'Tennis membership has declined over the years, and the courts are lightly used outwith the eight weeks of the summer season. The club has agreed to sell the facility to COAST which intends to repurpose multi-use space.

Prior to submitting the application, COAST held a public meeting in Lamlash to make the public aware of its proposals. The meeting was attended by more than 80 people who voted unanimously in favour of the proposals.

COAST is currently housed in cramped, rented accommodation in Lamlash with poor access to its two main projects – the No Take

Zone (NTZ) and the South Arran Marine Protected Area (MPA).

It says the proposed alterations and extension will revitalise the building and enable COAST to become a more economically secure social enterprise and create a valuable community asset.

Mr Binnie added: 'We will also be seeking funding to upgrade two of the court areas.

'We hope to move into the pavilion next year and then to start the architectural design process for the proposed marine discovery centre. This will require a separate planning application and the involvement of the whole community as well as North Ayrshire Council and other stakeholders. Later this autumn we will be holding a public meeting to update the community on developments and seek their views.

But not everyone agreed, with one reader commenting: 'Can't go changing anything can we ... even when it's three filthy floating skips.'

CMAL says all three boats have fallen into state of disrepair and appear in danger of breaking up. As such, they are now considered wrecks and pose a risk to vessels navigating within the inner harbour.

A second public notice has been posted in the Banner today appealing for the owners of the remaining abandoned boats to come forward. A spokeswoman said: 'The owners have until September 23 to come forward and claim their boat. After that date any of the abandoned boats that remain unclaimed will need to be removed for harbour safety reasons.'



#### Walkers rescued from burn crossing

A group of walkers on a Duke of Edinburgh course had to be rescued after they became trapped at one of the burn crossings in Glen Easan Biorach near Lochranza last Friday September 9.

The Arran Mountain Rescue Team was called out after the group of three adults and six teenagers had become stuck at one of the burn crossings due to the rapidly rising water levels. The team assisted the group across the burn safely by creating a human chain and using a rope for security and, although cold and wet, all were thankfully unharmed.

The team advises walkers to be aware that burn crossings can become impassable extremely quickly.

#### **New offices** and storage in Lamlash

A new office block and storage units are to be built in Lamlash

The building is to be erected on the vacant ground south of the Old Hay Barn in Park Terrace. The development, proposed by Gavin Fulton, has been given planning permission by North Ayrshire Council

Mr Fulton presently rents out storage old the Old Hay Barn and in a planning statement said: 'There is considerable demand for this type of facility to store furniture on a short-term basis. There is also a demand for small-scale office space on Arran. The erection of the proposed building would serve to provide both facilities.'

The building will be approximately 15 metres long, eight metres wide and a dual pitched roof approximately five metres high. It will be finished in profiled metal cladding.

One condition of the approval is that, prior to the coming into use of the building, the first two metres of the access should be hard surfaced in order to prevent loose material from being deposited onto the public road.

### Arran Avoids Accidents project comes to an end

Primary-seven pupils from every school on the island and second-year pupils at Arran High School recently attended the final Arran Avoids Accidents experiential learning event which was held at the Lamlash Community Fire Station.

The event, which has been running on the island for the past 17 years, has sadly decided that it is to cease after work commitments from many of the agencies involved made it increasingly difficult to ensure its survival.

The multi-agency event gave the school children some hands-on experience and provided an insight into what it is like to be a member of an emergency service and to thank all the pupils who

to gain knowledge of what to do and what not to do in the case of an emergency.

Each year local services and volunteers gave up their time to help at the event, which often saw up to 11 services taking part. These were the Scottish Fire and Rescue Service, Police Scotland, Heartstart, First Responders, North Road Safety, Avrshire Coastguard, RNLI, National Trust Ranger Service, Brodick Country Park, Arran Mountain Rescue Team, NHS Ayrshire and Arran, and the Scottish Ambulance Service.

Liz Brady, of the Scottish Fire and Rescue Service, said: 'We would like have attended the event over the past 17 years and hope that they gained invaluable knowledge from groups of highly professional and experienced people and also to the services and volunteers who gave up their time. Many of them were at the event for the whole 17 years it was run. The event was a great success and without their support it could not have been run so professionally each vear.'

Money that was gained through fundraising for the event has been donated to the Arran defibrillator project and the gazebo has been donated to Geoff Norris on behalf of the Coastal Rowing Club.

#### Help save Scotland's forests

Forestry Commission Scotland is urging all forest workers and visitors to 'keep it clean' and help minimise the risk of tree diseases spreading to healthy forests.

One of the ways that diseases can arrive in a healthy forest is to be carried there in mud and forest debris that gets stuck on people's boots or bike tyres, or even on dogs' paws and horses' hooves.

The simple advice asks people to take a few minutes before visiting a woodland to brush off dirt and mud – and to make this a habit before every wood-

#### Pavilion of dreams

It is good to see progress is being made to find a new home for the Community of Arran Seabed Trust (COAST)

In what will be the first phase of the plan to create a marine discovery centre, COAST proposes to move its headquarters to the former Lamlash tennis courts

It is a project it has been keen to take the community along with every step of the way, and it is good it is willing to take over the hiring of tennis racquets and putting equipment once it moves in next year.

Taking over a facility which was underused may just give it a new lease of life, not just to COAST, but to the whole site. Yes, down the line, two of the tennis courts are likely to go to make way for the new discovery centre, but the others will be upgraded so there is no reason why the two facilities cannot have a bright future together.

The tennis court pavilion is an ideal site for the COAST HQ. It overlooks the Lamlash Bay No Take Zone (NTZ), which was the first real building block for the environmental organisation.

As well as offices, the pavilion will provide it with a multi-use space for exhibitions and meeting rooms for the many marine experts, from all over the world, who regularly visit COAST to tap into the extensive knowledge it has of the coastal waters around the island, which are now further conserved by the South Arran Marine Protected Area (MPA).

So the new home for COAST will allow it to have a much higher public profile than its cramped, rented accommodation at the back of Lamlash allows at

Of course with the plans drawn up and submitted for permission there is another stark reality - cash. COAST is at present busy writing funding applications to as many organisations as it can think of.

We hope that raises the necessary money to allow works to begin and let COAST move premises as soon as possible. But then the real work begins because the next big step after that will be to design the marine discovery centre.

Exciting times indeed.



#### Field of dreams

#### <u>Arrant arrogance</u>

While people generally take considerable interest in any filming that happens on the island and welcome programme-makers, there has been some muttering over the BBC production team taking over portions of the island for the filming of *The Missing Postman*.

The ferry has been fully booked with a wardrobe truck, a dining bus, a kitchen truck, a road truck, a catering truck and a camera and lighting truck, all 10.5 meters long. On top of this, the Ross Road will be closed next Wednesday with a threat of a £100 fine for anyone driving on it as well as parts of Lamlash being closed to the public. The feeling from many, including Councillor Evelyn Sillars, is that this 'arrant arrogance' is riding roughshod over the island.


