

Health chiefs say 'sorry' for continuing Arran care crisis

Health chiefs this week said sorry as Arran's care crisis shows no signs of abating.

They admit they are struggling to cope with the level of demand for the care-at-home service for which there is a long waiting list.

A spokesman for the North Ayrshire Health and Social Care Partnership, which runs the service, said: 'Our sincere apologies for any distress being caused to people on Arran and their families due to delays being experienced in receiving care at home.'

MSP Arran Kenneth Gibson, who is fighting for improvements, said: 'On Arran, 34 per cent of the population is retired, compared to 22 per cent on the mainland and people are more spread out geographically, making it harder for teams to cover as many folk, so the problem is even more acute.'

One case highlighted to the Banner involves an 88-yearold dementia sufferer at the south end of the island who has had to wait months for improved care at home, which has now been partially

But her daughter told the Banner: 'My mother was getting two visits a day, but when her condition deteriorated I asked for more visits but was told that nobody was available. Consequently my sister, who is a single parent, has to do a 30-mile round trip every night together with her young children in order to ensure she gets the necessary medication.

'I have also applied for financial assistance for her care but unfortunately it seems that this will take months and even then will not be back dated.

'I understand there was a recruitment drive recently for carers on the island and from what I'm told there was a lot of interest shown and forms completed but no further action taken. The expression ticking the boxes comes to mind.

'From what I hear, my mother is not an isolated case on the island, the difference being the Scottish Government promised care for everyone over a certain

Support information to help with hearing loss

The charity Action on Hearing Loss Scotland will be hosting a series of information events to support people on Arran who have experienced hearing loss.

The four events will take place at the Cosy Room in the Brodick Co-op during July and August.

The first two events, which are taking place between 11.15am and 1.15pm on Monday July 1 and Monday July 8, will highlight how assistive technology such as amplified phones, flashing doorbells and personal listeners can make everyday life easier for deaf or hard of hearing people.

During the following two sessions, between 11.15am and 1.15pm on Monday August 5 and 12, information will be provided about social security support which people who have hearing

loss could qualify for. NHS hearing aid users can also take the opportunity to get their hearing aids cleaned or re-tubed and pick up batteries from the charity's trained community hearing support service volunteers.

Action on Hearing Loss Scotland's Fiona Goodwin said: 'During our upcoming events, we want to demonstrate to Arran residents the everyday benefits which NHS hearing aids and assistive technology can bring for people who have been diagnosed with hearing loss, as well as ensure that they are fully aware of social security support which they can apply for.'

New supplier set to turn off 24-hour street lights

Council chiefs say they will have to bring in another outsourced supplier before they can finally turn off the street lights on Arran.

Extensive repairs to correct a network fault across North Ayrshire that has left street lights illuminated for 24 hours a day have still not been completed on the island despite the situation continuing for nearly three months.

The Banner first highlighted the situation in April, when the issue had already been on-going for a month. Then North Ayrshire Council officials said that their contractor hoped to have the problem resolved 'in the next few weeks'.

The problem was said to be due to a fault on the central management system that controls and monitors the performance of the street



lighting, which is managed by an external contractor for the council.

The remote switching fault left officials having to either leave the lighting permanently switched on, or switched off, which, they said, would 'not be in the interests of public safety'.

To rectify the situation teams of repairmen were having to be dispatched to each area affected to manually remedy the automation, they claimed. Now, however, the council has admitted that a new supplier is being brought in to resolve the issue.

A council spokeswoman said: 'We are making good progress correcting the issue, which affected LED street lighting on the mainland, Arran and Cumbrae.

'Some of Arran's lighting has already been restored around Corrie and Blackwaterfoot. We anticipate that our discussions Street lights in a residential Brodick street which have been permanently lit for three months. 01 B25lights01

with a new service provider will conclude shortly to allow corrective action to then be taken almost immediately thereafter to restore the rest of the lighting.'

While acknowledging that the situation has resulted in wasted energy, council representatives are keen to point out that street lighting is not metered and that energy costs are billed based on an inventory of units, which means that the same bill will be paid regardless of the hours that the lights have been left switched on.

age which clearly is not happening.'

