Pylon renewal hub ' be good for Mid Argyll'

passing on the A83 cannot fail to have noticed the huge site south of Lochgilphead, clearly being readied for something big.

And the Kilmory site's owner believes its ultimate use will provide a huge lift to Lochgilphead and wider Mid Argyll.

The three-and-a-half acre plot will be used as the main equipment storage depot for a multi-million pound project by Scottish and Southern Electricity Networks (SSEN) Transmission to upgrade the Inveraray-Crossaig electricity supply line.

Work on the first phase is expected to begin in the next few months.

Owner MacLeod Construction Ltd will rent the site - plus another in Kilmorv Industrial Estate - to main contractor Balfour Beatty for the duration of the project.

Kenny MacLeod, managing director of MacLeod

Construction Ltd, is excited at the prospect for the region, and told the Argyllshire Advertiser: 'There is a lot going on,' he said, 'and it's time

we told folk what's going on.' 'We are carrying out work

to prepare the two sites for Balfour Beatty,' explained Mr MacLeod. 'It's not a big

money spinner for us, but we are looking to the future.'

He added: 'This can only lift the whole area. It will definitely be a good thing

for Lochgilphead and for the shops and businesses with all the people who will be working on the job.'

The site is part of the

'Kilmory Park' masterplan approved in 2016 - a joint venture between MacLeod Construction, Argyll and Bute Council and Highlands and Islands Enterprise - and temporary planning permission has been granted for use as a storage depot.

The second area, in Kilmory Industrial Estate, is serviced and will be used for a complex of around 40 site office units plus a staff gym, and this is almost complete.

A spokesperson for Balfour Beatty said: 'As part of our contract to deliver overhead line works on behalf of SSEN Transmission, we will require office and storage spaces for equipment. The Lochgilphead depot sites will be used for these purposes.

the 'During the two-year contract, the Balfour Beatty team will engage with the local community through educational school outreach as well as supporting the local supply chain and businesses.'

Drink driving allegation

At around 6.10am on Tuesday October 8, on the A83 near the Corran roundabout Lochgilphead, a man, aged 52, was arrested for allegedly driving a vehicle while under the influence of alcohol. The man was charged with the offence and released to appear at court at a later date.

Failure to obey red light

Police stopped a car on the A83 at around 11.50am on Tuesday October 8, as the driver, a 52-year-old man, allegedly failed to obey the red traffic light at Aray Bridge, Inveraray. The man was charged and a report will be submitted to the procurator fiscal.

Dangerous driving

On Wednesday October 9 at around 8.40am, a white articulated lorry was reported to have been driven in a dangerous manner while carrying out an overtake manoeuvre, on the Lochgilphead to Tarbert road (A83) near Stronachullin. Police are investigating the incident and are appealing for any witnesses or anyone with any information to contact them.

Chef banned over Invergarry smash

A chef whose driving caused a smash that hospitalised the passenger of another car near Invergarry on February 11 was banned from driving for seven months and handed a £720 fine when he appeared at Fort William Sheriff Court last week.

Gordon Angus McNeill, 41, of 24 Cara View, Tayinloan, Tarbert, pleaded guilty to the charge of careless driving, which took place near where the A87 Kyle to Invergarry road joins the A82.

McNeill had just completed a morning shift as part of some agency work at a hotel on Skye and was heading home when the accident occurred at 2pm.

The court heard that McNeill's Jaguar had been negotiating a sweeping left-hand bend and had drifted into the middle of the road outside Invergarry.

Procurator fiscal Martina Eastwood said: 'McNeill's car was straddling the centre double white line as it met the Hilux and showed no sign of changing course. The driver of the Hilux had to take evasive manoeuvres to try to avoid a collision.'

The Jaguar and the Hilux then collided, with McNeill's vehicle coming to rest on the verge.

'Both airbags in the Hilux deployed and, while its driver was uninjured, the passenger was taken to Raigmore Hospital and treated for a fractured sternum,' added Mrs Eastwood.

Sheriff Eilidh MacDonald heard Mrs Eastwood explain that the driver and passenger of the Hilux had got out of their vehicle and spoken to McNeill, who had apologised and explained he might have fallen asleep at the wheel.

Defence agent Hamish Melrose told the court there was no suggestion McNeill had been driving at excessive speed at the time of the accident but that he did allow his vehicle to cross over onto the opposing carriageway.

He apologised and accepted responsibility.

'He's not really sure how this came about and said as a way of explanation that he may have fallen asleep – but it is not necessarily the case that he did fall asleep. That was just his first reaction at the scene of the accident,' said Mr Melrose.

