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Howard heads to US as climate trailblazer

A leading Arran environmentalist is taking part in a major climate change summit in the US.

And one of the ambitious proposals he will be taking to the summit is how to make Arran carbon-neutral in the next few years.

Howard Wood, the co-founder and chairman of the Community of Arran Seabed Trust (COAST), will travel to San Francisco next month to take part in the Global Climate Action Summit as a climate trailblazer.

The 22 climate trailblazers reflect the global nature of the summit, which aims to bring together the best in international climate change activity from across the world. They will humanise the event as they will show through their actions that every day people can do extraordinary things

And Howard aims to show how Arran individuals, businesses and community groups are already doing a great job in tackling climate change with renewable and environmentally friendly projects on the island, not least of which is COAST.

He said: 'There is a tremendous amount of work going on across Arran to improve the environment which I intend to highlight at the conference, some of which I am aware of and some of which I am sure I am not.

Howard will also be taking an island commitment to be carbon neutral in the coming few years to next month's summit, but with-

out a definite timetable. He said: 'We are all agreed it's a target we need to achieve, but before putting a date on it we need to build a full island audit of both energy use and stored carbon in the environment. However, I am confident that with both Scottish government and North Ayr-

Yard bosses to face Arran public

Bosses from the Ferguson Marine yard, where the new Arran ferry is being built, are coming to island next week, the Banner can reveal. They are to face the travelling public and have pledged to reveal all about the progress with the £48.5 million MV Glen Sannox, currently under construction at their Port Glasgow yard.

A public meeting will be held in Brodick Hall on Tuesday August 28 at 6pm and, after an overview of the shipyard, saved four years ago, and a update on the Glen Sannox, there will be question and answer session for which 90 minutes has been set aside.

Facing the audience will be the Ferguson chief executive, Gerry Marshall, and business development manager, John Morgan, and, it is hoped, the yard's chief ships architect, Chris Dunn.

Mr Morgan told the Banner: 'We are very keen to make our visit next week as constructive, informative and helpful as possible.'

Last week we told how further delays mean it will be more than a year before the ferry will start work on the Brodick to Ardrossan route.

Continued from page one shire Council support, with funding and expert advice, Arran as a carbon neutral island can be achieved within a few years.

'My personnel commitment is to campaign tirelessly to protect and conserve blue carbon stores. It's a win-win situation, basically a no-brainer, if the Scottish government is serious about both reducing the effects of climate change and stopping biodiversity loss.²

Howard said the South Arran Marine Protected Area could go a long way to assisting with this goal as the four-kilometre stretch of sea grass at Whiting Bay, and the mearl and kelp beds, which are now protected, are excellent sources of carbon capture.

However, he believes that the Scottish government is

not doing enough to protect blue carbon capture and hopes to question First Minister Nicola Sturgeon on the subject when she visits Arran next week.

Along with Howard, the only other European delegate is British inventor Adam Dixon of Cardiff-based Phytoponics who has developed technology allowing a wide variety of crops to be grown highly efficiently and productively using hydroponics.

The three-day summit Howard is attending will take place from Wednesday September 12 in San Francisco and Howard received his personal invitation, through the Goldman Foundation, from the Californian Governor Jerry Brown.

The summit will bring leaders and people together from around the world to: 'Take ambition to the next level.' Organisers say it will be a moment to celebrate the extraordinary achievements of states, regions, cities, companies, investors and citizens with respect to climate action.


It will also be a launchpad for deeper worldwide commitments and accelerated action from countries -supported by all sectors of society - that can put the globe on track to prevent dangerous climate change and realise the historic Paris Agreement.

At the heart of the Paris agreement is the commitment by national governments to review their progress and ratchet up the ambition of national climate action plans, known as Nationally Determined Contributions (NDCs).

The summit, happen-

ing midway between Paris 2015 and Poland in 2020, is timed to provide the confidence to governments to 'step up' and trigger this next level of ambition sooner rather than later.

The summit will also consider a range of new climate commitments under five key areas: Healthy Energy Systems, Inclusive Economic Growth, Sustainable Communities, Land and Ocean Stewardship, and Transformative Climate Investments.

A spokesman for the conference organisers said: 'The confidence, enthusiasm and support generated by this wave of action now and through 2019 will embolden national governments' leaders to trigger the necessary domestic processes ahead of 2020 while also triggering more states and regions, cities, businesses and investors to step up further action themselves.


