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Petition lodged in demand for Montrose House probe

Council say they will 'respond fully' to concerns raised

More than 750 people have signed a petition calling for an independent inquiry to be held at the Montrose House care home in Brod-

A paper petition launched by the Church of Scotland collected 538 signatures in less than a month, while an online protest attracted 218 signatures before being sent to North Ayrshire Council chief executive Elma Murray, who is in overall charge of the home.

It follows a long-running saga surrounding the treatment of five long-serving members of staff which has been rumbling on for most of the year. Three have now been sacked, a fourth is appealing demotion and a fifth remains suspended. The petition calls for an inquiry into the dismissals, and why it has taken so long for the disciplinary process to be completed, to be independently investigated by a many well-loved staff mempanel of councillors.

last week's meeting of Arran Community Council, where Shiskine representative Marilyn Woods urged the council to get involved. She said people had asked: 'What is the point of you? So she said: 'Let's support people on the island.'

ble earlier would have been good. Many more people have stopped me and praised me for speaking up for those affected and the interest in the wellbeing of Montrose House is huge, showing it is very, very important to the people of Arran and very dear to their hearts.

A North Ayrshire Council spokesman said: 'We respect the right of people to sign this petition and voice any concerns they may have. We are reviewing the letter and petition and will respond fully.

'We expect the services delivered from Montrose House to be at least at the same standard as the mainland and it was clear that this was not the case. Arran is positioning itself as a world-class island and it is important our public services are also of the highest possible standard.

'Our disciplinary procedures are robust and thorough and, while not discussing any individual specifically, we only take disciplinary action where it is absolutely required.

'As with all council operations and facilities, when changes are introduced, all members of staff are supported and kept fully informed throughout the process.

'We follow all the correct

HR and legal procedures and all employees affected are made aware that they have a right of appeal and of the process for pursuing any appeal.

'We would like to reassure local people that the needs of our service users are of paramount importance to us and that the best possible quality of care is provided to meet these needs. We always put our service users' interests first. They are at the heart of every decision we make.

'Our ambition for Mon-

trose House and Stronach Day Care Centre is to ensure our residents benefit from care and support targeted at and tailored to their specific needs and preferences.

'The Care Inspectorate visited the centre in October 2014 and again in September 2015 and it was clear from their detailed inspections that the high standards expected of us were not being met. We were not providing the level of service and care we should have.

'When we appointed our new management team to take over Montrose House earlier this year, we set out our priorities to allow the facility to fulfil its potential. It was clear that strong leadership and a fresh approach were needed if we wanted to transform the services offered within Montrose House, underpinned by modern, robust and up-to-date practices to match the high quality, fitfor-purpose accommodation the new facility offers.

'We believe we are now moving in the right direction and this would appear to be confirmed by the most recent Care Inspectorate report, following their unannounced inspection of Montrose House in September 2016.

'The report from that visit highlights the improvement in management and leadership at the facility. When they return in a few months' time, we are confident they will see further improvements that enhance the quality of life for residents.'

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Troon is right solution for no future, says ABP boss

The man in charge of the fight to take the ferry service to Troon has been on Arran to outline why it is the best option.

There can be little doubt to the commitment of Port of Troon manager Stuart Cresswell to the project: it is his passionate view that now and for the future. it would be the best solution for everyone.

Originally from Hampshire, he considers him-

self a naturalised Scotsman having come north when he was 10 and having lived in Prestwick for 33 years.

In a wide-ranging interview with the Banner, he told how he believed the switch to Troon was the best for the ferry service

He said the whole scheme was designed to dovetail with the arrival of the new Arran ferry in 2018 and in a

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bold statement insisted the ferry journey with the new boat would take just seven minutes longer than the present crossing, helped by a better berthing time.

And, even with a shuttle bus service to the station, he has produced figures to show that the journey time from Arran to Glasgow by ferry and train would be quicker from Troon given that it is on the main line. He said the town also had superb access to the A77/ M77 motorway and that Glasgow Prestwick Airport was only a short drive

He also criticised the political interference in the debate. He said: 'We are hugely disappointed this has become so politicised. We are port men trying to offer a solution to a technical issue and where Ardrossan are getting the figures for the number of job losses there would be, I just do not know.

Associated British Ports, which has invested £4 million in the ports of Ayr and Troon in the past three years, does not deny it is looking for new work. Mr Cresswell said: 'Despite what anyone says, the Port of Troon is one of the most sheltered harbours on the West Coast of Scotland and was until recently home to the P&O's Irish Sea ferry service to Larne. The recent closure of this route by P&O means that Troon's all-weather East Pier ferry berth is now available for use by another operator. It is as simple as that.

'Given the current operational challenges the Arran ferry service is facing at Ardrossan, and the fact that new larger vessels are already under construction

for this route, ABP believes that Troon can offer a genuine win/win solution for ferry users, CalMac and the Scottish Government.

'Furthermore, ABP believes this solution will not require any public sector capital funding. Indeed, ABP's offer to fully fund the construction of any required shoreside facilities is simply based on the operator paying a commercial rate for the use of the facility.'

Mr Cresswell also explained the East Pier was a 160m purpose-built RoRo ferry berth constructed in 2001. He said at present it could easily accommodate the new 120m Arran ferry being built but he also said allow future proofing the service for the future.

'It is entirely likely that in 20 years the next Arran ferry will be even bigger. Moving to Troon now not only makes perfect sense for the present, but offers safeguards now for the fu-

Petition tops 2,

The campaign to save the Ardrossan to Brodick ferry route is gathering pace with more than 2,000 people officially pledging their support in just over a week.