Mr Melrose said McNeill, who is single, had been working on Skye for six months as an agency chef at the time of the accident.

'He has no previous convictions and has never had any endorsements on his driving licence in more than 20 years of driving, and I am asking My Lady to take that into account in any sentencing.'

Mr Melrose also told Sheriff MacDonald that McNeill needed his licence to drive to work every day as his commute was 24 miles.

He currently works as an executive head chef at a hotel in Machrihanish.

But Sheriff MacDonald told McNeill it was a very serious matter: 'You are lucky more significant injuries did not occur, although an injury did occur which was significant and frightening,' she said.

'It is incomprehensible to me that you could not explain how your car strayed onto the opposing carriageway.

I therefore have no alternative but to impose a period of disqualification. You will be disqualified for a period of seven months and I impose a fine of £720.'

complete the depot entrance to the A83, and Mr MacLeod expects this to be ready in the next few weeks. He said: 'As soon as we get the entrance completed, Balfour Beatty want to move in.'

The existing line of pylons was installed in the 1950s and has reached the end of its operational life. The new line, which will initially operate at 132kV, will have the capacity to be upgraded to 275kV in the future, providing

additional capacity to cope with increases in electricity demand and renewable electricity generation.

Construction will be split into two phases, with the first from Inveraray to Port Ann, scheduled to begin in the coming months and expected to be complete towards the end of 2021. The second phase, from Port Ann to Crossaig, is expected to start in 2021 and be completed by summer 2024.

SSEN lead project manager

Ian Clark said: 'We are delighted to see Balfour Beatty's depot sites in Lochgilphead taking shape, marking the start of phase one of the project.

'With Balfour Beatty, we are now looking forward to working closely with communities, interested parties and the local supply chain throughout the construction phase, and as a responsible developer, we will do everything we can to keep disruption to an absolute minimum.'

'No easy options' as council to save £9M

Argyll and Bute Council will have to make savings estimated at £9.2 million in 2020/21.

Council leader Aileen Morton said: 'There are no easy options left for making more savings. We've delivered £57 million in savings since 2010, we've had the third highest cut in funding of all of Scotland's councils in recent years and estimates show we will have to deliver another £9.2 million of savings next year.

'The scale of the savings potentially required means that all options open to councils must be explored and identified, including some of the most valued services – the services which, if things were different, we would like to protect and grow.

'The majority of the council's funding comes from the Scottish Government. As we don't expect to know until January next year exactly how much funding this council will get for next year, we have to identify as many savings options as possible just now so we can deliver a balanced budget in February.

'We recently secured a rural growth deal of £50 million for Argyll and Bute.

'While this is great news, this one-off funding cannot be used to bridge gaps in

our budget; it must be used to deliver specific economic development objectives to be agreed with the UK and Scottish Governments.

Protect

Depute council leader and policy lead for strategic finance Gary Mulvaney added: 'Delivering more savings will mean focusing on duties and growth: we must protect the services all councils have a duty to provide, and we must achieve the population and economic growth Argyll and Bute depends on to grow a successful future.

'A number of options open to the council to take are outlined in the reports. More must be found before the council meets to set its budget in February, and our officers will continue to explore where further savings could be found.

'The views and ideas of our communities have helped us set our budget in previous years and are especially welcome when the decisions to be made are as difficult as those that will be needed to balance our budget in 2020.'

Reports that set out the challenge faced were considered at a full council meeting yesterday (October 17) and, if agreed, a consultation will be run, asking residents for their views on service priorities.

Man sentenced following sexual abuse of children

A 53-year-old man has been given a life sentence for sexually abusing children in Argyll and Bute.

William Rigby was sentenced at Glasgow High Court on Tuesday October 15.

Rigby pled guilty in March 2019 to sexually abusing three girls in Helensburgh. The offences took place in 2018 and between 2005-2007. The girls were aged four, six

and 11 years old when the offences began.

Detective Inspector Steve Martin, of the Public Protection Unit, said: 'The abuse displayed by Rigby towards his victims was horrific and some of the worst my officers have seen.

'I want to praise the courage and strength shown by all of the victims. The account of the youngest victim led us to two other victims and the arrest of William Rigby.

'If you or anyone you know has been a victim of abuse or wishes to report abuse, you should feel confident in reporting to Police Scotland.

'We would ask anyone who has concerns or information about any person who may pose a risk to children or who may have abused a child to contact us on 101.'

