Autistic Jamie 'feels rejected' by lack of **Argyll support**

Paying Remembrance respects

On a crisp autumn day, people across the region gathered to remember those who have fought, died and suffered in conflicts past and present. More on pages 8, 9, 10 and 11.

She continued: 'I met social workers recently and they told me there is nothing they can offer Jamie. I don't blame them, but the system is wrong.

'I have spoken to many local parents whose teenage autistic children have ended up in the same position, having to leave school early suffering from anxiety, isolation, depression and loneliness. There is no support for these young people, no opportunity to socialise, learn new experiences or get out of their situation.'

Since leaving school Jamie

Her ambition was to become



Mum's 20,000-mile trek for dementia research funding

Mum Karen Penny is striding out on a 20,000-mile walk around Britain and Ireland in aid of Alzheimer's Research UK.

Since setting off from her home in South Wales in January, the 54-year-old has already walked the entire coast of the island of Ireland, the whole of the Welsh coastal path, isles of Anglesey, Isle of Man and around 20 of the Scottish islands.

Karen, whose life is packed into a rucksack with the minimum essentials, including a tent and a clothes bag the size of a washbag, was inspired to take on the challenge following the loss of both her parents-in-law to Alzheimer's.

'Alzheimer's is a disease of the brain that can affect anyone at any age at any time. It can be cured, we just need to fund the research to find it.' she said.

'My mother-in-law Alma had vascular dementia and died within six months. Within one week of her funeral, my father-in-law, Kingsley, was ringing us asking where we were and what was for tea - repeatedly. He deteriorated to such an extent, mentally and physically, that ultimately he couldn't even recognise family members.

'There is very little government funding for Alzheimer's and that has to change. In the meantime, my mission is to keep funding coming in. Let's get Alzheimer's back on top of the research list.'

On Wednesday November 13, in her fifth pair of boots, reaching around the 5,000mile mark, Karen set off from Lochgilphead on day 300 of her mammoth mission that could take up to four years to complete.

From Lochgilphead, Karen was headed first for Crinan, before looping back and heading to Kilmartin along Moine Mhòr, to spend the night. The plan was to then set out for Kilmelford on Thursday and Oban on Friday (today) where she will enjoy her first day off in five months and join the Parkrun on Saturday.

Karen commented on the generosity and kindness she has experienced since she began the challenge. 'Everyone has been so kind. It's incredibly uplifting. People just let you into their homes and their lives. It's the amazing support I have which keeps me going.

Lindsay Caulfield, of Lochgilphead, generously

gave up her bed on Tuesday night, giving Karen the opportunity for some well deserved relaxation and a night out of the cold before the next stint of her adventure and Ali and Calvin Elliott offered moral support as they joined Karen as she set out on Wednesday morning.

Karen will be the first woman to complete the challenge and commented on how she is coping. 'I take every day as it comes. If I let the enormity of it all come into my mind, if I think about how long I really am going to be away from home and my family, I know I will struggle.

You have to look at it daily and be flexible. I try not to worry about where I'll be

staying the next night or how far I still have to go. I've slept in bird hides to deserted castles. I'm eating 11-day old bread and green cheese one night, then the next I'm staying with Lord and Lady Vesty on Jura. It's that extreme and you just have to take it in your stride,' she added.

Karen has already raised more than £46,000 of her £100,000 target and has since been made a Champion of Alzheimer's Research UK in recognition of her incredible fundraising and tireless dedication raising awareness of dementia.

Suspended Tory claims he has been 'set-up'

Suspended Conservative councillor Alastair Redman claims he has been set up.

The Kintyre and Islands councillor for Argyll and Bute was one of 25 members suspended from the Tory party earlier this week over claims of Islamophobic and other prejudicial social media posts.

He says he has been targeted because he is such an 'active' councillor and 'strong' Conservative and claims the naming and shaming scenario has been 'engineered' to distract from Labour's own woes in the run up to next month's general election.

'This has been timed to coincide with the general election and has been engineered to take away some of the attention from Labour's anti-semitism crisis.

'Being in politics, you will always get accusations made 'I am 100 per cent confident I will be completely exonerated.

against you. This is happening to me because I'm a very active councillor and a strong Conservative,' he said.

'I'm still in the party, it's a suspension - it's not permanent.

'I'm looking forward to being re-admitted.

'The party has a duty to look into this and I support them fully in that. I am 100 per cent confident I will be completely exonerated. I still support the Conservatives wholeheartedly and will be voting Conservative in the next election.

