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# Advent campaign to help bolster foodbank supplies

An urgent appeal is being made to stop the Arran foodbank running out of supplies this year.

For the past two winters the Brodick-based service, which is used all year round, has run out of food at this crucial time. Now an island charity is urging residents to think of those less well off in the run up to Christmas.

Throughout November and early December the Arran Community and Voluntary Service (ACVS) is reaching out to people, businesses and organisations to help support the local foodbank with its Kind Arran Reverse Advent Campaign.

The campaign involves giving something each day into a reverse advent box. Simply place an everyday item of foodstuff or goods in a box each weekday for 25 days. The plan is that after 25 days there will be a Christmas hamper that is ready to be donated to the tional heating costs may

foodbank. All the food donated is currently used on Arran.

ACVS has compiled a list of the best items to donate, including tinned meat and fish and pasta sauces and anything else with a long shelf-life. It is also suggesting treats such as selection boxes, Christmas biscuits, nuts and sweeties.

It also has nicely wrapped boxes for people to collect, or people get creative and make their own. These boxes can be collected from the ACVS office in Lamlash and filled boxes can be returned by Friday December 15, in order to be handed to the foodbank well before Christmas.

ACVS chief executive officer Vicki Yuill said: 'Island life comes with a higher cost of living.

'Winter on Arran may offer fewer working opportunities for some and many experience a seasonal or reduced income.

'High rental for accommodation costs and addi-

increase the pressure on individuals and families who are already struggling to afford food. With the Kind Arran Reverse Advent Campaign, ACVS hopes that some of the financial pressures on those experiencing difficulties can be alleviated.'

Arran Churches Together which runs the foodbank has found there is an increased demand for supplies at Christmas time. The local foodbank has been running for three years and all items go to help community residents in need.

Over the last two winters the foodbank has run out of food and through this campaign it would like to help prevent this from occurring again this year.

The foodbank at Brodick Church in Knowe Road is open to all.

Already nearly 20 people have signed up on social media to take part in the campaign and a couple of boxes have been returned full.

Anyone interested can visit the ACVS Facebook page where advice on what to give and daily updates with pictures of people's hampers can be seen. Users can also add their own pictures of their hampers the #kindarran17 hashtag is added to posts.

## Roadworks will shut Bogullie for a month

Residents in the north of the island face a monthlong closure of the Bogullie while vital road repairs are carried out.

It is proposed to close the main road to Lochranza for seven-and-a-half hours a day with work starting on January 29 next year. The work involves resurfacing and widening on the A841 near the Witches Bridge which is an accident blackspot, particularly for cyclists.

North Ayrshire Council roads' bosses have confirmed the work will take up to 30 days with the road being closed from 9am to 4.30pm daily. They say the closure is needed because of the heavy machinery which will be on site.

However, the lengthy closure will mean disruption for residents and businesses at the north end as well as causing a big increase in traffic on The String and the Machrie Moor Road.

Before the work starts on the Bogullie there will also be disruption on the The String with resurfacing work programmed for early January. This work

will be from Glenshurig towards the weather station at the summit, and should take about five days. The road will be closed from 9am to 1pm and 1.30pm to 4.30pm daily. Road resurfacing south of Sliddery is programmed to follow on from these works during January. This is expected to take up to two working weeks with the road closed from 9am to 4.30pm daily.

A council spokesman said: 'The proposed programme of works may be subject to change due to weather or ferry disruption. North Ayrshire Council (Roads) would like to apologise in advance for any disruption these works may cause.'

The Ross road will be closed for drainage works from Tuesday November 14 for four days, or until the works are complete.



The luxury cruise ship Hebridean Princess made what is likely to be her last berth at the old pier in Brodick on Thursday. The cruise ship, a regular visitor to Arran, will soon be using the second berth at the new ferry terminal and will no longer have to vacate the pier for the regular ferry service. The new terminal, which officially opens on Monday November 27, is expected to start operations in the week prior to the opening but no date has yet been set.



## Memorial to Pirnmill men who fell

The building of a memorial in Pirnmill to soldiers who died in the First World War is tantalisingly close to achieving its funding goal.

Fiona Laing has worked tirelessly to raise funds and only a further £2,000 is needed to construct a memorial in honour of the eight men from Pirnmill who died during the conflict. She will be hosting a second fundraising event in Pirnmill village hall this weekend.

## Talking passionately

With more than 200 pictures of Pirnmill village since the early 1900s the event will see Fiona talking passionately about the

lives that were lost and the history of the village and its occupants. Her first talk on the subject earlier in the week, which included refreshments and home baking, attracted a healthy amount of support and interest and the second event should be equally as popular and will appeal to those who were unable to attend the first talk during the week.