Council organised flood risk prevention public consultations

The third in a series of public consultation dropin events is being held at Lochgilphead Community Education Centre, on Tuesday October 22 as part of Argyll and Bute Council's local flood risk management plan, writes Rachel Carruthers.

The event is an opportunity for informal discussion around the potential short-list of sustainable flood defence solutions that have been identified, as well as a chance to share local flood knowledge.

Flood

Representatives from the council and flood defence experts will be there to answer questions.

The event comprises 'drop-in' sessions from 5-7pm and 7.30-8pm to allow informal discussion around the potential options.

Between 7pm and 7.30pm there will be a presentation to present the findings of the options appraisal, which

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Russell reveals mental

health report

With World Mental Health Day as his platform, Argyll and Bute MSP Michael Russell published the analysis report from his recent mental health survey.

The survey, which ran through June to August, received 349 responses with Mr Russell's constituents sharing their views on the current mental health services in Argyll and Bute.

Respondents of all ages and backgrounds, including service users, staff, family and friends of service users and volunteers, took the time to complete the survey.

A main concern raised by the survey was access to mental health services, with only 29.02 per cent agreeing they found it 'easy to access' services.

Comments regarding this indicated that most service users are referred by their

GP but there could be an improvement in signposting to online resources for lower level cases, in the hope of reducing waiting times.

Waiting times was by far the biggest concern of respondents, followed by the need for additional staff and support for current staff.

Respondents were also given the opportunity to suggest ways services could improve, with suggestions including developing local hubs for peer support; increasing counselling services and increasing crisis services and out-of-hours care.


Before publication the report was discussed and explored at a meeting with Scottish Government cabinet secretary for health and sport Jeane Freeman MSP and a number of representatives from Argyll's mental health services

Mr Russell said: 'I am pleased to present my analysis report of the mental health in Argyll and Bute survey, especially as it is World Mental Health Day.

'This was an instrumental part of our meeting with Jeane Freeman last week which led to a mutual feeling that the concern expressed about mental health services in Argyll and Bute has to be heard and ensuring the best possible support is available is now the objective of all involved.

'It is crucial that mental health is given the same attitude and care as physical health and as it is a day of awareness it is a great opportunity to reflect on this.'

Additionally, there has also been an increase in the number of members of the public and community groups coming forward to register their property for filming, which enables the council to offer a fantastic range of unique locations for projects.





Argyll residents are warned of pension scam

Argyll and Bute Citizens Advice Bureau (ABCAB) is warning that scammers are actively targeting people with pension savings across Scotland.

Most commonly 'cold-calling' potential victims, the scammers offer free pension reviews, promises of better returns and early cash release from your pension as a hook.

Their objective is to persuade savers to transfer their pension funds into unregulated investment schemes.

Penalties

Victims can expect to pay very high, unsolicited fees and tax penalties or simply see their savings disappear with little or no chance of redress.

Claudia Albrecht, Pension Wise guidance specialist at ABCAB, says: 'We are aware of a number of instances of these scams being reported by individuals across the region, so it's important to make people aware of the risk.

'Scammers are very persuasive, suggesting that they are experts doing you a 'good turn'.

'Typically they offer free

reviews and early access to your pension cash. In fact, many of these people are not registered with the Financial Conduct Authority and are promoting very high-risk, unregulated schemes, often with overseas investments unsuitable for most savers.

'Stay safe. The best thing



is to put the phone down. Remember, since the law changed in January this year, no legitimate firm can 'cold call' you about your pension. So if this happens to you, whoever is calling you is acting illegally and is in all likelihood a scammer.

'If you believe that you are a victim of a scam you should contact your pensions provider immediately and report it to Action Fraud on 0300 123 2040. If you wish to report

a concern about a potential scam, contact The Pensions Advisory Service on 0800 011 3797. It's important to report these calls when they do happen because the authorities may be able to prevent them potentially conning someone else.'



In January 2020, Mid Argyll charity ZamScotEd's school in Zambia will open the fourth and final classroom block – but help is needed to complete the project.

The classroom at St Columba's will be for Grade 12 pupils – the equivalent of S5/6 – and for the first time since the project began, pupils will graduate from the school with their equivalent of Highers.

Since the school opened with just one classroom block in January 2016, children in Zambia, who otherwise would not have been able to access secondary education, have been moving up through the school. This new block will give those who started back then the status of senior students heading for a bright future.

Nearing completion, the classroom block still needs desks, white boards, some textbooks, and all the furnishings essential to any classroom. The gas also needs to be connected up to the bunsen burners in the science lab.