Howard added: 'It is a wonderful opportunity to go and tell the world the tremendous work that a small island corner of the planet is doing to fight climate change.'

Howard, a well-known

marine environmentalist, diver and campaigner, was awarded an OBE for services to the marine environment and in 2015 was a recipient of the Goldman Prize, often referred to as the Green Nobel, for his decades of work on marine conservation in Scotland.

Mike and Liz Rose, Oakbank, Lamlash Individual

Mike and Liz Rose have reduced their energy needs to a fraction of their previous bills, while saving the environment.

To supplement a biomass boiler, they installed 16 x 250 watt solar panels in their backyard in December 2015. They can produce up to four kilowatts, which is the maximum domestic installation, before moving up to commercial three phase electric supplies. In past 12 months, they have produced 2991.86Kw hours of electricity.


Asked what their motivation was, Mike said: 'We have always wanted to be as environmentally friendly as possible. Over the years we have enjoyed many visits to the centre for alternative technology in Wales. We would encourage everyone to pay a visit, as they have hundreds of ideas on how to become more environmentally friendly while saving you a load of money too.'

Kenneth Bone, Glenkiln Farm, Lamlash Business

Between December 2012 and 2016, businessman and farmer Kenneth Bone installed a run of river micro hydro generating scheme able to produce up to 500Kw per hour.

The multi-million-pound Glenkiln hydro scheme, which at 4.2km is one of the longest in Scotland, uses the water of Benlister Burn in Lamlash.

Fully automated, during the June and July dry spell it closed down. Now, after the recent rain, it is back up to full production and only takes a small percentage of what naturally flows.

It is able to provide approximately 70-80 per cent of Lamlash with its electricity needs.

At its completion, Kenneth said: 'It's been a long journey but we are immensely proud of what we have achieved with this project. We wanted to diversify our business further and, after many successful years running our farms, we saw a great opportunity in providing sustainable energy.'

Eco Savvy Community group

Eco Savvy is an outstanding example of the kind of community action that the California summit has in mind: community-based and working energetically and creatively to do all it can to help Arran folk reduce their carbon footprint.

Starting in 2014 with a community shop run by volunteers in Whiting Bay, and awarded charitable status in 2015, Eco Savvy set out from the beginning to have a great environmental impact by focusing the shop and related events on waste reduction, saving huge amounts from going into landfill by encouraging re-homing, upcycling, repairing, re-using and even cooking up a free feast from good food no longer wanted. It is vital work for an island community where everything comes and goes by ferry, including the so-called rubbish.

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These activities were expanded around the island in April 2017 by Eco Savvy's first external grant, from the Climate Challenge Fund, which supported the establishment of eight microhubs. More than 100,00 tonnes of carbon dioxide were saved from the atmosphere, and over 6000kg of items saved from landfill. In 2018, the Climate Challenge Fund has rewarded Eco Savvy with a further grant of over £100,000 to support home energy audits to reduce domestic energy consumption – and save islanders money.

In the immediate future, Eco Savvy is buzzing with ideas around developing sustainable island transport, and home food production – watch this space. However, medium-term plans are on a grander scale – we know Arran must step up a gear if it is to keep pace with the need to mitigate climate changes already unavoidable, and to stay within the Paris Climate Agreement targets of keeping warming to within 1.5 degrees. Eco Savvy is looking at ideas for acquiring land, to deal with compostable waste, even an eco park.

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MP calls for action on Arran phone service

down by the UK government, an MP has said.

North Ayrshire and Arran MP Patricia Gibson has spoken of her concern at the continued lack of UK government action to improve mobile phone coverage on Arran, where so called 'not-spots' mean people are unable to call for help in an emergency.

Mrs Gibson said: 'Powers over mobile coverage are reserved to the UK government and for rural and island communities, often isolated and economically fragile, this should be a top priority. Action is urgently needed to deliver effective coverage across Arran.

'Without UK Government pressure, the decision to provide mobile coverage is a commercial one for mobile network operators.

Arran has been badly let This has left much of Arran with either a poor service or none at all.

'Former UK minister for culture, communications and creative industries Ed Vaizey MP promised coverage on Arran would be rolled out by 2015. This never happened and there are still too many 'notspots' on the island. Apart from being hugely inconvenient, this is potentially dangerous when there is a medical emergency. Indeed, the emergency medical retrieval service has said Arran should be the number one priority for mobile coverage in Scotland.