'I have campaigned alongside Muslims, Jews and Christians, and I judge all people as individuals. My constituents know that I'm not prejudiced.

'The investigation will be wrapped up in an orderly fashion and the party will take all the time it needs to do that,' he added. Councillor Redman said he

'had no idea' what the claim was against him.

'I have not been told,' he said.

Argyll and Bute Conservative leader Gary Mulvaney confirmed Redman had Councillor been suspended from the Conservatives and from the Argyll and Bute Council's Conservative group and its administration.

An Argyll and Bute spokesperson said: 'This is a political matter arising from a complaint made to the Conservative Party and, as such, the council has no comment to make.

The 25 suspensions, involving serving and ex-Conservative councillors, follows a dossier containing names that was produced by an anonymous Twitter user and handed to the Conservative party.

Jenny added: 'Argyll and Bute Council produced an autism strategy document a few years ago. They haven't implemented any of it.'

Responsibility for autism services in the region now lies with Argyll and Bute Health and Social Care Partnership (HSCP). A spokeswomen for the HSCP said: 'Due to patient confidentiality, it would not be appropriate for us to comment in any detail on individual cases. However, we can confirm we were in touch with the family last week and have offered to meet with them to look into whether there are any options of support that may be available.'

In response to questions put to him by The Argyllshire Advertiser in October 2019, Argyll and Bute Council policy lead for health and social care, Councillor Kieron Green, said: 'For our young people with autism, co-ordination between the HSCP

Children's and Families Service and Argyll and Bute Council Education allows for the best possible support as they grow and develop.'

Deadline day for election candidates

As the Argyllshire Advertiser went to press, three candidates for the Argyll and Bute constituency seat had been announced for the 2019 general election.

Argyll and Bute Council's depute leader Councillor Gary Mulvaney has been confirmed as the area's Conservative Party candidate, while Councillor Alan Reid will stand for the Liberal Democrats and Brendan O'Hara for the SNP.

The UK is set to go to the polls on Thursday December 12

Councillor Mulvaney, а council member since 2003, was the Conservative candidate for the most recent general election in 2017, finishing second to Mr O'Hara.

Councillor Mulvaney said: 'I am delighted to say I have

been selected. 'No-one really expected a Christmas election but here it is. We are here to campaign and we are here to win.

'We were 1,300 votes short last time. This time we are going to win it but we will need every single Unionist vote to do it.

'We will be focusing on things like getting Brexit done. Everyone is tired of it. They want to get it done and move on. We want to send a clear, really clear message to

Nicola [Sturgeon] that we do not want a second [Scottish independence] referendum.

'And we want to concentrate on people's priorities schools, hospitals, crime, law and order, all things that are really important.'

Councillor Reid's selection by the area's Liberal Democrats was announced in April, though the date of the poll was unknown at that point. At that time, he said: 'The Scottish Liberal Democrats are the only

party committed to keeping Scotland in both the UK and in Europe. The local surveys we have been carrying out in Argyll and Bute show overwhelming support for a people's vote.'

Mr O'Hara, who was unanimously backed by SNP members in the constituency as their candidate in September, said at the time of his nomination: 'When the general election comes, we in Scotland must be able to choose our own future.

'And that choice will be either as an independent, democratic European nation or as part of an isolationist United Kingdom led by a right-wing Conservative government.

'Here in Argyll and Bute, this election will be a straight fight between the SNP and Boris Johnson's Tories. It will also be a fight for Scotland's future.'

The general election will be the first to take place in December since 1923. Parliament was officially

dissolved on Wednesday November 6. The deadline for candidates to be nominated and submit their papers was Thursday November 14.

Taking Cairnbaan road junction risk seriously

Sir,

I concur wholeheartedly with Rev Mackenzie's concerns, The Argyllshire Advertiser, November 1, about the dangers surrounding the Cairnbaan road junction with the A816.

I had to make representations to the council about road signs being covered by vegetation last year.

I travel through this junction most days of the week, often several times per day. Those of us familiar with it know full well to treat it with respect and to be particularly careful when coming away from Cairnbaan towards Lochgilphead.

Like Rev Mackenzie, I am aware of a number of accidents there over the past 12 months. I would estimate at least five, if not more. This is a hugely disproportionate amount compared with other junctions on this road. That fact alone should ring alarm bells with the roads authority.

This, however, is not the be-all-and-end-all. I have personally witnessed more near misses at the junction than I would care to mention. The problem comes particularly, but not exclusively, during the height of the tourist season with drivers who are not familiar with the area.