A crowdfunding page has been launched in hope of raising the necessary funds, with a target of £6,000 to be reached in 28 days.

Crowdfunding

ZamScotEd founder Marian Pallister said: 'We have wonderful support in Mid Argyll, but our crowdfunding project will hopefully reach out to the wider community and help us give those youngsters moving up to Grade 12 the classrooms they need and deserve.

'We are hugely grateful to everyone for all their help.

'We will go on paying the fees of the Mthunzi children and other vulnerable kids identified by head teacher Sr Veronica Nyoni, but this



project for desks and other fixtures and fittings will mean our first Grade 12 pupils will have the chance to work towards their big exams as they should – and local carpenters will also benefit from the jobs this is creating for them.'

The charity has been

supporting the education of children in Zambia since the 1990s through the Mthunzi Children's Programme, giving them the opportunity to attend secondary schools around the country. It was quickly realised how many other children living around the Mthunzi centre were unable to go to secondary school, and that is when the idea of building a school was born.

Generous

With the help of Mission Scotland and Spanish organisations, as well as generous individuals and trusts, things have moved rapidly for the charity.



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

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

The flood studies will assess the flood risks and identify long term, sustainable and achievable mitigation measures which can be implemented to manage the flood risk (including climate change) and reduce the flooding impacts on each of the three priority areas, their environment and economy – whilst at the same time considering opportunities for associated benefits to the local communities such as enhanced water quality, landscape, and amenity value as well as improved biodiversity.

Both events are the third and final event and will detail the the flood study works to date. This will be in the form of a formal presentation and drop in session. The public events will help inform resilience of the communities to flood risk.

MacKinnon's pure gold as he takes third Mull win

It was worth the wait. Three years on from the last Beatson's Building Supplies Mull Rally and 50 years on from the first, the Hebridean island once again echoed to the sound of 150 rally cars competing along some of the world's most entertaining roads.

And for the first time since new legislation was passed in Scotland earlier this year, the roads were closed by Argyll and Bute Council.

For competitors and fans, absence has undoubtedly made the heart grow fonder. In August, 53 minutes after entries opened for the first Beatson's Building Supplies Mull Rally since 2016, two things happened – the list, including reserves, 174 in total – was full and the event's website melted.

Not long after, there wasn't a bed to be had on the island during rally week. Once again, this Tobermory-based event doubled the population of the island and generated revenue measured in the millions of pounds.

Clerk of the course Andy Jardine said: 'At the start of the year, when we were working really hard with Argyll and Bute Council, Police Scotland and EventScotland to put our plans together, we didn't know if the change in legislation would get through Parliament in time.

'Holyrood didn't let us down and the people who came here demonstrated why that legislation is so, so important.

'Just for a moment, let's put the rally aside and take a walk through the town. It's packed. It's not the school holidays, the summer's gone and it's raining. The hotels are full, restaurants are doing a roaring trade and the chip van's working overtime.

'And everyone's smiling. Or they would be if they weren't asleep! Three years has been too long without this rally. Like we said before the start, autumn's normal again. It's been amazing.

'I have to say a huge, huge thanks firstly to the volunteers who have braved the elements through the nights to make this happen. They're the absolute troopers. We have to thank the competitors and the spectators for coming and joining us and, of course, Beatson's Building Supplies. We couldn't ask for a more enthusiastic sponsor for this rally.

'As' well as those guys, Police Scotland, Argyll and Bute Council and EventScotland who funded this year's Mull Rally as part of VisitScotland's directorate have been absolutely brilliant. The golden anniversary of

this rally will live long in the memory.'

Motorsport UK chairman David Richards returned to the island in rally week for the first time since co-driving in a Ford Lotus Cortina in 1975.

'It's been a great event,' said David. 'I wanted to come up here after we've spent quite a lot of time and effort helping the Scottish Government on the closed-road legislation and the results have been fantastic.

'To see so many volunteers, so many marshals putting so much time and effort in is great. And, of course, the organising team led by Andy [Jardine] and Iain [Campbell] who came directly up here from Wales Rally GB last week is tremendous.'

Event sponsor John Marshall was another man smiling come the early hours of Sunday morning in Tobermory. The owner of Beatson's Building Supplies, who placed his Ford Fiesta R5 ninth overall, said: 'This has been an incredibly tough event and I have to thank the car for getting me here, but I absolutely love this place, this island and this rally.

