A new dawn for piping

Arran youngsters to get free tuition

Youngsters are to be given the chance to learn the pipes and drums free in the new year thanks to a £70,000 funding boost.

And it is hoped that enough youngsters will take up the challenge to allow a schools pipe band to be formed.

Primary and secondary pupils on Arran can now learn the pipes and drums in schools thanks to a new tuition programme funded by charitable donations and grants totalling £70,500.

The tuition programme was launched with a kick-start day, which gave all learners who signed up to

the project the opportunity to try pipes and drums for the first time. The day was led by appointed tutors Ross Miller and David Murray and a team of other specialists from around Scotland and was attended by 94 young people.

David Lambert, deputy head teacher at Arran High School, said: 'Arran has a rich musical heritage, as do all schools on the island. Whilst there are many opportunities on the island for young people to engage in a wide variety of music making, there was a need to provide formal tuition for our national instruments in schools and this exciting new programme offers exactly this and has removed

all barriers to access it with no cost to learners.'

James O'Neil, faculty leader of music at the school, said: 'This programme has been a year in the planning and I am delighted that it now sits alongside an already strong tuition programme within our schools. It is absolutely amazing to see the progress in learners already and we are so grateful to all organisations and donors who

have helped to make this happen.'

Mr Lambert added: 'We recently set up the Arran Music School to build on the instrumental provision already offered by North Ayrshire Council. The Isle of Arran Schools' Pipes and Drums' project will be managed through this, with the aim of removing all barriers and actively encouraging the young people of Arran to engage with

high quality music making and indeed the arts. The project is in partnership with the Isle of Arran Pipe Band which recognises the tremendous benefits for the young people, and welcomes a new generation of players who will be able to join the band in the future.

'As well as £30,000 in grant funding from the Scottish Schools Pipes and Drums Trust (SSPDT), we

Three-island ferry route link plan

A passenger ferry service linking Arran with Bute and Cumbrae could be up and running as early as the summer.

In a joint initiative tourist bosses on three islands have come up with the ferry link plan which they believe could benefit all of the islands. They are now in talks with a Bute firm which could provide a small vessel capable of carrying 12 passengers and six bikes.

VisitArran executive director Sheila Gilmore, who has been involved with the plan, said: 'We get loads of requests from visitors asking how they can get to Bute and Cumbrae. When we tell them they have to go via the mainland they are really surprised.'

Now a new venture, Clyde Islands Together, is bringing tourism organisations, including the Bute Alliance, VisitBute and the Cumbrae Community Development Company (CCDC), VisitArran and others together to discuss ways of collective working. They have already had

Continued from page one initial meetings with the next one planned for February when the ferry link plan, and how to fund it, will be high on the agenda. Highlands and Islands Enterprise is also involved in the hope it may provide marine investment to build up the route over the summer period.

Sheila told the *Banner*: 'The three islands may be

very different products but there is a lot we can share by working closer together and the plan for a small passenger ferry is only the first of what will be a growing number of joint initiatives.'

Certainly the work of VisitArran is admired in Bute and Cumbrae. In an interview Michael Bertram chairman of the CCDC said recently that

he believed there was an opportunity for the three islands to work together and improve tourism between each other. He added that he believed there was potential with sporting and leisure opportunities too: 'From folk festivals to ironman competitions, there is a lot that we can share and grow, so it is extremely exciting the opportunity of opening up the islands.'

Arran helps passengers stay safe on the ferries

Arran has been given a starring role as Caledonian MacBrayne gets creative with a new on-board safety video.

Safety chiefs were worried that passengers were simply switching off and ignoring the pre-recorded audio message, which is a legal requirement at the start of each journey. But despite its important content they were concerned it was largely being ignored.

Now the ferry operator has premiered a new innovative on-board safety video to try and better educate passengers on what to do in an emergency.

The three-minute film uses allegory and imagery of the scenery, occupations

and wildlife across Arran and the west coast to bring its safety message to life. All the 'actors' used were residents on Arran.

The video shows various groups kayaking, sailing and playing musical instruments as well as farmer Kenneth Bone herding sheep and Tim James smoking fish at Corrie, before he moved to Kintyre.

Information

'The message behind our safety announcement is a serious one, it is about giving passengers the information they need in the unlikely event of an emergency,' said CalMac's director of health, safety, quality and environment, Louis de Wolff.

'However, our research was telling us that passen-

gers weren't listening to the information being given to them over the tannoy, so we thought we needed other, more engaging ways of getting our safety message across.

'A safety announcement that meets the legal requirements is not fit for purpose unless people absorb and remember the information we want them to,' said Louis.

'By knowing clearly what to do in an emergency, there is a better chance of a successful outcome and a reduced chance of further accidents or injuries.

'Although the tone is fun and engaging, the message is of critical importance. By keeping passengers entertained we are keeping

them engaged and therefore more likely to take on-board what we are telling them.'

The video and audio messages have been recorded in English and Gaelic with the video also having sub-

titles. The new video and audio announcements will be rolled out across the fleet during 2018.





