Make room for the MOJO movers

This year's MOJO Argyll was a night to remember for the audience and organisers. Six original, unsigned acts took to the stage on Saturday October 19 and quickly had the crowd on their feet. Inveraray and District Pipe Band's drumming inspiration has beaten all-comers to win his ninth world solo drumming title in a row – and his 10th overall.

In reaching this milestone, Steven McWhirter beat his own record of adult world titles, raising the bar even higher for all aspiring snare drummers.

He achieved the accolade at the annual Andantesponsored World Solo Drumming Championships at Glasgow Caledonian University, where 154 snare drummers and 59 tenor drummers gathered from all over the world to compete.

Steven, lead drummer with Inveraray and District Pipe Band, was accompanied in his sets by fellow band member and piper Daniel McDermott from the Isle of Bute.

His 10th adult world title comes after previous wins in 2006 and a further nine consecutive titles from 2011. At the championships, or-

ganised by the Royal Scottish Pipe Band Association, musicians were tested in two events; March, Strathspey and Reel (MSR) and Hornpipe and Jig, with the highest aggregate scorer winning the title. Steven won this year's contest by 16 points, coming first in both.

Second place again went to Gareth McLees, Field Marshal Montgomery, with Michael McKenna, St Laurence O'Toole, Eire, finishing in third place.

His victory means Steven has completed a rare quadruple success, also winning the World Pipe Band Championship, the Grade 1 Drum Corps Champion of Champions and the Grade 1 pipe band Champion of Champions during 2019 with Inveraray and District.

'I feel very privileged to have both of these amazing trophies in the same year,' said 36-year-old Steven.

Writing on social media he said: 'Thank you to all who messaged over the past couple of days. It's very much appreciated. Massive thanks to my wife Gracie for her unwavering patience and support.'

Also taking part in the championships, held on Saturday October 19, was snare drummer Tom Monaghan of novice juvenile Dunoon Grammar School Pipe Band. Tom, competing for the first time at the event, won his qualification heat and finished 11th overall.

Optimism in the face of council cuts

Cautious hope has been expressed that further Scottish Government funding may mean fewer service cuts at Argyll and Bute Council.

The authority's leader. Councillor Aileen Morton, is seeking information on the impact a push by the Convention of Scottish Local Authorities (COSLA) for an increase in council grants by inflation plus three per cent would make.

Head of strategic finance Kirsty Flanagan stated the council could be left in a surplus position if that was to happen.

She said the authority could net an extra £9 million based on the mid-range forecast budget scenario, but was unsure of whether the extra funding would happen to the fullest extent.

COSLA intimated at its gathering in St Andrews on Friday October 11 that it would request to Holyrood



that budgets have a minimum uplift of inflation plus three per cent.

A minute from that meeting read: 'This ask will therefore be pursued vigorously in the negotiations with the Scottish Government.'

Councillor Morton asked the question at the meeting of the council's policy and resources committee six days later.

She said: 'Leaders have unanimously agreed that they have a budget ask of the Scottish Government that budgets have a minimum that is with a three per cent increase.

'There are a number of things we would need to consider as to whether that would actually happen here.

'There are a couple of elements which could negatively impact on us, although I am not sure of the value of them.

Conditions

'If we did get additional funding, we need to be mindful that it may not all be direct funding. If there was an increase of three per cent, it may well come with conditions.

'An extra three per cent could make £9 million worth of difference, but it is very difficult to identify what the impact would be in Argyll and Bute.'

Councillor Morton then said: 'There are a number of options which are unpalatable, and still a gap to be identified, but we have to lobby the Scottish Government for funding to protect these services.

'But we must also agree a balanced budget in February.

It was agreed to recommend to the full council later that day that the request by COSLA to the Scottish Government should be endorsed.

The third in a series of public consultation events was held this week in Lochgilphead and Tarbert as part of Argyll and Bute Council's flood risk management plan.

The events, on October 22 October 23, allowed members of the public to hear and discuss potential plans to help prevent flooding.

Representatives from the council and flood defence experts answered questions and delivered a presentation discussing the results of their findings, explaining the chosen solution for each area.

In Lochgilphead, experts are recommending Property Flood Protection (PFP) to protect individual properties from flooding through flow

entryways such as doors and windows, brickwork and sewage systems.

