they cannot get to their final destination. The ones causing the delay motor off happily into the setting sun, not caring and oblivious of the chaos left behind.

This did not only happen to the 6pm sailing on Monday but on the same sailing the following Friday, August 12, and I bet there were a lot more people left behind then.

There was another ferry later that evening but I have no feed back as to whether that sailed on time or not.

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





# Work on upland footpaths is

never ending

### **Nature Notes with** JACK IBBOTSON

Hillwalking has increased dramatically since the 1960s and has put great pressure on Scotland's fragile upland habitats.

Imagine how many people must have walked the

it appeared on the 1843-1882 OS map series. All of those steps, combined with the natural effects of climate, can cause severe path erosion. If left unchecked, paths can form gullies, boggy areas and wide braided scars on the landscape. This has the potential to damage rare vegetation and archaeological sites as well as detract from the natural beauty of an area.

Upland paths provide a gateway for people to enjoy Arran's unique and beautiful landscapes. Large numbers of visitors come here each year with the goal of climbing Goatfell or one of the neighbouring mountains. How many would want to visit the uplands with dangerous paths, bog-

main Goatfell path since gy tracks and landscape scale scars? Upland path work preserves one of Arran's main attractions - the spectacular mountain land-

> Footpath work is usually physical and often involves a hefty walk to the site, even before a tool is picked up. Many of the paths are extremely remote and can pose serious logistical and technical challenges. Much of the work is 'pre-emptive' and stops small areas of damage becoming expensive future repairs. Work often involves tasks including repairing braided paths and gullies, constructing waterbars and crossdrains and stone pitching. Sometimes it also involves using winches and even helicopters to move larger boul-

ders and aggregates. Throw continually need maintein a good dose of 'changeable' upland weather and three to four metre landslip you have a pretty difficult job. 