'Arran has been badly let down by the UK government. Having raised this issue again with the new minister, I was very disappointed to be told mobile phone users dialling 999 are able to roam onto another network if they have no signal from their own provider - advice which is completely unhelpful if you are in an Arran 'notspot' where there is no signal from any provider.

'It is imperative blackspots are plugged for the good of residents and visitors. It is unacceptable Arran's communities continue to be left behind.'

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Propeller problem puts ferry out of service again

Uncertainty remains over when the MV Isle of Arran will be able to resume service on the Brodick to Ardrossan ferry route.

The ageing vessel limped out of service last Friday night, forcing passengers with upcoming reservations to make hasty rearrangements as spaces on the other ferries filled up fast.

After sitting idle all day at the second pier at the new Brodick ferry terminal on Saturday, the vessel was able to head for repair under her own steam to try to resolve an issue with her propeller pitch system.

It is just the latest problem to hit the 35-year-old vessel, which regularly needs repairs and is often out of service when the winds pick up.

It is due to serve as the second Arran ferry until September 24.

The impact of a one-ship service is having a knockon effect for passengers on the main Arran route, and services to Campbeltown were cancelled this week, with no guaranteed date being set for her return to service.

Engineers have been trying to resolve the problem since the issue first arose last Friday. However, following sea trials on Monday, their efforts had proven ineffectual and the ship headed to dry dock for repair. A spokesman from ferry operator Caledonian Mac-Brayne said: 'At present it is not possible to say with certainty when the MV Isle of Arran will return to service but every effort will be made to return her to service as soon as possi-



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
ble next week. We apologise for any inconvenience caused.'

In order to make up for some of the loss of capacity, due to the cancellation of 10 services a day, the MV Caledonian Isles has been making additional sailings to cope with the workload. These sailings have been for customers who have been affected by the cancellations and were not open to new bookings.

In addition to the two extra sailings being undertaken by the MV Caledonian Isles, which is currently scheduled until Tuesday August 28, the MV Loch Linnhe has been drafted in to assist the MV Catriona on the Claonaig to Lochranza route to provide extra cover.

Additional staff have been drafted in to crew the additional sailings and staff numbers have also been increased at Brodick, Ardrossan, Lochranza and Claonaig ports to cope with additional pressures.

Gilbert Norris. Oldest man dies

The man believed to be the oldest resident on Arran has died. Gilbert Norris, a D-Day veteran and recipient of the Légion d'Honneur, passed away peacefully at Cooriedoon Nursing Home on Thursday August 16, aged 102.

Gilbert who was born on May 29, 1916, was part of the D-Day landings during the war where, as an engineer, he played a valuable role in building and repairing bridges in France.

Following his military career, Gilbert returned to civilian life by becoming chief roads engineer with the Scottish Development Department in Edinburgh before moving to Arran in 1978.

In June this year, Gilbert received a special visit from the Consul General of France, Emmanuel Cocher, who presented him with the Légion d'Honneur in recognition of his help in liberating France during the Second World War.

Gilbert is survived by his son Geoff. His funeral service will take place at Lamlash Parish Church at 11.30am on Tuesday August 28.

Cabinet reshuffle Arran schedule

Arran's environmental pioneer

It is for these reasons that he has had such success with his decades of hard work which has advanced conservation, not only on Arran but across Scotland. So, too, in his being awarded the prestigious Goldman Prize and being awarded an OBE for services to marine conservation in 2015.

We wish Howard every success in his latest endeavours and encourage everyone to lend their support in helping Howard, and Arran, to achieve carbon neutrality.

Torrid week

An open letter to Robbie Drummond, managing director of CalMac. Sir,

On Monday August 20, up to 448 passengers were given just 16 hours notice that their ferry tickets for the MV Isle of Arran were useless for the booked sailings. CalMac then advised passengers the Arran ferry terminal had shut their IT booking systems down because of information-overload and it could take up to a week to sort out.

First, CalMac call centre staff at the sharp end, answering the telephones, dealing with upset and anxious customers, should be highly commended. A difficult job for ferry firm folk. From the five conversations I had, all of your CalMac staff handled these challenging situations calmly, professionally and with good grace. But Mr Drummond, this should not be happening. CalMac have been in the business since 1851. If the ships aren't running properly after 167 years of trying to get this right, then when?