Brodick Castle named among ‘most haunted’

New research reveals that visitors believe that Brodick Castle is amongst the most likely castles to be haunted in Scotland.

Research by VisitScotland puts the castle in the top three haunted haunts with 12 per cent of the vote. It was only beaten Slains Castle in Peterhead with 22 per cent and the iconic Dunnottar Castle near Stonehaven at 19 per cent in the light hearted study.

However, the findings will not surprise those who believe the mysterious Grey Lady haunts Brodick Castle. Thought to be a servant girl dating from Cromwellian times, it is said that she had a love affair with the captain of the guard and became pregnant with his child but was then quickly dismissed from service at the castle. On hearing of their daughter's trouble, her own family disowned her. Beside herself and completely distraught, it was said she drowned herself at the Wine Port Quay by the entrance to the castle. Her ghost is said to haunt the servants' quarters of the castle.

Other sources think that the Grey Lady castle ghost was a woman who was locked in the dungeons with two other women and died of starvation. They were locked in the castle dungeons because they had the Black Death.

But visitors will have to

wait until next summer to find out for themselves when the castle reopens after lengthy fire prevention works which have overrun.

The VisitScotland research – which comes as the 2017 Year of History, Heritage and Archaeology comes to a close – also reveals that seven out of 10 people stated they would

like to stay overnight in a castle while on holiday in Scotland, despite the haunting fears, which is good news for the 147-plus castles that have been converted into hotels throughout the country.

In total, Scotland is thought to have around 3,000 standing castles, ruins and documented sites.

Of these, about 1,050 are merely sites, including those where a house has been built on the site of a previous castle and about 825 are standing ruins.

At the last count, 660 were in use (private house, hotel or wedding venue) and around 469 were open to the public, though some only for a couple of weeks.

Annique Armstrong, VisitScotland regional director, said: ‘Castles are an iconic and integral part of Scotland's history and culture. There is something unique and special about every single one of them and each has their own significant story to tell.

‘This research shows that Ayrshire and Arran has some of the best-loved castles in the country.

‘Scotland's history and culture is one the top reasons for visiting Scotland. From World Heritage Sites to ancient monuments, cultural traditions to our myths, stories and legends – the 2017 Year of History, Heritage and Archaeology has shone a spotlight on some of our greatest assets and icons as well as our hidden gems.

‘Everyone should have the opportunity to experience a Scottish castle in their lifetime, and with so many on their doorstep in Ayrshire and Arran, I would encourage residents and visitors alike to make it their mission.’



Coastal beauty is key to council tourism strategy

A wide-ranging and ambitious tourism blueprint has been drawn up to help North Ayrshire fulfill its potential as a major destination for visitors.

The newly-approved tourism action plan – called Making Waves in North Ayrshire – aims to utilise the area's coastal beauty as a key element in the strategy.

The four-year plan, covering 2018-2022, will provide a particular focus on promoting the marine and coastal tourism availa-

ble along North Ayrshire's mainland coast and islands – with Arran a central part of the strategy.

Councillor Alex Gallagher, cabinet member for economy, said: 'Marine and coastal tourism is key to North Ayrshire and already directly supports thousands of local jobs.'

'Our coastal communities have been a major destination for visitors to North Ayrshire and we believe they can play an even bigger role over the coming years with the right support.'

'Alongside the islands of Arran and Cumbrae, we have a coastline few can match and this action plan

aims to lay the foundations on how we develop

our tourism offering in the years to come.'

Tourism is an important sector in the North Ayrshire economy, employing the full-time equivalent of about 3,650 people, with more than 1.6 million tourists visiting the area annually.

The industry is worth around £175 million each year to North Ayrshire's economy.

Following consultation with key industry representatives, the new action plan lays out key strategies to develop over the coming years; a focus on the coast as the key asset for attracting visitors; devel-

oping a cluster of marine, tourist and commercial activities linked to the potential expansion of maritime infrastructure and local regeneration; increasing the economic and social benefits from the visitor economy through a series of events and festivals.

The action plan has been developed following consultation with local people in North Ayrshire, as well as bodies such as neighbouring councils, the Scottish Government, North Ayrshire tourism industry group, Scottish Enterprise, Scottish Tourism Alliance, Visit Scotland and Third Sector partners.

Volunteer is home after 'changing lives' in Ghana

An Arran volunteer flew 4,000 miles home for Christmas and the New Year after helping to improve the lives of people with disabilities in Sandema in the Upper East region of Ghana.

Natalie Innes from Lochranza has just completed a three-month stint in West Africa and is talking about her experiences to encourage other young Scots to get involved.

The 22-year-old former Arran High School pupil has been working as part of a team of young British and Ghanaian volunteers on a project to promote inclusions for those with disabilities in mainstream education and society in general.

The World Health Organisation estimates that 15 per cent of the world's population lives with a disability, with 80 per cent of those people living in developing countries.

In rural Ghana, many disabled people struggle to access basic healthcare, and are often excluded from education – a situation which leaves them more acutely affected by poverty, and less equipped to escape it.