Rev Mackenzie quite rightly points out there is a deceptive vista that appears to make the road look like a long straight one and despite the presence of warning signs, for some reason, these are ignored. I thought it rather a trite response from Argyll and Bute Council, which is effectively saying the junction meets all legal requirements sign wise and motorists need to be more aware. It is effectively shrugging its shoulders about the reality of the situation and refusing to take the constant presence of risk seriously. It really does need someone to come up with a genuine solution that will eliminate these risks as far as humanly possible and hopefully curtail the number of incidents that will inevitably occur in future if nothing positive is done.

Beware of deer crossing roads as winter sets in

From October to December, deer are more likely to be on the road as they move down to lower ground to find food and shelter.

The majority of collisions take place in early evening through to midnight, with another peak from 6am to 9am. Particularly in these peak times, we advise motorists to slow down and watch for deer crossing roads.

Deer can suddenly appear before you have time to brake.

If you do hit a deer, report it to the police, even if you are uninjured and your car is not

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damaged, as the deer may be fatally injured and suffering.

Try not to suddenly swerve to avoid hitting a deer. A collision into oncoming traffic would be even worse.

Only brake sharply and stop if there is no danger of being hit by following or oncoming traffic.

Be aware that more deer may cross after one or two you first see.

After dark, use full beam when there is no oncoming traffic to illuminate the eyes of deer – but dip your headlights when you see a deer or other animal on the road to avoid startling it.

Report any deer-vehicle collisions to the police, who will contact the person in the area who can best help with an injured deer at the roadside.

Do not approach an injured deer yourself as it may be dangerous.

Far though they be from the hills of their home ...

On a bright, frosty morning, people gathered to remember.

Autumn sunshine bathed town and village war memorials across Argyll as communities came together to commemorate all those who have fought and died in service of the country, in conflicts past and present.

The suffering and sacrifice, too, of those affected in any way by conflict were also in the thoughts of the people who came out on Sunday November 10.

In Lochgilphead, community representatives paraded to the war memorial along Argyll Street, led by Mid Argyll Pipe Band, and gathered to lay wreaths at a service conducted by Reverend Canon Simon MacKenzie of Christ Church Scottish Episcopal Church. World pipe band champions

Inveraray and District led the parade in the Royal Burgh. At the famous Inveraray War Memorial, recently-retired parish minister Rev Roderick Campbell conducted a service in which he pulled no punches about the changing nature of conflict – lest we forget.

Reverend David Carruthers led the Ardrishaig act of remembrance, with piper Iain Campbell playing the lament. In Tarbert, onlookers watched as representatives of 20 organisations, together with veterans, marched through the village, led by Loch Fyne Pipe Band. The

haunting melody of The Green Hills of Tyrol (A Scottish Soldier) led the parade up Lady Ileene Road to the monument. The formalities were led by Aggie Dennis, a Royal Navy veteran and now local Station Commander for Scottish Fire and Rescue.

Aggie introduced speakers from organisations including the Church of Scotland and Fishermen's Mission to address the parade before welcoming Tarbert Academy pupil Cerys Baird to recite In Flanders Fields.

The crowd fell silent as Kevin McKeavney marked the start of the two-minute silence with The Last Post. The stillness was broken by the mournful sound of the bagpipes as Loch Fyne Pipe Band's John Hunt played his tribute to the fallen.

Aggie said he had been 'extremely humbled' to see how many people came to the remembrance service.

He continued: 'Today was a day of reflection, for those who have gone before but also for those who continue to fight. While we hope never to go to war, we all owe a debt of honour to those who laid down their lives to ensure our freedom in two world wars and subsequent conflicts. It's also an opportunity to offer our heartfelt thanks to those who continue to serve their country in the current areas of conflict.'



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

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Lesley's Arctic adventure inspires art exhibition



'Seeing a polar bear on the second day of the trip was so exciting. A large male was standing looking at the ship from some distance. Then he disappeared and was spotted swimming between the ice even closer to us. To see him in this setting, at this poignant time with the threat of climate change, was so exhilarating, moving and captivating.

These are the words of Lochgilphead artist Lesley Burr, who recently spent 11 days on a unique journey as the 'artist in residence' aboard an exploration ship, the CV Resolute, in the Arctic Circle

The voyage included sightings of walrus, whales and polar bears, and has resulted in more than 70 sketches and watercolours which will form part of an exciting new exhibition in 2020/2021.