The MV Isle of Arran will be off for days and thousands of passengers will be let down to some degree. On top of this, there is 'the list'. CalMac customer complaints that regularly grace this letter's page in the Arran Banner. For example: (i) Brodick Ferry Terminal being a significant problem for folk who have a disability; (ii) The profligate waste of £30m for a ferry terminal that should cost no more than £6m to build: (iii) The £100m cost of taxpayer funding for overly large ferries which are obscenely too expensive and oversized for the Arran service;

problem and missed sailings that will happen at Ardrossan when the MV Glen Sannox and MV Corporate Ego can't get into the mainland port because of the massive sail area on the slab-sided vessels; (v) the millions of pounds in wasted fuel by carting crew accommodation on the ship's structure like some massive wet caravan, when the shipping operator would reduce the taxpayer burden by providing crew houses in Ardrossan and Brodick; (vi) the historic senior management failure in preparing for Road Equivalent Tariff traffic growth. The list goes on and on. Enough to fill a whole edition of the Arran Banner.

(iv) the significant docking

Mr Drummond, you have a very impressive CV: Cal-Mac group finance director, transition director, bid director and service delivery director. One of the best in a generation of CalMac managing directors. Here is a golden opportunity for you to make permanent your position, and ensure CalMac survives beyond the next tender round.

Constructive suggestion: please send the two massive new-builds to serve the Outer Hebrides where they are much more suited. Then go back to the drawing board. Ask your naval architect for a medium-size 'class' of ship design at £9m each. Order three for starters. Then rotate two of them on the Ardrossan-Brodick route. Plug in the third when it gets overly busy. That works well. Don't take my word for it. Cast your eyes up the Clyde to Western Ferries. They have the right size of vessel for their service. They plug in an extra ship to suit the exigencies and demands of their route. If you

bring three mid-sized ships such as modern equivalents of 1985 vintage MV Hebridean Isles and 1983 MV Isle of Arran plus another of this class (modern 2018-2020 design) to Arran, then islanders will have a ferry service that starts at 5am in the morning and ends each day at 11pm. There will be a reliable back-up ship to cover extra demand to plug in at Brodick, just as Western Ferries do at Hunters Quay. We would avoid nightmare breakdowns such as this week.

If CalMac do not get the numerous problems sorted out on the Arran route, then Mr Drummond, how about leasing the old Brodick ferrv terminal and linkspan to some of the disgruntled islanders/passengers who have been watching Cal-Mac fail to learn lessons over the past 50 years? There is more than enough qualified, experienced and able people on the island to run our own ferry service. This happened up at Orkney. Andrew Banks's Pentland Ferries is an exemplar of how a local ferry company should and can work.

Instead, here on Arran, each time we get one of these nautical nightmares, it risks the jobs of people who live and work on the island. Mr Drummond, I would be amazed if you replied to this letter, but very happy if you stick your head above the parapet and speak to many of the distressed passengers regarding this latest, torrid ferry week.



Get children ready to fight flu this winter

Parents of primary school children in NHS Ayrshire and Arran are being urged to act now to get their children ready to flight flu this winter.

Following last year's bad flu season, health professionals have highlighted the benefits of getting children vaccinated early ahead of winter hitting

Flu vaccination consent forms will be arriving home in school bags over the next few days as the autumn term gets under way, which parents need

to return if they wish their child to be vaccinated.

The safe and effective nasal vaccine is the best way to help protect children from flu. It only takes a few minutes and provides protection for around a year.

To date, more than 1.6 million doses of the nasal vaccine have been given to 2-11 year olds in Scotland, and the vaccine will be offered to 400,000 primary aged children this year as part of the Scottish childhood immunisation programme. Deputy chief medical officer for Scotland Dr Gregor Smith has urged parents to consider getting their child vaccinated, not only to protect them, but to help stop the spread of the virus to others. 'Flu can be serious, and can result

in even healthy children being hospitalised.

'The vaccine remains the best way to protect your child against flu and helps protect those around them who may be vulnerable to flu.





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

Uncowed is shot entire


A full-length comedy film, shot by production company Positive Pictures, has taken a step closer to being released with the completion of the filming and moving the production into the editing room.





The team at the Isle of Arran Distillers is celebrating four coveted awards at this year's International Wine & Spirits Competition.



