Carers 'at unnecessary risk' says trade union

Carers and health workers in Argyll and Bute are at risk because of a lack of coronavirus personal protective equipment (PPE) and unclear guidance, says a trade union.

In the wake of the death of a care at home worker in neighbouring West Dunbartonshire, the situation for Argyll and Bute staff was this week slammed by UNISON.

In a statement the union said: 'The situation with regards to PPE for key workers in Argyll and Bute has been at best mixed and at worst disgraceful.

'At what is already a stressful period for everyone, not having clear guidance or the kit is sending anxiety through the roof and is dangerous.

'The UK and Scottish governments published new guidance on April 2 making it clear care at home staff and other care workers should have access to masks and eye protection so

they can don the appropriate PPÉ when needed.

'We hoped this would bring swift change on the ground, [but] in too many cases this has not happened.

MacDonald, Dawn branch secretary, Highland Healthcare UNISON, said: 'Carers, no matter whether employed by the NHS, council, voluntary organisations or the private sector, should have the right to protect themselves, patients and others from cross infection.

'If all carers do not have access to proper PPE, we will have staff go off sick, thus reducing the very staff pool we need to care for the most vulnerable people in our communities.

An NHS Highland spokesman said: 'The safety of our health and social care staff is a priority and we follow the Scotttish Government national guidance in relation to the wearing of appropriate personal protective equipment.

We have a robust distribution system in place and receive regular deliveries of PPE so we can ensure there are appropriate levels of supplies available for our staff.'

Argyll and Bute MSP Michael Russell said there was 'total commitment to getting PPE to where it is needed'.

He added: 'Nationally a range of solutions has been put in place, including using army logistics and transport and massive effort put into getting additional supplies. Locally, the health and social care partnership has been working with government to make sure the correct PPE is in hospitals and GP surgeries and increasing the roll out to care homes.

Great response to equipment plea

Businesses and individuals around the region have responded magnificently to calls for additional personal protective equipment. Earlier this week Lochgilphead firm Midton completed its first order of 1,000 face shields for the NHS in Argyll. A campaign to recruit stitchers in the manufacture of surgical scrubs and gowns has also gathered momentum. More next week.

Hospital prepares for pandemic

Preparations are being made at Mid Argyll Hospital for any increase in coronavirus patient numbers.

Dementia patients from Knapdale Ward deemed clinically fit for discharge are to be temporarily moved to a bungalow in Lochgilphead purpose built for those with enhanced physical care needs.

On Monday this week, a spokesman for Argyll and Bute Health and Social Care Partnership (HSCP) said: 'We hope the move will take place sometime this week. The current nursing staff will move with the patients. This move is good news for the patients and their families, and will also provide much-needed capacity within Mid Argyll Hospital for those who test positive for COVID-19 and require hospital care.'

No figures have been released about the incidence of coronavirus cases in Argyll and Bute. An HSCP statement read: 'We are following national guidance and due to reasons of patient confidentiality we will not make public where in Highland [health board area] the positive cases

Speak up, stay safe

Crimestoppers Scotland has launched a campaign aimed at deterring doorstep criminals during the coronavirus lockdown.

The charity is appealing to people to share the message on keeping safe at home, especially with those who are most at

Doorstep criminals are cunning, creative and often convincing when targeting people and Crimestoppers Scotland is encouraging people to Think, Secure, Question, Consider and Control.

There are two main types of doorstep crime:

Bogus callers try to get into your home or obtain personal details by pretending to be someone they are not. They might, for example, pose as council staff, charity collectors, meter readers or police officers. In reality, they are criminals trying to steal money and valuables.

Rogue traders usually coldcall, claiming to be workers offering to sell services, make repairs or carry out work on your house, garden or driveway. In reality, they charge inflated prices for shoddy or unnecessary work



Angela Parker, national manager for Scotland at Crimestoppers, said: 'Our charity believes everyone has the right to feel safe wherever they live, especially in their own home and at this time. Doorstep criminals often target older people who live alone and while many legitimate companies use doorstep selling, sadly fraudsters also use this technique.

The emotional and financial upset this causes often devastates the victim, so we are encouraging people to speak up and stay safe. Remember,

it's vour home. There is no reason why anyone should ever enter against your wishes.

'If you know or suspect someone who is involved in doorstep crime, scams or fraud you can speak to our independent charity anonymously. When you contact our charity, we won't judge or ask any personal details. All we want to know is what you know.'

A community group set up in Tarbert as the coronavirus lockdown began has hit the ground running.

'To all the many members and businesses who have done so much already and donations we've had from so many.

'We've had donations of delivery baskets, milk, gloves, hand soap, hand sanitiser and 300 eggs – all of which we delivered to doorsteps.

'But most importantly, a massive heartfelt thank you to Team Tarbert's volunteers. Their commitment, time and kindness is invaluable and has made such a difference in our community.'

Emergency committee keeps council running

Argyll and Bute Council's leader says she expects that issues relating to the COVID-19 pandemic will take up much of the time of a new emergency committee.

Aileen Morton will chair the 'business continuity committee' of nine councillors, which was set up last week, with chief executive Pippa Milne also being given executive powers.

