Driver crisis sparks Arg charity to launch appeal

An acute shortage of drivers has forced an Argyll transport charity to appeal for urgent help as demand increases.

Mid Argyll Transport Volunteers (MATV) is trying to attract younger drivers in particular to maintain its lifeline service.

The charity provides a voluntary car transport service in Tarbert and across Mid Argyll for elderly and disabled people unable to use buses. Between November 11 and December 6, MATV volunteers drove 6,658 miles taking people to hospital and GP appointments, shopping trips, visiting relatives and other excursions. But there are not enough volunteer drivers to meet demand.

'Our drivers are dedicated and they enjoy it, but we have to remember many are themselves getting on a bit,' said MATV chairwoman Fiorna Cairns-Smith.

'Not everyone is keen to

travel to Glasgow, particularly in the middle of winter. We need new blood.'

MATV co-ordinator Catherine Kennedy explained: 'We do approx 37 long distance runs to Oban and Glasgow in a month, among a total of around 120 journeys.

'Over a two-week period recently we had to cancel or decline 17 runs due to not having drivers.

'It's a lifeline for some people...I hate not being able to help.

'In the last few months we have had to close the diary on eight occasions due to lack of drivers. People with medical needs always come first, but sometimes we have to cancel these due to the high demand.

'You worry that these people need to see a doctor, but we can do nothing if we haven't got anyone available.

It's a lifeline for some people and we get attached to our clients. I hate not being able to help.'

Fiorna concluded: 'I want to appeal to people's community spirit in Tarbert and Mid Argyll in this festive season, particularly younger drivers.

'It's far from a one-way street. It doesn't matter if it is just an hour a week you can spare, you will be helping others. And it can be great fun.'

Two separate projects aimed at improving Lochgilphead have been given the backing of the town's community councillors.

At its December meeting, Lochgilphead Community Council convenor Andy Buntin praised the work carried out so far to prepare for a project to improve the front green.

With planning permission secured and invitations to tender due to be issued on January 6, Mr Buntin said: 'It's high time this project was done.

He added: 'Throughout this process there has been a great deal of help from the design team and Argyll and Bute Council. All of our aspira-

tions have been met and, in some cases, exceeded.'

Much of the £1.7 million of funding allocated to the project will be spent on improving drainage on the site. The fully costed plans also include a central public space or square to the rear of the war memorial, with a site for a Christmas tree where there will be potential for events. There will be a new play area, improved seating and better signs

A planned cycle track will also have the potential to be connected to a wider network, as funding becomes available. Mr Buntin reiterated his hope, expressed at an earlier community council meeting, that machinery will be on site by March 2020.

A separate project will improve buildings in the town centre. The town will benefit from a Conservation Area Regeneration Scheme (CARS), thanks to a grant of £969,700 from Historic Environment Scotland backed with £386,000 in council funding and estimated contributions from building owners of £250,000 - taking the total budget to

£1.6m over the five years the CARS scheme will run. Similar CARS projects have

improved Campbeltown, Inveraray, Dunoon and Rothesay. Addressing the community

council at the December 9 meeting, Mr Buntin said he was hopeful the council

CARS project officer James Lafferty would speak at a future community council meeting.

Man spat on police officer

An Ardrishaig man who repeatedly spat on a police officer must pay him £750 compensation.

Frazer Mullaney, 27, of 14 Glenfyne Terrace, admitted assaulting a police officer on July 8 this year during an incident at Davaar Avenue and Hazelburn Business Park, Campbeltown, by repeatedly spitting on him, plus resisting and obstructing officers in the execution of their duty.

He also admitted failing to

comply with his bail conditions on December 7 this year and acting in a threatening and abusive manner.

In the latter incident, Mullaney was subject to a bail curfew but missed a bus home as it had arrived early. His defence agent said: 'His conduct was born of frustration and panic; he had not breached a curfew before.2

'This police assault is an appalling one,' said Sheriff Patrick Hughes, sitting at

Campbeltown, last He ordered Mullaney to pay compensation and to undertake a 12-month community payback order with 144 hours unpaid work in the community with a restriction of liberty order from 8pm to 7pm. The sheriff also deferred sentence for the other cases and ordered an updated report on Mullaney and his suitability for alcoholism treatment. The case will call again in Januarv.