Fishermen to have their sav

Fisherman and people from across all sectors of the Arran fishing industry are invited to have their say at the Scottish Inshore Fisheries Conference (SIFC) being held next month.

Seeking opinion and industry related feedback, the Scottish Government is collating information to develop a new model of fisheries management for Scottish waters.

With the UK's departure from the European Union, the fishing industry will change dramatically and new management guidelines will need to be established to deal with where UK fishermen can fish, how they can fish and what they can catch and how they will market their catch.

The fifth SIFC, being held in Inverness on October 5, will allow delegates from a cross-section of inshore fishing interests to make their views known.

Fergus Ewing MSP, cabinet secretary for the rural economy, will open the conference and give the keynote speech. A second plenary, in the afternoon, will provide a forum to discuss the Scottish Government's plans for taking forward work on the future of fisheries management in Scotland.



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Scots poem takes the prize at McLellan poetry competition

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... but winner remains a closely guarded secret

Judging of this year's entries for Arran's annual McLellan poetry competition has now been completed and for the first time the overall winner of the $\pounds 1,500$ prize is a poem in Scots.

Forward Prize winner Sinéad Morrissey picked the Scots poem from a strong field of nearly 1,400 entries submitted by 750 poets. The Scottish success is notable given the increasingly international flavour of the competition which this year attracted entries from 35 different counties from Australia to Swaziland and Mongolia.

Local organisers Cicely Gill and David Underdown expressed delight that the winning poem should have a strong Scots flavour, especially as Robert McLellan, the Corrie-based writer in whose memory the festival was founded, chose to write his own work in Scots.

For the time being, the identity of the winning poet will remain a closelyguarded secret, but all will be revealed on Friday August 31, when Sinéad visits Arran to announce the

winners at the prize-giving event in Corrie and Sannox Village Hall. Those of you who attended last year's event will remember it as a heart-warming and stimulating evening in an intimate village setting. In the second half of the programme, after a musical interlude from Arran Dawn, Sinéad will read poems from her own work.

Tickets, priced at £10, including wine, are available online through Arran Events or from today (Saturday) at the Book and Card Centre in Brodick.

Sinéad admits that this will be her first visit to a Scottish island. The multiaward winning poet was born in Portadown in County Armagh and, after spells living in New Zealand and Japan, she settled in Belfast. Recently she moved to the north-east of England to become professor of creative writing at the University of Newcastle.

She will be arriving on Arran with her husband, acupuncturist Joseph Pond, and their two sons, and hopes to have time to discover what the island has to offer during her stay.

Sinead's fifth collection, Parallax, won the prestigious T S Eliot award and last year her latest book, On Balance, was chosen as the Forward Prize best collection of 2017.

There will be some poems to read and some exercises. The workshop is open to all regardless of experience – though places are limited.

Honourable mention for Arran Bird Atlas

achieved national recognition by being given an honourable mention when the magazine British Birds announced the winner of the award for the best local bird atlas 2007-2017.

Forty local atlases were considered by British Birds and the British Trust for Ornithology and here is what the judging panel had to say: 'As well as the six winners, we felt that the Arran Bird Atlas 2007-2012 was worthy of an honourable mention. The volume could easily be dismissed as light in both weight and content, given the minimal comment on each species. But the fieldwork was very much a community effort and the writing driven tains more than 36,000 re-

The result is a brief but reliable overview of the birds of this island at an easily affordable price and is a considerable achievement. The Arran Bird Atlas 2007-2012 deserves high praise.'

The atlas describes the mapping of the birds of Arran for the first time.

Under the direction of Dr Jim Cassels, the bird recorder for the Arran Natural History Society, more than 30 volunteers conducted fieldwork over five years covering the whole of the island. In addition, almost 700 people contributed bird sightings during these five breeding seasons and five winters.

The Arran Bird Atlas has largely by one individual. cords on 177 species. It is from the Scottish Ornitholan outstanding effort by residents and visitors, who share a passion for the birds of Arran. Adding to this effort, at the publication stage, more than 30 photographers agreed to the use of their images.

The work involved in this project was recognised nationally when the Marsh Local Ornithology Award was presented to the Arran Natural History Society in October 2013 by the Marsh Trust and the British Trust for Ornithology.


The key features of the resulting full-colour publication are: 168 pages with more than 400 maps and more than 200 photographs of 177 birds.

> The cover of the Arran **Bird Atlas.**



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