Lesley, 56, was chosen by The Friends of Scott Polar Research Institute to become this year's artist on board the South Baffin Explorer in the Canadian Arctic. The expedition begun at Iqaluit and took Lesley, the boat's crew and paying guests around Frobisher Bay, Walrus Island, Erik Cove, Digges Island and Kimmirut, a remote Inuit settlement and a former Hudson Bay Company station.

Lesley said: 'It was a truly inspirational trip. I saw five polar bears, two whales blowing and hundreds of thousands of seabirds.

'For an artist, one of the most remarkable sights was watching sea ice approaching, the colours and sounds of these stretches of ice. The residency allowed me to become immersed in nature and the landscape in a way which felt so intense and which so few people will ever get to experience, as the places we visited were so remote.'

The voyage was to witness wildlife, Inuit culture and nature.

'The Arctic north has long held a fascination for me and 10 years living in Shetland inspired me to use themes which interpret a connection with nature and life in the wild,' explained Lesley.

Other remarkable sights at Cape Dorset included seeing

Inuit carvings, drawings and prints at the renowned Kinngait studios and a walk to a Thule archaeological site to see Arctic plants and landscape was thrilling.

Lesley would be visited by passengers as she worked on her sketches and watercolours in a specially-created cabin studio.

Lesley said: 'It gave them an added dimension to their trip. Art is such a wonderful way of documenting such extraordinary sights.

'The colours I used for painting are tonally different than those I would use at home in Argyll,' she explained.

'Arctic colours are a myriad of blues, manganese, Prussian blues and turquoises, whites and vibrant pinks, with neutral colours all contained in the ice, and with light constantly changing. I've never felt so stimulated and challenged.

'One of the most memorable feelings is a sense of extraordinary space and peacefulness as the ship sails through and past the ice.

'You hear the thud, rhythm and vibration of ice against the hull of the ship and observe colour schemes that are surprising in intensity, unworldly and much more than just white.'

Lesley continued: 'Every alternate day I displayed new work in a glass display cabinet. On the last day, I ran an open studio event inviting guests to see the fruits of my labour.

The voyage resulted in 70 sketches in watercolour and mixed media and 10 larger paintings. Lesley also has a written diary and taken 500 photographs, including one of a polar bear stalking a walrus.

The paintings and notes are for creative research and she is now developing a new collection of paintings and prints to be exhibited at the Compass Art Gallery in Glasgow in 2020 and 2021. Lesley has also been invited to exhibit a painting at the Scott Polar Museum in Cambridge next year.

The experience, she says, has been the trip of a lifetime. 'This has fulfilled a dream to experience such a remote and mysterious place.

'It is fascinating and absorbing to understand more about the Arctic. But there was conflict too. I am increasingly aware of a deep sadness associated with the rapid melting of the sea ice, of the fragile landscape and unfathomable beauty where the elements and harsh environment form a unique wilderness on the brink of transformation.'

Lesley Burr's residency was supported by three organisations - The Friends of the Scott Polar Research Institute, One Ocean Expeditions and Bonham's auctioneers.



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Historic arches' facelift finished

A £200,000 renovation of Inveraray's Category A-listed Avenue Screen has been completed.

Scaffolding, which was first erected at the site in January, has been removed and the finishing touches have been made to the work, which saw the Avenue Screen's cement render removed and replaced with traditional lime render. Work was also carried out on the famous archway's gates.

Weather-proofing was also completed as part of Argyll and Bute Council's drive to protect Inveraray's stunning architectural appearance following previous major repair and conservation work to other buildings in the town.

The project represents further investment by the council in the town following the Inveraray Conservation Area Regeneration Scheme (CARS), which was successfully completed in 2018.

Policy lead for economic growth Councillor Alastair Redman said: 'The Avenue Screen is such a prominent part of Inveraray's landscape



Kilmartin Museum collection one of Scotland's top 50



Kilmartin Museum's prehistoric collection has been unveiled as the 50th Nationally Significant Collection in Scotland.

Scotland's Recognition Scheme celebrates, promotes and invests in Nationally Significant Collections beyond those held in national museums and galleries. The recognition scheme is

The prehistoric collection at Kilmartin Museum is a unique collection of fundamental importance to understanding Scotland's history.

Many of the museum's objects were discovered or excavated at the Neolithic and Bronze Age sites and monuments in Argyll's Kilmartin Glen, near the museum building.

The museum's setting in this landscape is important to the display of their collection, near the Upper Largie prehistoric site and overlooking an impressive cemetery of burial cairns.