Argyll nurses' Queen's award honour

Two community nurses from Argyll and Bute have been awarded the prestigious title of Queen's Nurse.

Maggie Wilkieson, from Gigha, and Joanna Taylor, from Lochgilphead, were selected earlier this year to take part in a nine-month development programme run by the Queen's Nursing Institute Scotland.

They were nominated by their employers at NHS Highland for providing high quality, compassionate care to people in their communities. After completing the programme, they were awarded the historic Queen's Nurse title along with 18 other community nurses at a ceremony in Edinburgh on Thursday November 28.

Maggie is based in Campbeltown where she works as the community Macmillan clinical nurse specialist, caring for people in their homes as well as in the community hospital.

She said: 'I meet people at various stages of their illness. My main work, however, is supporting those who require palliative and end-of-life care, a role in which I feel both honoured and humbled to share with patients and their families. My job has evolved over the past 12 years, comprising mainly of a clinical role, but also leadership, service development, community engagement and education. My first community nursing post more than 20 years ago was working as a community nurse/ midwife on Gigha where my mentor was a Queen's Nurse.

'She was an amazing person to work beside and really moulded the service to what the community needed. She was such a motivating person and a real inspiration to me. To follow in her footsteps and those of the other Queen's Nurses by receiving this title is a real honour for me and an ambition fulfilled.'

Joanna has recently changed post from a community staff nurse, a role she did for 18 years, to working as an advanced nurse for clinical education and a liaison lecturer for the University of the West of Scotland.

She said: 'My new role allows me to support and champion education for anyone working as a nurse in Argyll and Bute or any students that come on placement here.

'I am based at the council building in Lochgilphead but I spend a lot of time visiting nurses working throughout the area, helping and encouraging them to seek access to education or training they need to enhance patient care.

'Bringing all the experience I've had, and the fact I was born and brought up in Argyll and Bute, means I have an intimate knowledge of the culture and the challenges that come with being a nurse in remote and rural practice and I'm passing on that knowledge to a new generation.

'I hope the Queen's Nurse title will enable me to inspire others as a champion for clinical education for nurses.'

Other community nurses from across Scotland in the group include a dementia specialist nurse, learning disability nurses and a nurse working in homelessness services, as well as district nurses, health visitors, school nurses and practice nurses.


A83 landslip prevented

Landslip mitigation measures installed next to the A83 near Glen Kinglas have prevented a 300-tonne landslide from reaching the roadside, writes Rachel Carruthers.

The landslip was blocked from reaching the carriageway thanks to specially designed rock-bunds, which were the result of an innovative, sustainable engineering solution, using excavated rock during the construction of further landslip mitigation measures at the Rest and Be Thankful.

The rock-bunds form a barrier on the hillside parallel to the A83 and mean material from potential landslips are held behind the rock barrier. The 28,000 tonnes of rock used to create them was sustainably re-used during excavations of the nearby £2.24million catch-pit project at the Rest and be Thankful, where three large 'pits' were created to help provide further resilience against potential landslips in the area.

The excavated rock was transported three miles to Glen Kinglas and used to construct the bunds, providing a considerable reduction in carbon emissions with teams saving an estimated 50,000 lorry miles – roughly the same distance as travelling around the world twice

- due to the huge reduction in haulage distance for the excavated rock.

The landslip occurred around 230m above the carriageway following a period of heavy rainfall around midnight on Saturday December 7 at Glen Kinglas, where teams from BEAR Scotland had been on high alert during the Met Office yellow weather warning.

Engineers estimate the rock bunds helped prevent the A83 from being closed by up to two days as a result of the landslip, successfully avoiding disruption to road users. Geotechnical engineers and teams from BEAR Scotland have assessed the slipway for safety with plans now under

way to remove the debris from behind the bund. Shortterm lane closures will be in place while teams mobilise plant and heavy machinery to remove the material from the bund.

Brendan O'Hara re-elected as Argyll and Bute MP

Scottish National Party candidate Brendan O'Hara has been re-elected as the Member of Parliament for Argyll and Bute with an increased majority.