'The 50th anniversary of the Mull Rally is a really special one and for Beatson's Building Supplies to be sponsoring it at such a milestone event, well that's pretty special for me.'

Local star Paul MacKinnon (Ford Fiesta R5) celebrated his third victory on the Beatson's Building Supplies Mull Rally in the early hours of Sunday morning, taking a comprehensive win from Lancastrian Mini John Cooper Works WRC driver Daniel Harper.

MacKinnon led the 17-stage, 148-mile event from start to finish, belying his lack of time in the car and early set-up issues to clinch a 0:01:41 win.

'That's fantastic,' beamed the winner at the finish. 'After the disappointment of 2016 [when he went off the road] and then having to wait for three years, this is just fantastic. The car's been great and I have to say Daniel [Harper] has driven really well. We really had to keep it all going this afternoon.

'But that last stage, jeez, I thought we'd seen everything, but that was an absolute nightmare.

'The conditions were atrocious. I couldn't see a thing in the fog, but I just feel so relieved and so chuffed to make it.

'The only downside is going back to work next week. Rally Mondays are such a come down after the adrenaline of the previous week. This amazing car will be gone, replaced by a bunch of bills and a big hangover. The only thing we can do is push on with the celebrations and make it a rally Tuesday!'

A Mull regular since 1993, Harper admitted he was happy with second after total brake failure through Ben

More and Scridain.

'I think it was a heavy landing that broke the brake pipe,' he said. 'But we came through two stages with nothing. We put the car back into road mode, but still trying to bring it through wasn't easy.

'The moment came on the Hill Road. We flew just a bit further than I thought we would over a crest. We were in the ditch for a good hundred yards after that. Look, I'm happy to get it home and we'll be back for more next year. I love this place.'

Ahead of the event, much of the talk was of who would win the Mk 2 Escort battle. Those honours went to David Bogie. The five-time Scottish Champion delivered an inch-perfect drive to score a maiden Mull podium with third.

Nine-time winner Calum

Duffy's hopes of top twowheel drive went out the window when he spun twice and stopped to change a puncture that was not punctured on the second run over Mishnish Lochs. He dropped more than two minutes, but recovered to finish fourth with a stunning final stage to edge Jonathan Mounsey's Mitsubishi Lancer Evo 6 by one second.

Eddie O'Donnell rounded out the top six in his Escort.

Stevie Irwin (Vauxhall Nova) and Mark Constantine (Opel Corsa) were the class winners outside of the top 10.

Beatson's Building Supplies Mull Rally...loving live World Rally Championship reporter Colin Clark spearheaded an all-new initiative for this year's Beatson's Building Supplies Mull Rally, delivering coverage of the rally via Facebook Live to hundreds of thousands of fans around the world.

Clark said: 'It's been a genuine honour and privilege to work with such a committed and enthusiastic team. When we first talked about covering the event live, we did so sitting in a warm coffee shop looking at a map and fondly remembering full 4G.

'The reality was a wee bit different, but I have to say, I'm very, very proud of what we achieved on this event.

'To walk through Tobermory and have people coming up to you, shaking your hand and thanking you for what you've done for the event is astonishing and truly humbling.'

The reach of the Beatson's Building Supplies Mull Rally live shows have been huge, with people watching from as far afield as New Zealand, Dubai and Canada combining to generate more than 150,000 views.

Enduro series success for Kintyre riders

I mentioned that myself, David Muirhead and Alex Dickson had raced all the rounds of this year's mountain bike POC Scottish Enduro Series, and that we were due to race at Fort William in the season finale. That race took place over the course of last weekend, writes Simon Freeman.

The series featured five rounds at different venues, and each race was set up like a car rally, with untimed uphill transition stages leading to various timed downhill sections, the results of which were amalgamated into an overall race time. The stages varied massively in length, from as little as 90 seconds to an absolute behemoth we endured at Laggan in April which took us 16 minutes to ride! The topography and trail surface differed wildly from venue to venue but also from stage to stage, and the taped trails we raced down last weekend at Fort William epitomised this eclectic set-up.

So how did we do?

David was fastest of the three of us, as he has been all season. He finished in a time of 24 minutes, 42 seconds. He races in the Senior category (ages 19-29), so it is a tough school littered with sponsored riders and crazy kids. He finished 29th in seniors on the day, and 95th overall out of an entry of 255 riders.

Having failed to finish the race at Laggan earlier in the year due to a mechanical breakdown, David has been constantly playing catch-up but he still managed to finish in a brilliant 22nd place overall in the seniors category for the season.

