Inquiry demanded into staff fired at care home

A petition has been launched demanding an inquiry into the dismissal of staff at Montrose House care home.

More than 300 signatures have been gathered for the petition which was started by the Church of Scotland.

The kirk sessions of the joint parishes of North Arran have all agreed to support the petition which will be sent to North Ayrshire Council's chief executive Elma Murray demanding an independent investigation into the treatment of five

senior members of staff at the new care home which only officially opened in June last year.

The petition is now available to sign in the churches of Brodick, Corrie, Lochranza, Pirnmill and Shiskine, as well as in shops and community halls across the north of the island.

It comes after five staff at the new Montrose House and the Stronach Day Care Centre were suspended more than six months ago. Three have since been sacked while two others remain suspended. All had previously worked at the former care home, most for a number of years. In an open letter to the chief executive, the churches state: 'The sense of deep injustice at the way in which those in senior management within North Ayrshire Council handled this unfortunate situation has continued to cause widespread anger within the Arran community. Therefore we the undersigned office-bearers and members of the five congregations write to you as chief executive calling for an inquiry into what has occurred at Montrose House to be independently investigated by a panel of North Ayrshire councillors. This appeal for

such a course of action to be taken is strengthened by the support of the undersigned parishioners of the Church of Scotland parishes of North Arran and other concerned Arran residents.'

The Church of Scotland first became involved in the staff dispute back in July when Montrose House chaplain, the Rev Angus Adamson, wrote to Arran councillor John Bruce raising concerns about the situation regarding the five senior staff being almost simultaneously suspended from their duties and the manner in which their cases were being dealt with by

the council. The open letter states that the matter was subsequently raised by Councillor Bruce with David Rowland, head of service for health and community care.

But it goes on: 'Since that time the situation has only worsened. The treatment of the staff members concerned by North Ayrshire Council continued in an even more aggressively unfair manner, finally resulting in the dismissal of three of them and, to date, the continuing suspension, after some six months, of the other two.'

Sunday boost for travellers

A new train service will allow Arran residents to get to Glasgow three hours earlier on a Sunday.

It is being launched on December 11 and the new Sundays-only service will depart Ardrossan Harbour at 9.35am having connected with the 9.15am arrival of the MV Caledonian Isles service from Brodick. It will arrive in Glasgow at 10.17am.

Previously, the first arrival into Glasgow Central on a Sunday wasn't until 1.18pm. The new service means Arran residents will be able to enjoy a full day shopping or sightseeing in Glasgow on a Sunday for the first time.

Islanders had already decided to give up the late crossing on a Saturday for an earlier service on a Sunday for the duration of the winter timetable.


Cathy Craig of ScotRail said: 'This new service will open up more leisure opportunities for Arran customers and those along the route – three hours extra to spend with family and friends, shopping, going to the theatre or onwards to other destinations.'

Peel Ports pledges investm launched to keep ferry ser

The owners of Ardrossan harbour have pledged a multimillion-pound investment if the government gives a longterm commitment to keep the Arran ferry at the port.

It came as an official campaign was launched to keep the current ferry route with a show of support from both sides of the crossing.

The newly appointed project director for the redevelopment of Ardrossan harbour, Doug Coleman, of Peel Ports, came to Arran on Monday.

Speaking in Brodick, he said: 'A decision from the government to make a long-term commitment to maintain the Arran ferry at Ardrossan will enable Peel Ports to commit a multi-million-pound investment package at the harbour.'

Mr Coleman has just completed a similar role at the five-year, £400million Liverpool 2 project on the River Mersey, the UK's biggest port development in recent years.

He added: 'The Ardrossan to Arran ferry route is a very important strategic priority for Peel Ports and we have committed significant resources to ensure we reflect the route's lifeline nature for both Arran and Ardrossan.'

Members of the public joined local organisations and businesses to demonstrate the fierce level of backing - on both Arran and the mainland for the retention of the route.

The campaign has launched under the name of Keep it A to B – Ardrossan to Brodick and encourages supporters to use the hashtag #SaveOurFerry on social media. The campaign launch comes just days after Transport Minister Humza Yousaf announced an independent study of the Arran ferry service, as reported in last week's Banner, taking into account the local social and economic benefits,

That followed an announcement from Associated British Ports that it wanted to take the service from Ardrossan and operate it from Troon.