The Argyll and Bute UK general election count began at Lochgilphead Joint Campus after polls closed at 10pm on Thursday December 12 and was carried out through the night, with the result declared at 5.45am on Friday December 13.

At the end of what can reasonably be described as a lowkey constituency campaign in comparison to the rancour and division elsewhere in the country, Argyll and Bute's electorate handed SNP candidate Brendan O'Hara a majority of 4,110 votes over his nearest challenger,

the result as follows: Rhea Louise Barnes, Scottish Labour Party – 3,248 Gary Mulvaney, Scottish Conservative and Unionist - 16,930

Brendan O'Hara, Scottish National Party (SNP) – 21,040 Alan Reid, Scottish Liberal Democrats – 6,832

The total electorate for Argyll and Bute was 66,525 with 48,192 votes cast. The turnout at the polls was 72.4 per cent.

A total of 142 votes were rejected. Ten were rejected for voting for more than one candidate and 132 were unmarked or void for uncertainty.

A delighted Brendan O'Hara said after the declaration: 'My first priority, as it always has been, is the people of Argyll and Bute, and to make the case for the constituency.

'I am very worried about the future of Argyll and Bute. We have a UK government that is hell-bent on Brexit. Boris Johnston, with his majority, will be looking to take us out of the EU as quickly as possible. A no-deal Brexit is still on the table and after tonight is looming large. We should all be very worried at that prospect.'

Asked how he felt, Mr O'Hara replied: 'It hasn't really hit me yet. I didn't think the majority would be what it was, and I think this is a victory for the organisation of the SNP in Argyll and Bute. 'I am very, very happy and very, very tired in equal

measure.' Gary Mulvaney, who received 954 more votes than in the 2017 election, commented: 'I'm pleased our vote has increased, but I've felt like we have been swimming against the tide sometimes. I am delighted, however, that we now have a majority Conservative government. We need a strong Westminster government to get Brexit done and move forward.'

LibDem candidate Alan Reid was the constituency MP for 14 years from 2001 before being succeeded in 2015 by Brendan O'Hara. Mr Reid said: 'I am obviously disappointed not to have won but I would congratulate Brendan on a convincing victory.'

A newbie to the political scene, Scottish Labour candidate Rhea Barnes remarked: 'It's been a well-fought campaign conducted in a well mannered way and I thank the other candidates for that, and I congratulate Brendan on his election as MP.'

Alongside postal votes and proxies, votes made their way across Argyll and Bute in ballot boxes transported by car, boat, and helicopter to the Lochgilphead Joint Campus count centre.

Returning officer Cleland Sneddon said: 'We have a dedicated team of knowledgeable election staff which meant that everything went extremely smoothly, despite the unique challenges involved in administering a count on this scale.

'I would like to thank everyone involved for ensuring that Argyll and Bute's UK general election count went so well.'

Fuel poverty figures frightening

Current estimates of fuel poverty which are based on home analytics data shows a very worrying and unacceptably high percentage of households in Argyll and Bute that have a likelihood of fuel poverty.

With the Scottish average of likelihood of households in fuel poverty being at 27 per cent the numbers for Argyll and Bute sadly dwarf the national average.

Argyll and Bute overall coming in at 43 per cent – Jura is at 46 per cent; Islay 54 per cent; Kintyre 63 per cent; and most shockingly of all the Isle of Gigha stands at 79 per cent.


This once again shows the vast rural urban divide in Scotland with the urban belt obsessed Scottish Government being slow and uninterested in the vast challenges facing our rural and island communities.

The Kintyre and Islands ward is a huge success story with large scale economic and industrial growth particularly from our distillery industry.

This is yet another example of the tax and spend imbalance with hundreds upon hundreds of millions pounds in tax revenue coming from my ward yet so many of my constituents are at risk of fuel poverty.

Scotland has the right to decide own future

Sir,

If the General Election in the United Kingdom has highlighted one thing, it is that we are far from being a united kingdom.

Scotland voted overwhelmingly to reject Brexit, to lock Boris Johnson out of Downing Street and for the right to hold a second referendum to decide the nation's future. South of the border a totally opposite path has been taken.

Nicola Sturgeon has now won four elections on a manifesto commitment to hold a second independence referendum. In simpler times, that great hero of the Conservative Party, Margaret Thatcher, famously commented that a majority of SNP MPs would be a mandate for Scottish independence.