Properties are adapted to better withstand flooding with measures including lifting of electrical sockets and flood-proof paint and flooring.

In Tarbert, it is thought a combination of permanent and demountable direct defences would be a preferred option. This would involve a permanent low wall with a demountable wall on top. The defence would tie in with high ground on either side of the harbour, totalling 515m of defence. Flood gates would be required to provide access to slipways and to provide vehicle access to the seaward side

of the harbour. PFP could also be employed as part of a formal scheme to protect isolated properties that are not protected as part of the direct defence option.

Public feedback will help inform the final phase of each flood study to identify a preferred flood scheme solution which may then be presented for consideration to the Scottish Environment Protection Agency and the Scottish Government.

will come from the council's Tarbert and Lochgilphead Regeneration Scheme, set up almost three and a half years ago, with a further recent boost of £200,000 through the Scottish Government's Town Centre Fund.

Submission of the planning application comes after

He added: 'After a number

of years of doubt and frustration, we see the results and are looking forward to being involved when the main contractor is announced.

'Credit to the council which put an extra sum of money from the small town fund to the kitty. Our thanks go to the efforts of our three councillors who have been a great help in the development.

Councillor Sandy Taylor expressed frustration at the length of time it has taken to get moving, but said he was 'delighted to welcome this key achievement in our community-shaped' project. 'It is difficult to wait for something which we all want today,' added Councillor Taylor, 'but it will be worth waiting for and will provide a great uplift for everyone in

Mid Argyll.' Fellow Mid Argyll Councillor Dougie Philand also welcomed the news, saying: 'This is a major step forward for the town and, when completed, it will make Lochgilphead a place to stop and spend time.

'Thanks must go to the community council which has been active to bring the plans to fruition and I hope Lochgilphead residents will be proud of the changes.'

Having previously expressed support for the project, Councillor Donnie MacMillan, a member of the planning committee, declined to comment at this stage.

If the plans are approved, it is hoped tenders will go out in December, with work expected to begin by March 2020.



Sir,

I refer to the news Argyll and Bute Council's education department is proposing to make 14 pupil support workers redundant as part of next year's council budget.

This proposal to save £198,500, an average salary of £14,130 per employee, can be summed up in one word – madness.

I am not an education expert, but from 1995 until 2017, when I was councillor, I became aware in the budget process each year that councillors are presented with what are called savings options. For instance, I see the estimate is a funding gap of $\pounds 9.2$ million, so I would assume around $\pounds 12$ million worth of savings will be put forward so that the most alarming proposals will be removed.

The Tory, Lib Dem and independent administration, which has a 21-15 majority, will decide the fate of the 14 pupil support workers in question.

I would hope that by the time this letter is published the lunacy of the proposal to remove these 14 key people will be stopped in its tracks.

In my 22 years as an Argyll and Bute councillor, I witnessed many foolish budget proposals but this one is totally crazy.

It must be ceased because, if implemented, it will result in 14 excellent people losing their jobs and put immense pressure on those staff left behind.

for this. I was really just wanting to capture the view on such a beautiful day but then spotted him standing there, looking out to Jura, and thought it made for a more interesting image.'



The Scottish Wildlife Trust and Royal Zoological Society of Scotland are hosting a public event to give an update on the Scottish Beavers Reinforcement Project, writes Rachel Carruthers.

Members of the public will be able to meet with project staff at the Cairnbaan Hotel on Monday October 28, at 6pm to find out more about the second year of work to reinforce Mid Argyll's beaver population and have their questions answered by the team. Over the past two years, the project has introduced a number of adult beavers from Tayside into Knapdale Forest to bolster the population released during the Scottish Beaver Trial.

All animals were screened by qualified vets prior to release to ensure they were healthy and disease-free.

Surveys this autumn have confirmed beavers released in the first year of the project have successfully bred and given birth to kits. The reinforcement project is led by Scottish Beavers, a partnership between the Royal Zoological Society of Scotland and the Scottish

Wildlife Trust created to continue the work of the Scottish Beaver Trial. It is taking place on land managed by Forest Commission Scotland and has been licensed by Scottish Natural Heritage, which is also coordinating the monitoring requirements at the site.







Golden year at Mull Rally

The weekend of the October 11 and 12 saw an important date in the national rally calendar – some may even say world calendar – re-instated with the long-awaited and greatly anticipated 50th running of the Mull Rally.