Alex has ridden consistently all year and has managed to tread the fine line between wrecking and ruling perfectly at every round. He had one of his very few crashes on the last stage at Fort William which cost him a few seconds, but he still returned a very respectable time of 25:58 to finish 32nd in the Masters category. The Masters section almost always attracts the largest entry and it is full of well-heeled chargers on very expensive steeds, so for Alex to finish in 37th place in that championship (180 names featured on that championship table!) in his first full season is a highly respectable result.

Puncture

I have continually been either on par or just slower than Alex on nearly every stage of the year, and nothing changed here. I know if I've kept within a few seconds of him I have done just fine, and I managed my ride to achieve this perfectly right up until the last stage where a cruel puncture right on top of the hill put paid to any chances of a good result to finish the year. With four top 10s already in the bag for the season though (a rider's four best results out of the five rounds count), I managed to hold onto fifth place in the Grand Veteran's championship which was some consolation for a day that finished with me feeling, well, a bit deflated.

Competing in this series has been a brilliant experience for us. We have had some hilarious times racing our bikes through some of Scotland's very best scenery, and we have loved camping out of the back of vans.

The organisers at No Fuss Events have done an outstanding job of setting up a professionally-run race series in some difficult locations and have always managed to tread the right side of a precarious line, providing us with stages that have been just barely on the rideable side of ridiculous!

Five-star show from Pupils on the road

Argyll derby match this weekend

Campbeltown Pupils stormed to a five-goal victory last Saturday away to SAFL stalwarts Carlton. A high-energy showing in Paisley saw the McFadyens-sponsored side run out convincing winners.

With the match going ahead at the Kibble's grass park despite the heavy rain overnight and during the week leading up to the game, the surface was in surprisingly good condition, allowing the Pupils to get into their attacking flow early on.

Up against a home side not lacking in height and physical stature, the Pupils had to be ready to contend with some lofted early balls from back to front by the hosts, whose game plan seemed to be to get the ball to their forwards as quickly as possible, but the Pupils' defence of Fraser Wylie, Ross Souden, Ryan McConnachie and Stuart Crossan stood up to the task

The Feathers Inn-sponsored Pupils' quick passing and individual pace and skill in the final third caused the hosts problems early on, and Ryan Gilchrist and Gregor McFadyen both had almost identical attempts to score, but snatched at their shots at the vital moment.

However, the Kintyre Park side would not be denied for

long, and scored after 16 minutes through a sharp passing move that released Gregor McFayden, who buried an arrowed shot from the edge of the box to continue his excellent goalscoring form.

The visitors then made it 2-0 after 25 minutes, when an enterprising move out of defence found right-back Crossan, whose ball through to Johnny McCormick allowed the right winger to cut inside onto his left foot and release a thunderous first-time drive into roof of the net for a great goal, his second of the season.

Pressure

After seeing their deficit doubled, Carlton for their part put their Kintyre visitors under a bit of pressure from several corners and free kicks, but the Pupils' defensive discipline continued to win over.

Înto the second half, the Pupils made it 3-0 when Donald McCallum scored another great goal, in a move started by Liam Renton, whose in-swinging corner was cleared to the edge of the penalty box where the ex-Dumbarton man McCallum made space to drive a deflected shot into the top corner of the net.

At this point in the match, all three subs were used, with Ellis Robertson and Michael McKinlay replacing the excellent deep-lying midfield pairing of Ryan Gilchrist and Liam Renton, and Ross Brown entering in the fray

in a direct swap with winger McCormick. The youngster Brown quickly got involved to create the Pupils' fourth goal, outpacing the Carlton full-back to draw out the last defender and square the ball across for Scott Souden to cheekily chip it over the home keeper into the net.

The rampant Pupils completed the scoring in the 85th minute after hesitation between a Carlton defender and his keeper allowed McFadyen to nip in, touch the ball round the keeper to score a simple but well-earned second goal, for his brace on the day and his fourth of the season.

At the other end, the Pupils were determined to keep their second consecutive clean sheet in league action, and while young keeper Alistair Ferguson spilled a deflected free kick in the latter stages, he bravely dived at the feet of the striker to smother his effort.

The Pupils' management noted how Ferguson's kicking and distribution was first-class throughout the match.

A Pupils spokesman said: 'It was a great team effort, with our attacking players working together to cause problems all game. At the back, we defended high balls and direct play really well.'

The Pupils are on league action again on Saturday when they welcome Argyll rivals Lochgilphead Red Star. Kick-off is 2pm, with Kintyre Park the expected venue.