Despite this, while Unionists bizarrely argue that there is no mandate for a second independence referendum as the SNP did not secure a majority of the votes, it is somehow okay for Mr Johnson, in very similar circumstances to pursue a damaging Brexit agenda.

Circumstances have changed since 2014 and it is difficult to see how Mr Johnson can continue to deny the Scottish people the democratic right to decide their own future. Alex Orr, Edinburgh

I have no idea what the neighbours did in the end but I have become obsessed about keeping them off our boat. I have lost all interest in anything else. Even pirates pale.


I am now on 24/7 rat watch. I'm investigating gun control regulations in Malaysia.



Cemetery needs under review

Planning to ensure that the council-run cemeteries can meet the needs of communities in the future is already under way.

Argyll and Bute Council's Economic Development and Infrastructure Committee agreed on Thursday December 12 that during 2020, residents should be asked about their personal choices and for their views and ideas for ways forward, so that a new set of cemetery policies can be proposed.

According to statute, local authorities are only required to provide one cemetery per area. Argyll and Bute has 65 cemeteries available for the purchase of lairs. There are 66 closed to the sale of spaces, and this has remained fairly stable since 2005.

There are a large number of lairs that have been sold, but 70 years have lapsed without them being used. One option – in areas of most need – could be to investigate if these are still needed and claim them back if not.

Community volunteers, in a small number of areas, are supporting council services by maintaining burial grounds and similar initiatives would be welcomed elsewhere.

Councillor Robin Currie, policy lead for Housing, Roads and Infrastructure Services, said: 'Caring for those who have passed away has been an important rite for human beings for many thousands of years – whatever our beliefs.

Winter safety advice from Argyll Talking Newspapers

Listeners to Argyll Talking Newspapers got a masterclass in staying safe this winter when Watch Commander Duncan Litster, of Scottish Fire and Rescue Service, dropped in for a chat.

Duncan was invited to give some dos and don'ts to listeners at the time of year when we all start to feel the chill and plug in additional heaters, lighting and those lovely electric blankets – not to mention the tree lights and other electrical decorations which are such a part of the festive season.

Duncan's advice was recorded onto USB sticks and will pop through the letter boxes of 130 listeners all over Argyll and Bute, as well as further afield.

Important things to remember include not overloading plug extensions. A space heater on its own will be the maximum the extension can safely support, so it is best to plug a space heater straight into a wall socket

Electric blankets should be stored rolled up, not folded which may cause damage, and do check for any worn, singed or discoloured areas. Switch the blanket on for a while to check it is working properly before putting it on your bed.

Electrical items which haven't been used for a while should not be left alone but monitored until it is clear they are working properly.

'For visually impaired listeners, it would be advisable to have a neighbour or family member helping with these checks,' said Duncan. 'Scottish Fire and Rescue Service, however, provides a free home safety advice service to help people understand potential risks in their home.'

Home safety visits are free. To apply call 0800 0731 999, text FIRE to 80800 from a



Get set for the 2020 Big **Farmland Bird Count**

Wildlife enthusiasts across the country are being urged to take part in the Big Farmland Bird Count (BFBC), which is back for the seventh successive year.

The UK-wide citizen science project calls on farmers, land managers and gamekeepers to spend 30 minutes spotting species on their land between the February 7 and 16, 2020.

Crucially, the results will aim to determine which farmland birds are benefiting from conservation efforts while identifying the ones most in need of help.

Organising the UK-wide count this year is Dr Roger Draycott, head of advisory services, the Game and Wildlife Conservation Trust (GWCT). He said: 'Farmers and gamekeepers are vital in helping to ensure the future survival of many of our most cherished farmland bird species like skylarks, yellowhammers, corn buntings and grey partridges.

'They are responsible for managing the largest songbird habitat in this country on their land but frequently their efforts to reverse bird declines are largely unrecorded. We believe the annual GWCT Big Farmland Bird Count will help remedy this.

We understand the crucial role that land managers play in the survival of farmland birds and we want to give them an opportunity of showing what their conservation efforts deliver on the ground.