As of Monday 5 this week, 1,985 people have signed the letter digitally and another 314 people have signed paper copies.

Police probe complaint

'At this time the officers are not suspended, however they are not carrying out frontline duties.

Be aware of bin changes over the festive season

Households across Arran are set to receive vital information about changes to their usual waste collection days over the festive pe-

Collection days for blue and grey bins will alter for residents whose normal collection days would fall on December 26, 27 and 28.

Two days later

Changes will also be made to collections scheduled to take place on January 2, 3 and 4. The re-scheduled collections will take place two days later instead.

Residents whose normal collec-

tion days fall outwith these dates will be unaffected.

People are also being asked to note that collection times may vary over the festive period and are therefore urged to ensure their bin is out for 7am on the morning of their collection.

Adverse weather

If affected by adverse weather, the waste collection crews will return and uplift bins as soon as possible.

The Household Waste Recycling Centre (HWRC) in Brodick will also be closed on December 25, 26 and 27 and again on January 1, 2 and 3- but will be open as normal every other day.

Postcards outlining these changes along with other important information will be distributed to households next week.

Councillor Jim Montgomerie, cabinet member for place, said: 'We would like to thank residents for their continued support in our mission to reduce waste here in North Ayrshire. Through their great efforts to put the right stuff in the right bin, North Ayrshire is currently one of the leading local authority areas in Scotland when it comes to recycling.

Swept under the carpet

The people of Arran have spoken and made their voices very clear. They have put their names to paper to demand an inquiry at Montrose House.

But even with this weight of support we believe, sadly, that such an inquiry will never be held.

After months of saying virtually nothing, the council has this week issued a 430-word statement outlining their view of the situation at Montrose House. While the tone of it is, naturally, positive, it at least admits there have been problems at the home.

And while the council wants to move forward with assurances that things are getting better, it is 'what went wrong' that still needs to be addressed.

Families with parents and loved ones in Montrose House need more than glib assurances that they are getting the very best care possible.

Statements such as: 'We expect the services delivered from Montrose House to be at least at the same standard as the mainland and it was clear that this was not the case.' Why were they not and who was to blame?

The Care Inspectorate visited Montrose House in October 2014 and in September 2015 and the council says it was clear from its detailed inspections that the council was not providing the level of service and care it should have been. Eleven months is a long time for nothing to change.

So where do we go from here? The council says it respects the right of people to sign a petition and will 'respond fully'. But what will that response be? We believe it will be more of the same as it has said this week. There will be no inquiry offered. The council wants to sweep the past few months under the carpet with assurances about how 'HR and legal procedures' were followed to the letter during the disciplinary process.

What will be lacking is any sense of the personal trauma which has been caused to all those involved and which they must still be feeling. All the pledges that things are getting better don't take away the months of suffering some long-serving staff have endured.

A line may need to be drawn under this at some point for the home to settle back into its most important role of 'enhancing the quality of life of residents', but we don't think we've reached that point yet.

May I use the Banner to answer a question which has been frequently asked by visitors to our shop at Brodick Pier. The question, and I know it has also raised fears with my neighbouring businesses, is 'What's going to happen to you?' It's clear that we have lost all visible line-of-sight with those who use us most – the departing tourists.

Stage 5 of this project has identified the fears we've had and the promises from CMAL that their intention was to 'ensure a swift flow of foot and car traffic from the main road (and footbridge) to the new terminal building', according to their local manager. This is all very well, but no consideration whatsoever has been given to the businesses affected by this re-routing of traffic. We have now endured months of traffic nightmares, excessive noise and frustrated customers who now don't even know how to get to us once they've managed to find the dark side of the moon on which to park.

As for the future, it's not looking good for any of us while priority for this end of Brodick is seemingly entirely based on getting people inside this new structure. I have, for the record, asked CMAL's asset director to consider our request to lease the 'old' building but no decision on that will be made for another year, we have been told and, to be honest, some of the alternative ideas proposed have astonished me.

Needless to say, and perhaps as many would expect from Arran Graphics, we have not been idle after being forced to look at alternative arrangements.

Harbour views

I am a resident of Arran and I am very disappointed by the lack of impartiality being shown by politicians of all parties in the discussion about the mainland terminal for the Arran ferry.

Mainland towns see it as a boost to their economies. We see it as the only way we can get on and off the island. > The Arran ferry is not and should not be about the economy of a mainland port – whether Ardrossan or Troon. It should be about the safety and reliability of a service which is for all the people of Arran, its business and tourism.

> There seems to be some anecdotal evidence that Troon would be a more reliable haven in winter weather, but this could only be proven over a number of years of docking tests.

The question for Ardrossan, which has a proven record of unreliability over the years, is this: can the harbour be redesigned and protected so that large tall vessels can enter in adverse weather? If so, Peel Ports must step up and borrow money and, with government help, do it soon. If it a naval defence training is not possible, then Troon, or even Fairlie, which was a reliable harbour years ago. should be considered seriously.

The fact remains that a ferry is only good if it can sail and a terminal is only good if it can dock boats safely and reliably. To spend huge sums of money and have a beautiful ferry that cannot dock is simply mad.

Mr Randall told The Banner this week that he has now received an apology from the health secretary as to how his complaint was handled and an appointment at Crosshouse Hospital later this month.

'It may be all's well that ends well, but the situation should never have arisen in the first place,' he said.