To celebrate the 50th Nationally Significant Collection, chairman of the recognition committee, Dr Katie Stevenson, representatives from MGS and Kilmartin Museum staff and supporters attended the award announcement yesterday (Thursday November 14). The 50 Nationally Signifi-

The 50 Nationally Significant Collections stretch from Shetland to Dumfries and Galloway. Varied and vast in





the array of objects they contain, the collections reflect centuries of effort to preserve and interpret Scotland's past. Dr Stevenson said: 'The Kilmartin Museum prehistoric collection is a remarkable asset to understanding the importance of this period and of the area to the earliest centuries of settlement in what is now Scotland.

'The collection is wide-ranging and includes very early examples of 4,000-year-old decorated Beaker pottery and a hoard of 3,000-year-old Bronze Age metal weapons, which had been ceremonially placed in a bog on the Isle of Coll. Set in the context of its landscape, the prehistoric collection at Kilmartin Museum is a remarkable jewel in the crown of Scottish museum collections. It highlights the diverse range of objects that are in the care of Scotland's museums and the significance of them to understanding Scotland's history.'

history.' Dr Sharon Webb MBE, curator and director of Kilmartin Museum, said: 'We are thrilled Kilmartin Museum has received this recognition. The artefacts are well worthy of this status.

'Kilmartin Museum is soon to be transformed into a stateof-the-art visitor attraction and centre for archaeological learning. We are honoured our new galleries will open in 2022 with a Nationally Significant Collection as their centrepiece.'

Cafe Connect is open year-round on Saturday mornings between 10.30am and 12.30pm. Entry is free, though donations are welcome.











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Wellbeing and health at heart of communities

Speaking at a parliamentary reception on rural mental health in Holyrood, NFU Scotland's director of regions Teresa Dougall, pictured, spoke about an initiative in Dumfries and Galloway that has put health and wellbeing are at the heart of the farming community.

Working with farmers and the rural community for more than 25 years, she has seen and heard first-hand the difficulties farmers face in maintaining good health and wellbeing. They may work and live in a beautiful environment, but it can be lonely and isolating, and services others take for granted operate around working hours which do not suit those who are farming. Seeking to ensure that doors are always open, a Dumfries and Galloway initiative on rural health and wellbeing, which was launched on the union stand at Dumfries Show in 2017,

at Dumiries show in 2017, shows what can be achieved. Teresa writes: 'We know farmers don't like discussing

farmers don't like discussing their feelings. They don't like admitting anything is wrong. And they don't like asking for help. In addition, they don't like – or can't – take time away from work, which often merges with home life.'

The initiative has provided leaflets providing contacts for organisations which could assist in wellbeing and mental health; it lobbies for better connectivity in rural the community can access friends and family through social media or Facetime, and it provides opportunities for networking and socialising. The Farmers' and Farmers' Wives' Choir, with its roots in the south-west, performed at the parliamentary reception and is a great example of bringing people together to sing, talk or make friends. Meanwhile, the Retired Farmers' Group is going from strength to strength, providing monthly gatherings for retired farmers and agricultural workers. 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What is the Self-Build Loan Fund?

The Self Build Loan Fund (SBLF) is a Scottish Government initiative, providing a time limited fund (September 2018 to August 2021) to assist self builders where they have been unable to obtain mainstream self build mortgage finance. The fund is available Scotland wide to support additional housing provision across both rural and urban areas.

Eligible individuals can borrow up to £175,000, which they can draw down in staged payments similar to a traditional self build mortgage. Borrowers must provide a Professional Advisors Certificate at each stage of drawdown. The SBLF is designed to fund the construction phase of a new home, and once this is completed, the borrower will repay the loan either via a mainstream mortgage or by using the equity from the sale of their existing home.

The Scottish Government has appointed the Highlands Small Communities Housing Trust (HSCHT) to administer the SBLF on its behalf and the Self Build Loan Fund Officer responsible for this is Neil Walker who has 33 years experience in the banking and financial sector and is well placed to provide assistance and guidance.

Who can apply?

A key purpose of the fund is to create additional, new homes for permanent residency. To apply you need to meet the following criteria:

Demonstrate that you have been unable to obtain mainstream self-build mortgage finance for a new home (not a conversion or extension)

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- Have Full Planning Permission in place and be ready to apply for a Building Warrant
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Not ready to apply?

If you don't presently meet all of the criteria, or have any concerns please get in touch to discuss your case.