Mr Gibson took up the case with the Health and Social Care Partnership and in a reply director Stephen Brown admitted recruitment on Arran was 'problematic' for several partnership services, including the care at home service.

However, he added: 'Over the last few months there have been a number of different initiatives within care at home on Arran to attract new recruits into the service. Fortunately, this has had a positive impact and there are some new staff due to commence in the coming weeks. There is another local recruitment event taking place soon, so it is hoped that this will also result in some further new recruits joining the team. This will create new capacity and allow the care at home manager to commence provision for individuals waiting on services.

Mr Gibson told the Banner: 'The new £5.7 million Montrose House provided more modern facilities for residential care and there is also Cooriedoon. The issues relate more to older people being cared for in their own home.

'As the population ages and increases in proportion to the working population, it becomes increasingly difficult to recruit the number of caring staff required.

'Despite this, North Ayrshire Health and Social Care Partnership – with NAC and NHS Ayrshire and Arran working together – is committed to providing the best care and support it can for those vulnerable and elderly folk on Arran who need it. I am in constant communication with them regarding instances where there are issues to resolve.'

A spokesman for the partnership said: 'While we are unable to comment on individual cases, we are really

very sorry for any delay that people experience in accessing care-at-home support.

'Regrettably, our care-athome service continues to have a waiting list for services on Arran. The waiting list is reviewed on a daily basis by senior partnership staff to ensure that all available capacity is used to support people appropriately on

'Additionally, the service receives a high volume of referrals each day, and the requests on Arran are far greater than the capacity available.

'We are continually recruiting for care at home staff on Arran to help meet the on-island demand. Please be assured that senior partnership staff continue to review new referrals and waiting lists on a daily basis.'

Joanne, who replaces Keri Russell, has lived on Arran for six years and has 22 years' police service. Originally from the south side of Glasgow her previous

posting was with L division, based in Lochgilphead. She served as a secondee on Arran in 2013 and 2014.

Appeal launched to save the Waverley

An appeal to raise £2.3 million has been launched to return the Waverley to service in 2020, ensuring that a unique piece of Britain's maritime heritage stays alive.

The Waverley is a regular visitor to Arran during the summer months, but the 2019 season was cancelled last month following the discovery of major problems with the ship's 20-year old boilers. Since then, individuals have started to respond with more than £100,000 already donated. The Waverley Facebook page recorded more than a million hits when the news broke.

'We're heartened by the support so far — it's clear that huge numbers of people around Britain and around the world want to see Waverley sail again,' said Paul Semple, who heads the team which operates the ship.

'But the financial challenge which faces Waverley remains very significant, and we urgently need more funds to let us place the orders and then carry out the work over the next nine months.'

The sheer scale of what is required has been likened to a kind of marine 'open heart surgery'. The iconic red, white and black twin funnels will be lifted off, and large sections of decking removed to allow the boilers and other equipment to be lifted out. The replacements are expected to extend Waverley's operational life by a further 20 to 25 years.

The Waverley company has taken recent weeks to make a detailed and costed plan, and now it is all about raising the funds to make it happen.

'There's a real determination not to allow Waverley to become a static relic. She was built to sail and that's what so many people want to see again. Waverley's truly unique status as the world's last seagoing paddle steamer mustn't be taken for granted. Not for the first time, the future of the ship hangs in the balance. Once again, it's time to save the Waverley,' Mr Semple added.



Pensioners betrayed over withdrawal of free TV licences

An MP has slammed the UK government in the Commons over its treatment of pensioners, as the BBC announced it will withdraw free TV licences for over-75s unless they are in receipt of Pension Credit, writes Hugh Boag.

All households with someone aged over 75 are currently entitled to receive a free TV licence, funded by the UK government, to help tackle pensioner poverty and isolation. Despite a 2017 manifesto pledge to continue this, the Tories have cut this funding completely, pushing the decision and costs on whether to maintain it onto the BBC.

The £745 million annual cost of maintaining the status quo would take a fifth of the BBC's budget – its own proposal will cost £250 million a year, requiring cuts but no channel closures.

Following the announcement, North Ayrshire and Arran MP Patricia Gibson challenged Secretary of State Jeremy Wright MP, asking if he was comfortable that people in their 80s and 90s could potentially be prosecuted for being unable to afford to watch television. He failed to answer.