The committee is due to have its first meeting, which will be conducted electronically, on Thursday April 16.

Papers are expected to be published on the council's website by the end of this week.

The committee's other members will be councillors Gary Mulvaney, Sandy Taylor,

Lorna Douglas, Robin Currie, Rory Colville, Kieron Green, Yvonne McNeilly and Douglas Philand.

All other meetings of the council and all its committees have been suspended for the duration of the virus lockdown.

Councillor Morton said: 'The aim of creating the new business continuity committee is to ensure we have a manageable way of continuing to undertake essential council business, while having a limited impact on the council's IT infrastructure.

'Hundreds of staff are now working at home who were previously in offices – everyone from registrars to our economic development team providing support for businesses to our teachers providing support for pupils.

'My expectation is there will be a mix of items coming to the committee over the next couple of months – although most will either relate to the COVID-19 response or to more time-sensitive matters of other council business.

'Like other changes to council services, this approach will be kept under review and may be amended to ensure effective working.'

A full meeting of the council last week, also conducted electronically, took only a few minutes to agree the committee should be established.


Anecdotally, some people still seem to be travelling to Argyll from other parts of the UK despite the clear instruction to stay at home.


In this take on the situation, the stricken vehicle's occupants receive little sympathy.

In the real world, anyone stranded on our roads would benefit from a little more help...perhaps.



Chilled raspberry-ripple lemon soufflés



1 Syn per serving | 1 hour | Serves 4

· 5 sheets leaf gelatine

- · 200g raspberries, reserving 4 berries to decorate
- Zest and juice of 3 unwaxed lemons, plus thin lemon wedges to decorate
- 3 large egg yolks, 4 large egg whites'

Tightly tie strips of non-stick baking paper around 4 individual, straight-sided soufflé dishes (about 9cm wide x 5cm deep, or 200ml), leaving a 4cm collar above the rims. Then soak the gelatine in cold water for

10 minutes. Meanwhile, purée the raspberries in a food processor and set aside.

• Put the lemon zest and juice, egg yolks and sweetener in a large, heatproof bowl. Boil a pan of water, then turn off the heat. Place the bowl over the water, making sure the base isn't touching the water. Using an elec-

tric hand whisk, beat the lemon mixture for 5 minutes, or until pale in colour and slightly thickened.

• Heat 3 tbsp water in a small pan, so it just covers the base. Squeeze the water from the gelatine. Put the leaves in the hot water, take the pan off the heat immediately and stir until dissolved. Then whisk into the lemon mixture (still over water); set the bowl aside to cool completely.

Thanks from CalMac

Sir.

It is hugely encouraging the public is paying attention to the government advice of not travelling unless your journey is essential. CalMac has seen passenger numbers drop by 95 per cent since new rules on essential ferry travel were put in place.

The company has introduced an essential lifeline timetable aimed at keeping essential goods, services and people going to and from the islands.

Since then 2,593 passengers were carried compared to 57,233 for the same period last year. Some services are running with just one or two passengers along with the essential goods and services.

Throughout March, commercial vehicles were also down by 32 per cent over the same period last year.

We are fully committed to keeping lifeline services running to the islands we support, bringing in food, fuel and medical supplies and taking off goods vital to keeping economies running.

The vast majority of people are getting the stay at home message loud and clear and we are only turning away a very small number at our ports.

This has been an extremely challenging time for our staff and our communities and I praise both for the way in which they have handed these unique circumstances.





The handwritten note dates from around 2007 and reads, intriguingly: 'The reason I like verses nine and 10 is that they go together and make a feeling.


'The feeling is that your (sic) not alone and God is caring for you all the time and so is your mum and dad and everyone in your family is.'

but pale beside the praise and recognition merited by our front line NHS staff, care workers, emergency services and volunteers. Farmers and crofters are working flat out through a springtime that brings lambing, calving, ploughing, planting – all of which will guarantee security of food supplies in the future.

'As for the here-and-now, it is a testament to the efforts of many that there remains a fantastic array of Scottish produce for consumers. Markets and abattoirs have adapted their practices to underpin supplies of the best beef, lamb and pork in world. Strawberry picking has just started on Scottish farms. Scottish eggs, poultry, milk, cereals, potatoes and vegetables remain available.

'Social distancing and self-isolation will mean traditional Easter family celebrations will be different this year. But there is still an opportunity, where possible,

for people to celebrate and support the fantastic array of food and drink we produce.

Animal disease testing to continue amid coronavirus

Revised Scottish Government guidance has been issued on official testing for livestock during the COVID-19 outbreak.

The guidance is aimed at managing the risk associated with coronavirus together with the ongoing need to protect animal health and welfare and avoid the long-term consequences of loss of disease control measures.

NFU Scotland animal health and welfare policy manager Penny Middleton said: 'Statutory testing programmes, such as BVD or TB, are part of legislative requirements and there is no capacity at the moment to change or suspend the regulations,

meaning all legislated testing should continue. It is also important to maintain the health gains the industry has already achieved, as much as possible.