'It is also a satisfying way to discover the different range of birds that are on the farm and the results can be surprising. We hope it will spur land managers on to do even more work for their farmland birds in the future and that it will act as a catalyst for them to start building their own long-standing wildlife records.

'Last year was another record-breaking count with 1,400 people counting - a 40 per cent increase on the previous year, recording 140 species over one million

acres. We are delighted that many landscape-scale farmland conservation projects are now taking part in the count and we are now able to feedback results at the landscape level as well as the individual farm level.

Encouragingly, a total of 30 red-listed species were recorded in 2019 in the UK count, with five appearing in the most-commonly seen species list, including fieldfares, starlings, house sparrows, vellowhammers and

song thrushes, with the first four seen by over 30 per cent of the farms taking part. In Scotland, the most-commonly seen in the 2019 count were blackbird, blue tit, chaffinch, pheasant and robin.

The BFBC was launched in

2014 to highlight the positive work done by land managers in helping to reverse the decline in farmland birds. The count offers a simple means of recording the effects of any conservation work currently being undertaken by farmers and gamekeepers on their land, such as supplementary feeding birds through winter or growing crops specifically to provide seed for birds.

At the end of the count, the results will be analysed by the GWCT. All participants will receive a report on the national results once they have been collated.

How to take part in three simple steps:

Download your count sheet from the BFBC website www.bfbc.org.uk.

Count your birds. On a day between February 7 and 16, 2020, spend about 30 minutes recording the species and number of birds seen on one particular area of the farm.

Once you've completed your count, submit your results at www.bfbc.org.uk.

Union's post-election plan already in place

Following the conclusive result of the UK General Election on Thursday December 12, NFU Scotland (NFUS) has kick-started an extensive programme of engagement with Scotland's intake of MPs and the new UK Government.

Writing to every MP in Scotland this week, NFUS has invited early meetings to progress dialogue on the 10 key priorities set out in its election manifesto document which address the pressing Brexit issue, as well as climate change, animal welfare, opportunities for new entrants and food producers' standing in the supply chain.

NFUS will also extend an invitation to the Secretary of State for Scotland, once appointed, to attend and address the upcoming NFUS AGM in February 2020.

NFUS's political affairs manager

Clare Slipper said: 'With the dust from last week's election settled, now begins the hard work with Scotland's representatives in Westminster. Let us be clear: NFUS will engage with all MPs, of all parties, to ensure the best outcomes for our membership.

'As well as organising meetings with Scottish MPs, we are also seeking early engagement with key appointments within the government. 'Having looked at the policies within the Conservative's manifesto line-by-line, there are areas of strength and opportunity: and other areas that our members will find more challenging. Our role is to bridge that gap.

'Clearly, Brexit is the most pressing issue. It is almost certain that the UK will be leaving the EU on January 31, and NFUS will work closely with UK Government to ensure that this transition is as smooth as possible. 'After that point, the UK, the EU and the international community will enter an intense negotiating period on the terms of future trading relationships. NFUS will build on the strong markers it has already



laid in terms of maintaining our world-class standards of production and protecting the UK's agri-food market from substandard imports. The Prime Minister must deliver on the previous government's commitment to establish a Commission on Standards.

'We welcome the Conservative government's commitment to extend the current annual budget to farmers throughout the duration of the next parliament. We will seek certainty on this staying ringfenced to agriculture, as well as the quantum of funding that will be delivered from now through to 2024.

'The new UK Government must work with the devolved administrations to recommence negotiations on how future financial, regulatory and policy frameworks will operate across the UK to ensure the Scottish Government can make the right decisions on future agricultural policy for Scottish farmers and crofters.

'We are interested by the policies within the Conservative manifesto concerning regulatory simplifi-cation and streamlining the tax system - both which could provide positive opportunities to boost rural business.

'There are more challenging aspects to the Conservative government's proposed policies where we must ensure that there aren't negative consequences - intended or unintended - for our members. These include the party's uninformed position regarding the movement of live animals - an issue on which NFUS lobbied the previous government hard.

'A further issue is the future points-based immigration system. NFUS completely rejects the suggestion that routes to permanent residence for "low skilled" workers should be shut off. This would be extremely damaging to the whole of the UK agri-food sector. We want the government to secure a comprehensive immigration system that is based on the needs of the labour market.'