Speaking after the exchange, Mrs Gibson said: 'This announcement was entirely predictable after the UK government passed on responsibility to the BBC, breaking a manifesto commitment to protect

all pensioner benefits. The BBC is a broadcaster. Public welfare is not its remit and it should not have to decide on what is a UK government responsibility. It is despicable that the Tories have abandoned our pensioners and left the BBC to take the blame.

'Now, 5,100 elderly people in my constituency alone will have to pay £154.50 for their TV licences, 72 per cent of whom currently qualify for a free one. Many older people who qualify for Pension Credit do not claim it and the criteria for qualifying is being tightened.'

'Whether it is victimising disabled and vulnerable people on benefits, ignoring the plight of 1950s-born women who had their pension age raised with little or no notice, or reducing eligibility for pension credits, one wonders just how low this Tory government can go.

'Our pensioners deserve better, but it is clear the Tories will not honour their manifesto commitments to older people. Given recent promises made by their leadership hopefuls, it doesn't seem likely a change in prime minister will make any difference.'

Government is acting on fish farms, says

minister

Rural economy secretary Fergus Ewing MSP has insisted the Scottish government is taking action to tighten regulations on fish farms.

Mr Ewing was repeatedly asked about fish farming during a packed public meeting in Whiting Bay village hall on Monday during a visit to Arran.

The minister was on Arran primarily to talk about farming and the looming threat of a no-deal Brexit crippling the industry and, as well as taking questions at the public meeting, he had a private meeting with the National Farmers Union of Scotland.

However, that did not stop a string of questions being asked about fish farming in general and in particular concern being expressed over proposals for a second fish farm by the Scottish Salmon Company off the North East coast of Arran.

However, Mr Ewing made it clear from the outset that he was unable to comment on any specific plans which, he said, was a matter for the planning authority and said it would be 'an abuse of my function,' to speak about them.

But he did say that the Scottish government was taking action and was 'tightening up the rules' for fish farms. He also said it was making the inspection of farms more 'independent'.

John Ford from Lochranza asked why all the fish farms were on the west coast and suggested more should be done to promote mussel, oyster and languistine cultivation rather than fish farms polluting 'our pristine seas'.

Mr Ewing said he believed there was a 'historical reason' for the location of the fish farms, but told Mr Ford he would find out the full reason and reply in writing. He added he believed the shellfish sector was doing very well.

Paul Chandler, director of the Community of Arran Seabed Trust, said there should be more thorough, and more frequent, tests on the fish being farmed. Mr

Ewing said action was being taken to ensure operators were putting out data on the stock on a more up-to-date

Mr Ewing also said there was a trend towards looking very carefully at new fish farm sites with consideration given to the most sensitive such as the effect on wild salmon, a concern raised by the audience. The minister insisted the government was looking at the whole issue with 'transparency' and was 'acting on concerns'.

He also urged those with concerns over the proposed fish farm to make their comments heard through the planning process.

Mr Ewing also answered questions from the audience, which was polite and attentive throughout, about small land holdings, farm tenancies and hill sheep regulations.

Not in tune

The proposal to scrap free TV licenses for the over-75s could hit Arran hard.

It is well known that Arran has an ageing population but figures gleaned from a recent Ayrshire and Arran public health report predict an increase of 50 per cent in the over-80s and a 25 per cent increase in the over-75s in the coming decade on the island.

Add to that a high life expectancy on Arran - for men this is nearly four years higher than the North Avrshire average and two years above the Scottish average.

So there is clear evidence the island is going to be hit hard by this move.

Of course, it is easy to say most pensioners can afford it - but is that really the point?

To have reached 75 having paid taxes all their working life, is a paltry £154.50 a year for a TV licence really too much to offer elderly pensioners to enjoy their programmes in peace in their twilight years? And the prospect of TV detector vans invading the privacy of pensioners should be avoided at all costs.

Of course the UK government has washed its hands of the matter saying it is for the BBC to choose whether to keep the scheme.

Let us hope common sense can prevail.