'If statutory testing is ignored, disease can quickly spread unchecked. When TB testing was suspended during the Foot and Mouth outbreak in 2001 it resulted in long-term consequences of silent, unchecked spread other parts of the UK are still dealing with.

'The guidance issued by the Scottish Government will remain under review and could be subject to further change as the current situation develops.

Provided you can practice safe social distancing, apply hygiene and sanitation measures and comply with all other standard health and safety requirements, statutory testing should continue for now.

This includes: TB (four-year-ly herd tests, post import and breakdown investigation)

BVD annual herd screening (by check test, testing all calves or testing all animals)

Anthrax inquiries
Brucella (post import and

abortion reports)
TSE (post-mortem sampling)
Salmonella testing (poultry

flocks)

If sampling/testing is impossible due to Covid-19 constraints, herds will be identified as overdue for the statutory test. If you are unable

to carry out a test please docu-

ment the reason why in case of future audit.

The usual restrictions will apply to herds with overdue TB and BVD testing. These will be reversed as soon as required testing is completed.

Cattle can move direct to an abattoir regardless of their BVD status

The usual enforcement procedures will be modified or waived as appropriate.

Farmers should avoid risky behaviour and accept that incomplete surveillance may increase the risk of disease. We would encourage all farmers to buy animals with care and keep purchased animals separate from the existing herd/flock.

MOT EXEMPTION DOES NOT MEAN MINIMUM LEGAL TREAD DEPTH IS SUSPENDED



With the introduction of a six-month exemption on MOT for Britain's motorists, drivers should be aware this does not mean the law governing the minimum legal tread depth of 1.6mm has been suspended, warns TyreSafe. Tread depth is essential to

keep a vehicle in contact with the road in wet conditions. Without this crucial contact, a vehicle will be more difficult to control and take longer to stop. At present, a tyre being driven below 1.6mm is illegal and if found by the police could result in a fine of up to £2,500 and three-points being added to a driver's licence – per tyre. In the battle to halt the coronavirus pan-

demic, the government

announced that from March 30, 2020, vehicle owners have been granted a six-month exemption from MOT testing to enable vital services such as deliveries to continue, frontline workers to get to work, and people to get essential food and medicine.

While this measure was deemed to have been essential, it does mean drivers will have to take greater responsibility for their own road safety. As over a quarter of MOT failures have historically been due to unsafe tyres, too many of Britain's vehicle owners have until now clearly been leaving tyre checks to the MOT testers. If motorists are to minimise their risk of an incident on the roads, they will need to ensure their tyres' air pressure, condition and tread depth are fit for the road and legal

A tyre's correct air pressure is determined by the vehicle manufacturer and can be found in the handbook, door shut or fuel filler cap, and on many online pressure look-up tables including at tyresafe.org. Owners should use an accurate pressure gauge to check their tyre's inflation level and adjust it according to the manufacturer's recommendation, paying attention to the need to adjust between heavy and light loads.

A 20p-piece can be used as a guide to how close a tyre's tread is to the legal limit. Insert the coin across the width of the tyre and around its circumference; if you can see the border to the 20p, your tyre is close to the legal limit and should be checked with an accurate gauge.

Drivers should also check their tyre doesn't have any lumps, cracks or objects embedded in it. If any of these are seen, the tyre should be considered unsafe to use until checked by a professional.

Stuart Jackson, TyreSafe Chairman said: 'The need to make vehicles exempt from the MOT is regrettable from a road safety point of view but entirely understandable in the current context of the COVID-19 pandemic. 

Some though must leave home and put their own lives at risk to perform the key tasks needed to fight the virus and keep us safe and supplied with essentials. We are so grateful for their selfless devotion to their duties. Sadly, some. who did not have the safer option of staying at home, have already lost their own lives as they fought to save the lives of others.

Shinty working hard n coronavirus crisis

Shinty's top official says the sport is working to come to terms with the financial and wider impact of the coronavirus lockdown, writes Colin

The summer shinty season began in early march, but just a single match was played for most clubs before competition was suspended ahead of the lockdown on March 23.

In a message sent round clubs, Camanachd Association chief executive Derek Keir paid

tribute to staff, committees and association directors for the 'incredible support they have provided during this time'.

In common with many other sports, shinty faces financial challenges around commercial income, gate money, television income and membership fees.

Staff at the Inverness-based governing body are working from home and options have been explored to reduce costs.

Mr Keir also revealed the association's finance committee has agreed the organisation access government support where appropriate.

He added: 'Six members of staff are already funded by the Scottish Government and are therefore not eligible for additional government support. The remaining three have been offered and accepted to be furloughed to support the efforts to protect our sport.'

The Camanachd Association, said Mr Keir, is 'still very much operational' and is looking

to understand the needs of member clubs in the present situation.

To assist clubs and ensure income is maintained, the association is also 'exploring creative solutions' subscriptions.

Mr Keir concluded: 'In common with all other sports we cannot predict when it will be safe to resume playing matches

'We are discussing various options based on assumed

start dates. We will make every endeavour to make the best use of any time available.

'Please be assured we will be working hard and acting in the best interests of our sport, clubs and members.3