Entrance to the nostalgic event tonight (Saturday) at 7pm is by suggested donation of £5 per person and all proceeds will go towards the memorial construction which is scheduled for completion next year.

## Council to pay living wage rise early

The lowest earning workers at North Ayrshire Council are to get the newly announced living wage more than four months early, in a decision described as a fight against inequality.

To mark living wage week a new rate of £8.75 per hour was announced, a rise of 30p per hour on the current rate of £8.45. Although the new rate is not due to be adopted by businesses and organisations until after April 2018, the council has committed to ensuring staff receive the increase in their next pay.

North Ayrshire Council leader Joe Cullinane, said: 'This is a clear statement

that the council is committed to tackling inequality and helping those on low income. Earning the real living wage can make a huge difference to people's lives. As the largest single employer in North Ayrshire, we're proud to show support for our lowest-paid workers by committing to paying the real living wage early.'

North Ayrshire Council became a living wage employer last year and is one of a number of local authorities from across Scotland to be officially accredited by the Scottish living wage accreditation initia-

Council chief executive Elma Murray said: 'We believe that the living wage gives employees the opportunity to provide for themselves and their families, hopefully taking them out of in-work poverty.'

# Police probe flag thefts at Brodick golf course

Police on Arran are probing the mystery theft of flags from the greens at Brodick golf course.

Seven flags were stolen from the greens at an estimated cost of £280 to the club and Police Scotland are appealing for witnesses to assist with their recovery.

The theft took place between Thursday October 26 and Friday 27 and also included a number of wooden tee markers, which have since been recovered in a nearby bin. In addition to the theft, an attempt to throw a tee mat into the burn was abandoned after the heavy item was dragged towards the burn.


Brodick Golf Club captain Lindsay Keir

said: 'It is most unusual to have so many flags and markers stolen at once. We sometimes have one or two going missing during the summer but we have never seen so many going missing this late in the year.

'It is possibly senseless vandalism but it has caused us unnecessary cost and inconvenience. The tee markers and flags which have gone missing were those closest to the road and belonging to the first, second and third tees.

'If you know anything about the flags you can discreetly return them to the club and/or contact the police who are investigating,' he added.

# Amphitheatre plan for Eas Mor

A woodland amphitheatre is just one of the proposals which have been included in plans to develop Eas Mor at the south end of the island.

The applicant, Eas Mor H20 Ecology, has applied for planning permission, some retrospectively, for the erection of a roadside shelter and yoga pavilion, two footbridges and upgrading of existing paths, along with alterations to an existing cafe and toilet block.

The 13,000-square-metre site will see the proposed development spread over four zones. The first zone, near the main road will incorporate the proposed roadside shelter while zone two will be further south where the yoga pavilion is proposed.

On the opposite side of the road near the existing Eas Mor entrance, permission is being sought retrospectively for alterations to the cafe, store and toilet blocks which have already been partially constructed and which make up zone three.

## Planning permission

Further north, zone four which is located near the picture-adorned wooden library, planning permission is requested for an amphitheatre which will have a roof and a covered tunnel leading to it.

The application is currently still under consideration by North Ayrshire Council planning officials and 19 neighbours within 20 metres of the site boundary have been notified.







Check all your insulation, from windows to walls, ceiling to under floors. It is one of the most costeffective ways to stop the cold creeping through the house.

Try speaking to your energy supplier to see if you're on the best rate or tariff. Some may move you on to a cheaper option, if available.



# Lady Jean and her love of pointers

Journalist and broadcaster Jon Kean was a friend of the late Lady Jean Fforde for more than 40 years sharing a passion for pointer dogs. Here he gives a very personal appreciation of Lady Jean, who was the doyenne of pointers in this country and was known throughout the world.

the 1970s - appropriately enough it was on the grouse moors in Perthshire. Janette and I were there just to spectate at the field trial and find out more about working pointers and setters

Lady Jean immediately put us at ease and explained what was happening at the trial. My one abiding memory from that day was the unusual footwear Lady Jean sported. It was a pair of sandshoes (baseball type) with the words

6 I first met Lady Jean in 'Skateboard City' emblazoned on the side. Her great friend Mrs Patience Badenoch Nicolson was there too Their guidance inspired me to find out more about working pointers.