The Keep it A to B campaign highlights the case for retaining the ferry route, which has operated between Ardrossan and Brodick for almost 180 years.

The campaign has backing from Ardrossan ferry terminal operators Peel Ports, North Ayrshire Council and on the

The launch then moved to the mainland where representatives of local organisations and businesses gathered at Ardrossan ferry terminal to show the wide level of backing for the crossing on the mainland side.

The launch of the Save Our Ferry campaign brought smiles but the message is very serious. 01 A46ardrossan01 The campaign launch came days before a full meeting of North Ayrshire Council where Councillor Cullinane tabled a motion, noting with regret the 'divisive and opportunistic' bid by Associated British Ports to replace the long-established Ardrossan-Brodick route with a longer, slower and more expensive crossing from Troon.

In a demonstration of the cross-party support for the Ardrossan to Brodick route, Willie Gibson, the SNP leader of the main opposition group on the council, seconded the motion.





Inquiry urgently needed

There is an old adage that the church and politics don't mix.

But this week we applaud the Church of Scotland for taking a firm stance on a matter which it clearly has deep concerns about.

The suspension of five senior members of staff at Montrose House and the subsequent sacking of three of them is a serious matter indeed. So it was only right when concerns were brought to the care home chaplain, the Rev Angus Adamson, that he should take them up with the authorities.

This he did without fuss or fanfare. What happened? Very little it seems.

We can only imagine his frustration and when further allegations were made to him about 'this unfortunate situation'

Concerns about the situation had by now reached the wider Arran community. Mr Adamson felt he had to act again. He did so by telling the kirk session of each of the five churches which make up the North Arran Linkage some of his concerns. Again without anything being said in public.

Only now with the unanimous support of the congregations of Brodick, Corrie, Lochranza, Pirnmill and Shiskine has Mr Adamson gone public and, even before the petitions are sent to the council, it is time for the authorities to act.

This matter must be independently investigated as a matter of urgency.

The people of Arran have a great love for and affinity with Montrose House.

For the sake of the residents and everyone involved with the care home, that cannot be allowed to be diminished.

Appraisal of the facts

Much of the recent publicity has been concerned with the effects on Ardrossan if the Arran service was relocated to Troon, but it is worth keeping in mind that the issue of service unreliability is what affects the economy of the island (pop app. 5,000).

No-one is disputing the convenience of onward travel from Ardrossan, but it is of little advantage when the ferry cannot access the port. We are all familiar with the announcement 'the ferry will depart for Ardrossan but berthing is not guaranteed and if unable to berth it will return to Brodick'.

Contrary to what has been stated elsewhere, Troon, unlike Ardrossan, has a north facing harbour entrance which is sheltered from the prevailing southerlies giving relatively easy access when the same conditions make Ardrossan difficult. For those who require 'evidence' this is the case, I strongly recommend that on the next occasion when the ferry is stormbound in Brodick with a southerly gale, they should visit Troon to see for themselves: i.e. for those not stranded on Arran.

The ferry journey to Troon would be longer, but could be reduced by faster ferries, and a shuttle bus is required to the sheltered station which has a more frequent service to Glasgow.

The advantage in service reliability to the island could be considerable, both in terms of avoiding unnecessary overnight stays and making tourist winter breaks more attractive.

The obvious alternative is to carry out major civil

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to Ardrossan harbour safer in southerlies and enable the other advantages of the port to be realised. New ferries will not affect the position, we have been that way before! Unless this is done. Ardrossan will remain unsuitable for reliable year round car ferry services and the advantages from investment in new ferries and Brodick terminal will have little effect on reliability.

The on-shore facilities proposed for Troon are unlikely to cost as much as the necessary civil works to Ardrossan, so the overall outlay would be less. It may well be harbour dues would also be less. What are the present annual payments for Ardrossan? The direct employment situation for Ardrossan terminal staff need not change if personnel transport was provided to Troon. It would be a welcome change to have an appraisal of the facts, with the emphasis on the needs of the island rather than misleading information and 'knee jerk' reactions.

Keeping to schedule

A lot has been said this last few weeks about the service, lack of service or just about anything else current with our main ferry.