Parking concern

Geoscientists visit Arran to discuss life on earth





Motorcycle show will be the best yet

Tomorrow (Sunday) sees the sixth annual Classic Motorcycle Show at the Arran Heritage Museum at Rosaburn in Brodick and it promises to be the best yet.

The show is an important fundraiser for the museum and over the years hundreds of motorcycles from as far away as Denmark and ranging from one year old to 88 years old have been shown.

Last year there was a record entry of more than 70 modern, vintage and classic motorcycles and several classic cars which visitors enjoyed seeing in the warm sunny weather. This year promises to be the best yet with advance notification of entries from all over Scotland and beyond.

The racing and specials class sees some very interesting racing machines including Corrie's race ace Chas Bunyan's Kawasaki ZX10 1000cc Superbike which he races at Scottish circuits.

From Ayrshire comes Belle a 1949 500cc Vincent Grey Flash race bike which has won many awards at shows all around the UK and is the lap record holder and championship winner at the public Road Circuits of Chimay and Gedinne in Belgium.

She was built from the proverbial basket case by professional motorcycle restorer and top class racer Mike Hawthorne who will be on hand to answer any queries on Belle's restoration and race career.

From Fife come two stunning two stroke 250cc racing bikes, a rare 1991 Yamaha TZ250B V Twin which was ridden by former Manx Grand Prix winner Dave Milling, who had a successful international road racing career including a podium at the Southern 100 International Road Race meeting at the Billown Circuit on the Isle of Man. Dave also raced her on the TT

Circuit and at Olivers Mount, Scarborough – England's only public roads circuit.

The other race bike from Fife is a Honda NSR250 which is presented as ridden by the late great Joey Dunlop the most successful TT Rider in history with 26 victories.

For many the star of the show will be the Shirlaw's of Aberdeen Racing Honda Nsf250 Moto 3 race bike campaigned by 14-year-old Ross MaGuire in the Bennetts British Superbike Championship and the invititation-only British Talent Cup which is the breeding ground for young British Riders to progress to a career in Moto GP.

Ross has been racing Minimoto's since the age of six and at 12 years of age started racing full size bikes and in his first year won three Scottish 125cc titles and set a new lap record at Knockhill Race Circuit in Fife.

Two unrestored racing bikes

Merry month of May is the time for bird watching

In terms of weather May was almost a re-run of April with similar rainfall and temperature. In comparison to last May, this May was cooler, with a mean temperature 1.5 degrees lower, and drier with more than 40 per cent less rain this May, most of it falling in the last week.

The wind direction this May was more often from a northerly direction whereas last May it was more from a southerly direction. There was a feeling that spring was arriving but a little delayed. Conditions were generally good for birds trying to get on with breeding but swallow and house martin seemed to be delaying nesting perhaps because of the dry conditions. In addition the absence of southerly winds seemed to be holding up northward migration with the result that many more species were seen on Arran this May than previous recent Mays.

It was an exceptional

month with 122 species recorded some of which had not been recorded on Arran for a number of years. These included the following uncommon passage migrants, irregular summer visitors and vagrants. (The last year recorded on Arran is shown in brackets): a male pied flycatcher (1998) in Corriecravie on May 3; two dotterel (2012) on the northern hills on 4th and 5th; a green sandpiper (2008) in Blackwaterfoot on 11th; an immature female type marsh harrier (2004) by Machrie Farm on 18th; and a coot (2016) on Mossend Pond on 30th.

Throughout the month the numbers of familiar summer visitors like swallow, house martin, sand martin, willow warbler, whitethroat, sedge warbler and cuckoo continued to build up. In addition to the 'firsts' reported in the April notes, here are some further 'firsts' with the 2018 arrival dates in brackets for

comparison, all later this year: lesser shitethroat at fairhaven on 1st (April 30), two swift over Glenscorrodale on 10th (May 5), a spotted flycatcher in Brodick Castle gardens on 11th (April 30), four Arctic tern on Pladda on 14th (April 20) and a wood warbler in Pirnmill on 17th. There were no records of wood warbler in 2018. To date there have been no reports this year of garden warbler, common redstart, nightjar, corncrake or common tern.