Natalie and her team mates have been working with rights-based development charity International Service and its partner organisation Community Based Rehabilitation (CBR). CBR works to break the cycle of poverty and empower people with disabilities to work with local leaders to create inclusive, accessible and healthy communities.

Natalie has seen first-hand the need for attention to be drawn to these issues. She and her team have been working with CBR to reach out to the community via radio, and through youth clubs to dispel some of the misconceptions about disability, especially mental health issues.

Natalie, who travelled to Ghana through the International Citizen Service, (ICS) programme, fund-

ed by UK Aid, said: 'The proudest moment for me was seeing the impact we'd had on young people. During youth clubs, students were able to state facts about mental health and use the correct terminology. We still have many battles ahead but we are ready to fight. Everyone deserves an equal place in society.'

Natalie, who spent six months as a teacher in Thailand before travelling to Ghana, spent Christmas with her family on Arran before deciding on her next venture for the New Year.

'I am just pleased to have my daughter home for Christmas,' mum Kirsty added.

ICS volunteers work alongside young local volunteers in some of the poorest communities in Africa, Asia and Latin America on issues like sexual health, education and economic empowerment. Volunteers don't need cash, skills or qualifications to take part – just the ambition to make a difference. For more information about ICS and how to apply, visit <http://www.volunteers.org/>



MP in call to protect gift card shoppers

Consumers are currently being short-changed

A call has been made for the UK government to act to protect shoppers from being short-changed by millions of pounds in lost gift card cash, by North Ayrshire and Arran MP Patricia Gibson.

Those purchasing gift cards, or receiving them as presents, are currently losing out to the tune of millions of pounds as vouchers expire before they are used – with shops profiting from ‘money for nothing’.

Mrs Gibson, who is the SNP spokeswoman on consumer affairs, has urged the UK government to in-

roduce greater protections for consumers by banning use-by-dates altogether, or at the very least introducing a minimum five-year expiry period, fairer terms and conditions and rules to ensure that any funds not used by the expiry date go to charity rather than profit.

The UK Gift Card and Voucher Association estimates the UK gift card market to be worth around £6billion a year, with around £300million going unspent.

Mrs Gibson said: ‘No-body wants to see the hard-earned cash they spend on

presents for friends and family members thrown down the drain but consumers in the UK are currently being short-changed to the tune of millions of pounds every year in lost gift card money.

‘Retailers are profiting by taking away people’s Christmas and birthday presents when gift cards pass these wholly arbitrary expiry dates. The minimum period, and policies, for gift cards can vary dramatically from shop to shop - some have very short or hidden expiry periods. Many people wind up losing their

money because the cards expire or a firm closes and the retailers then take the funds for themselves.

‘With families now facing rising prices, stagnant wages and squeezed living standards under the Tories. As the Scottish Parliament has no powers in this area, it is important that the UK Government introduces protections. This means either a full ban on gift card expiry dates or, at the very least, a minimum expiry period of five years or more, and rules to ensure that any leftover funds go to charity rather than profit.’

Putting young people first is new council plan

North Ayrshire Council has reaffirmed its commitment to young people with the official launch of its Year of Young People (YoYP) 2018 plan.

The plan aims to inspire all ages through its young people, aged eight to 26, by celebrating their achievements, valuing their contributions and creating new opportunities for them to shine.

In North Ayrshire, this will be done through a year-long programme of events and activities that will give young people the opportunity to show what they are made of.

Activities include 'joint cabinet live' which will bring together young people from all over North Ayrshire via a live video link, to interact with the council's cabinet members on the issues faced by young people living in the area.

Then there's a special YoYP Participatory Budgeting exercise that will see those aged eight-26 voting on projects, either organised by or for the benefit

of young people, that they want to see happen during 2018. The winning bids will receive up to £1,000 to help deliver their project.

And in March, Saltcoats will play host to the 65th sitting of the Scottish Youth Parliament. The annual event and national awards ceremony will be attended by people from across Scotland.

At the launch, council leader Joe Cullinane announced plans to develop a YoYP working group, to be jointly chaired by an elected member and a young person. The group will ensure that what matters the most to young people is discussed during the year, and that there is a real legacy left from the work that will be taking place.

The event brought together council officials and its partners including Police Scotland and Scottish Fire and Rescue to hear all about the plan as well as signing up as a YoYP partner.

They were also introduced to North Ayrshire's

11 YoYP ambassadors who have been selected to help raise awareness of the year and galvanise support from their peers.

Emily Nix, one of the YoYP ambassadors, said: 'As a YoYP Ambassador, I look forward to the year ahead. We will have the opportunity to showcase the talents, personalities and ambitions of North Ayrshire's young people, bring communities together and show what we can do – and we can't wait to show that.'

Councillor Cullinane added: 'The Year of Young People provides us with a unique opportunity to celebrate North Ayrshire's young people by shining the spotlight on the tremendous work they do, the important roles they play and the positive impact they have on our communities.'

'Our YoYP plan outlines our commitment as a local authority to our young people during this important year. And with the development of a dedicated YoYP working group, I'm sure 2018 will leave a last-