Some readers may remember my letter in August about the bus to meet the last boat one evening left prior to arrival of the ferry. I contacted both CalMac and Stagecoach as to why this had happened and the reply from Stagecoach was that they were informed by a member of CalMac's staff that the ferry was 40 minutes late and as they're con-

minutes before sending the buses out on their scheduled routes the decision was to instruct their drivers to leave. Fair enough. I was also informed there was a shortage of drivers that evening so it wasn't possible to run extra buses later, Again fair enough.

The reason CalMac gave for the ferry being late was 'weather conditions and volume of traffic'. I contacted CalMac asking them why, if foot passengers had to be onboard 10 minutes before sailing, were car drivers exempt, as obviously, if the ferry was running 40 minutes late because of volume of traffic, this 10-minute rule was out **option** the window. Yes, the Isle of Arran was sheltering in I have lived on Arran for six Troon, poor old girl was poorly and not allowed out in anything stronger than a zephre, hence the volume of traffic and the weather being to blame. I hope the ship repairers in Aberdeen have sorted that problem out or it's going to be a right miserable couple of weeks next year when 'Calamity Isles' is in for her annual docking.

But I digress, one of my comments to CalMac was sailing to schedule, car drivers have to be available for loading 30 minutes prior to sailing and personally think that the Chief Officer and his team do a sterling job of loading in the 10 to 15 minutes allowed for loading. Any car, booked or unbooked should not be allowed to board after the scheduled departure time, this would make drivers pull their fingers out and follow instructions. CalMac were a little slow when 16 unbooked cars were left behind when there was space for them (see photo on page 2 of last week's Banner), they quoted 'human er-





Fundraising is a continuous issue for the Duke of



During the month there were plenty of interesting birds to enjoy. Around 100 species were recorded. October is arguably the busiest birding month, as summer breeders depart, migrants pass through, winter visitors arrive and there is always a strong chance of something unusual.

The build-up of the number of winter thrushes, fieldfare and redwing was a feature of the month. There were widespread reports of the birds feasting on autumn berries, with flocks in the hundreds being reported in the north and in the south of the island including 1,300 fieldfare and 300 redwing in Sliddery on October 29.

Trumpeting

Skeins of migratory geese and swans in their distinctive 'V' flying formation were also a feature, including, again on October 29, 14 whooper swan over Kilpatrick and Shiskine, 22 whooper swan over High Kildonan, 30 pink-footed geese over Sliddery and 32 greylag geese over Kilmory, their honking and trumpeting calls filling the autumn skies.

Other sightings indicating migration was in full flow included: 40 turnstone in Silver Sands on 2nd, six dunlin in Blackwaterfoot on

October was the driest 6th, a bar-tailed godwit in yellowhammer in Sliddery on 10th, 162 golden plovon 16th, 300 skylark over Sliddery also on 16th, 25 twite in Kildonan on 19th, 30 goldfinch in Auchenhew on 21st, and 100 teal and

100 starling in Cosyden on 28th. Familiar birds were being reported in numbers that would suggest birds moving out of cold northern Europe to the milder climes of our island, including 100 chaffinch on Cleat Shore on 1st, eight dunnock in Sliddery on 19th, 12 coal tit in Balmichael on 21st, 70 robin in Auchenhew also on 21st and 10 blackbird in Sliddery on 25th.

There were some 'last sightings' of summer visitors also moving south including: a whinchat on Cleats Shore on 1st, a sandwich tern in Whiting Bay on 4th, 100 gannet off Pirnmill on 5th, a chiffchaff in Auchenhew on 21st, a lesser black-backed gull in Lochranza on 23rd, a wheatear in Kilmory on 24th and a swallow in Sliddery on 28th.

Winter visitors arriving included: three brambling in Sliddery on 19th, 127 rook in Kilmory on 28th, 60 wigeon at Cosyden also on 28th, a male blackcap in Lochranza on 31st and two


Finally, on Monday October 31, there was a report of a sooty shearwater four nautical miles south of Pladda in the afternoon. This species is a long distance migrant breeding on islands in the South Atlantic and South Pacific. It is a rare vagrant to Arran. The last record was 2009. The observer's report has been submitted to the appropriate rarities committee, the official adjudicator of rare bird records in the west of Scotland.


Arran city shop