Species who breed further north continued to pass through including; whimbrel in Auchenhew Bay on 1st, 11 turnstone in Catacol Bay on 2nd, a greenshank on Porta Buidhe on 5th, 22 sandwich tern at Machriewaterfoot on 6th, two bar-tailed godwit and an Arctic skua at Blackwaterfoot 11th, a white wagtail at Porta Buidhe also on 11th, a knot at Drumadoon Point on 13th, four great northern diver and three sanderling at Drumadoon Point on 15th and 17 dunlin on Silver Sands on 22nd.

In May, breeding was well underway for many species. Encouraging signs included reports of golden eagle, golden plover, hen harrier, red-throated diver and short-eared owl all holding breeding territories. Activity was reported from all the monitored heronries on the island and four areas held small numbers of breeding lapwing. A number of coastal cliffs held single figure numbers of nesting fulmar which seem to be in serious decline on Arran. I would be interested to receive any reports of young birds. None were reported in 2017 or 2018 from any colony. By contrast the black guillemot colonies seem to be thriving.

Other breeding records included: seven woodcock roding over Machrie Moor on 11th, a family of dipper in Glenashdale on 13th, around 20 occupied sand martin nest holes in Glen Catacol on 16th, a pair of Canada geese with five young in Auchenhew Bay on 16th, a pair of shelduck with 10 young at Kilpatrick Point on 24th and a pair of mute swan with six young at Clauchlands on 27th. In addition towards the end of the month, there were lots of reports of garden birds carry-

ing food and feeding recently fledged young, including young goldcrest in Lochranza on 29th.

Here are some other highlights: 60 gannet off Sandbraes on 15th and after the reports in April, two further reports of osprey one over Sannox Bay on 12th and another at the top of the String on 21st. Similarly there were further reports of ring ouzel on the northern hills on 17th and 18th. A magpie, a vagrant on Arran not seen every year, was in Kildonan from 11th to the end of the month. Finally reports of a single whooper swan along the Kildonan shore from 11th to 21st and then at Sandbraes on 27th appears to be preparing to over-summer here rather than migrate to northerly breeding grounds like Iceland.

With the long daylight hours it is a great time of year to be birding. Most birds are getting on with the business of breeding. Please take a moment to report any signs of breeding birds to me, but please also remember that under the Nature Conservation (Scotland) Act 2004 it is an offence to intentionally or recklessly damage or destroy the nest of any wild bird while it is being built or used. Do not hesitate to report any criminal activity to the local police. Particularly take care on our shores and please keep

dogs on their leads at this time of year.

Dig this

A large archaeological dig has commenced near Shiskine and it has already unearthed a few interesting finds which reveal a bit about Arran's past. The dig is taking place as a result of the new water pipeline that is to be built across the String and round the south end to Kilmory.

Before West of Scotland Water can begin to build its pumping station for the pipeline, an archaeological firm has been employed to make an assessment and so far they have found hammerstone, pitchstone and a Neolithic arrow head. Much of the finds are waste materials, like chippings from tool making and there is clear evidence of cultivation in patterns in the soil. Following the dig the archaeologists will leave the site for the developers but a full report will be lodged for posterity and interesting finds will go on display on Arran and perhaps Edinburgh.

End of term

Two of Arran's most respected and longest serving teachers retire at the end of this term. Wilma Morton and Ian Watt. Wilma retires after 19 years as head teacher at Pirnmill Primary while Ian will retire after 30 years at Arran High as depute director.

The high school's longest serving teacher, Ian started at the school in 1969 and during his time he has served under four rectors. Of all the changes over the years Ian says that becoming a six-year comprehensive was the biggest change. After that is the advent of computers, not for the pupils, but in administration.

'The children have changed too,' says Ian. 'They are more demanding. They used to sit quietly but now they have questions and teachers must explain to them why things are being done.'

Potting shed

In India, before a new building comes into use, it is blessed. That was the plan last Friday for a pottery workshop in Brodick. The Consul General for India and his wife, Mr and Mrs Praween Goel, visited Arran to give the blessing, and although no formal ceremony took place, it was well blessed by the large crowd of interested people who visited.

It is a workshop which has been about four years in preparation at Denard, next to Montrose House.

The potter is Ramesh Lele who married Jill Hargan four years ago and came to Arran. Inside the new workshop is a kiln, a working space and a display room.