Insurance issues had caused the cancellation of the 2017 and 2018 rallies, while closed roads rallying in the UK went through a major transition.

Some 150 crews arrived in Tobermory from Thursday afternoon to get through scrutineering. Many of the cars that went through early were looking to get some last-minute seat time and set up opportunity at the Shakedown stage on the Friday morning.

Friday saw the remaining cars through the safety and noise checks and ready for the ceremonial start that evening in Tobermory. Among these excited, nervous, eager competitors were a number of Mid-Argyll residents. No debutants but some new partnerships and some rekindled teams. Innes Mochrie returned to the island with the Mighty Metro looking to continue his blistering form in the Mull Rally. The car is in constant development throughout the other 51 weeks of the year with other events entered around the UK all counted as prep for Mull.

This year saw a plea to the masses for a suitably qualified co-driver, as Innes's daughter, who has well and truly caught the rally bug, fell just short of the minimum age requirement. Lewis Griffiths travelled all the way from Wales to sit in the vacant hot seat for the world-famous event in the only-slightly-less-worldfamous Metro.

Next level

Also returning to the island with his newly rebuilt class B Peugeot 106 GTi was Duncan MacLean, once more teaming up with Ian Parker who has taken his co-driving to the next level, being one of this year's Motorsport UK Academy Co-Driver programme candidates.

Duncan and Ian were seeded 135 and again this gave

them ample opportunity to show higher seeded cars that the wee 106 was more than capable of getting around the tight and twisty roads of Mull just as quickly as the bigger, more powerful four-wheeldrive entrants.

Alister MacArthur finished building the M R Motorsport Talbot Sunbeam with about a week to spare, before he headed to the island to do some important recce with brand new co-driver Claire Tilley, a native of the island, who has competed in the event before but not in a tail happy Sunbeam.

The new livery looked great and Alister was well warned about rubbing chicanes before heading out on the stages.

The final Mid Argyll crew entered was the father-son partnership of Craig and Ross Callander. The pair hadn't been in the same car since 2015, on Mull, which they both insist is down to Craig working offshore and Ross being based in Aberdeen now but mum Audrey tells a different story.

Gathering dust

The tarmac car used in 2015 was not going to be ready and the Callanders were determined to compete in the extra special 50th running of the rally, so the gravel car, which has been gathering dust somewhat, was wheeled to the front of the workshop, mildly converted to tarmac spec and given a wash.

All four crews were happy to see daylight for leg two although the weather was still as changeable with heavy showers and even a few hailstones thrown in for good measure. Two short stages in the south of the island to start then a loop of three famous stages run twice in the afternoon.

Innes and Lewis continued to push hard but with some mechanical issues as the oil filter housing had become damaged in the previous night's efforts. Still making very quick progress across the island with Lewis possibly able to judge just how quick now that he could see the Mull countryside pass his window so swiftly. Leg two completed with no significant damage and now lying 46th overall, 16 seconds in front of a Focus WRC.

Duncan and Ian had a wee bit more adventure in the daylight with a half spin seeing the 106 lightened a wee bit, leaving the front bumper to be returned to service on its own. Perhaps fortunate not to damage the radiator, they carried on with the passenger headlight grimly holding on over the jumps on the hill road. Leg two finished in 76th overall, now sporting a yellow bumper. Ian's road car was spotted entirely intact earlier in the day – I'm not so sure it finished that way.

Alister and Claire really got the bit between their teeth and the times were significantly better that the previous night's efforts with only a few 'moments' in the car, causing no more than a bit of confusion and not just a bit of laughter.

Bridge

Claire lost the notes, not uncommon on bumpy fast stages and was urged by Alister to look for a bridge in the notes as they were approaching one, and then catch up form there. Craig and Ross, having taken a brave decision to switch to slick tyres all round, and gambling a little with the weather, were setting good times and pushing hard, maybe too hard in places, with Ross reminding Craig after a couple of very hard landings on the Ensay jumps that they were 'there for a finish'. Leg two completed in 77th place only 11 seconds behind Alister and Claire. All to play for in the final loop of stages in leg three later that night.

The final night stages in the Mull Rally are among the most atmospheric in Stage Rallying in the UK and further afield. The 'Big One' starts the proceedings with a 22 mile stage around Calgary bay and down Loch Tuath, testing both man, woman and machine in equal measures.