From that day, friendship developed and I learned so much from Lady Jean and Patience about working pointers. After a while, I asked Lady Jean if it would be possible to purchase an Isle of Arran pointer. My wish was granted. In historical terms, the pointer kennels were among the first,

if not THE first, to be registered by her grandfather at the Kennel Club when it was formed. In 1983, I brought back from Arran two male puppies from Lady Jean's litter, sired by Moanruad Aron (the late John Nash's pointer) and Isle of Arran Neillia (litter sister of the 1981 Champion Stake winner FT CH Isle of Arran Larch, handled by Mrs Marcia Clark). I reared Isle of Arran Micha and the brother Isle of Arran Gideon was bought by Duncan Davis from the North of England. The rest, as they say, is history. Gideon duly became a field trial Champion and Micha (pet name Duke) won the Champion Stake at Bollihope Moorin County Durham in 1989. Duke was a fantastic

pointer for our shooting

owned by Charles Connell in Invernesshire. Apart from his game finding ability, Duke's great attribute was his stamina and endurance. He had the strength of three dogs.

Lady Jean and Patience were hugely influential people in the pointer world.

They were always willing to help and offer advice to anyone interested in working gundogs. One day, I was called aside for an informal chat

Lady Jean told me: 'Patience and I both agree that you need to put something back into the sport.

We think you should take on the role of honorary secretary of the Scottish Field Trials Association.' I was duly appointed in 1986 and have done the job of secretary for the pointers and setters ever since.

Looking back, there were many famous pointers with the Isle of Arran prefix. The list is endless - Isle of Arran African Queen, Scotnev Isle of Arran Regent, Isle of Arran Juno, FT CH Scotney Isle of Arran Jack, Isle of Arran Minoru, FT CH Isle of Arran Dice, Isle of Arran Lilly. Lady Jean's favourite was FT CH Isle of Arran June, a beautiful orange and white bitch. In Lady Jean's memoir, she wrote: 'June became the dog of my life – I adored

trips to Garrogie Estate, her. Considering she was the first dog of any kind I had trained myself, she was a miracle. I trained her by phoning Patience Nicolson week by week, and asking for instructions.

> Lady Jean was president of the Pointer Club of Scotland from when it was founded many years ago. She had many interests outwith the world of field trials. She was a keen gardener, for example. Her parents brought back many rare plants from their trips throughout the world. On our visits to Strabane, her home at Brodick. Lady Jean gave us a guided tour of the gardens. On one visit, Lady Jean told us she would be sending her friend to collect us from the ferry at Brodick. The friend just happened to be Richard Todd, the Oscar-nominated actor best known for war dramas like The Hasty Heart, The Dam Busters and The Longest Day.

> Lady Jean's mother was very keen on taking cine films of life on Arran, which included stalking and shooting over pointers on the island from the 1930s onwards. A couple of years ago we spent a lovely afternoon in Strabane viewing some of the reels of film, and they are fascinating to watch.

Lady Jean sent me a gift of the book called Train- Jon Kean.

ing Setters and Pointers for Field Trials, by Professor John Beazley, Alf Manners and Arnold White-Robinson. It is signed: 'To Jon. Wishing you every luck in field trials with your puppy. Jean Fforde 1981.' I have used this book as a guide for seminars ever since.

In 1982, Lady Jean asked me to show her Champion Stake winner, Larch, at Crufts in London. This I duly did and was thrilled when the Judge Mrs Kitty Edmondson awarded a prize to Larch. Unbeknown to me, Lady Jean's best friend, Princess Antoinette of Monaco, was a surprise visitor at the ringside at Crufts.

I will always have great memories of Lady Jean. Our last visit to Lady Jean was in July this year. She was in good spirits and very keen to hear news from the world of pointers. RIP Lady Jean. 9

road out of Lamlash. Some 20 different grounds of objection have been made including noise, danger of access and egress and the existence of Lamlash Golf Course across the road. The council was recommended to grant the proposal subject to a list of conditions.

## Public opinion on policing

The local police have been the butt of much complaint over the years. What are they doing about vandalism, drugs and other petty and not so petty crime that goes on? Not much, a lot of people say. Absolutely everything we can, say the police. Too much, says the odd voice feeling they may be too officious.

Now they want the public to tell them what they should be doing. U Division will be holding a series of public meetings across the area including on Arran.

Earlier this year community councillors were asked to sound out local opinion on the greatest concerns and they felt mindless vandalism was number one. Other items of concern were drugs, speeding, underage drinking and even dog fouling.

## Pirnmill store reopening

Pirnmill shop is likely to be in business again on December 1. Mr Mike Paterson who is buying the premises is set to take ownership on November 21. Although negotiations are still continuing with a possible leassee, for he does not want to run it himself, he wants to get things going as soon as possible. Thus the December 1 date on which he plans what he describes as a partial opening. The village of Pirnmill has been without a shop or post office since October 1996 when the present owners, the Browns, decided to close. Mr Paterson has not run a shop before but he says that Jim Primrose of Lochranza Stores has been giving him as much advice as pos-

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
