ArCaS funds first cancer support nurse for Arran

Arran is to get its first ever dedicated cancer nurse who will help coordinate care support and services across the island.

The new post is being funded by Arran cancer charity ArCaS and Kate Jenks, already a well known community nurse, has taken up the role.

The support nurse post has been created in order to try and improve the experience for people on Arran, either with cancer or those who are affected by cancer, with a pledge that patients will be at the centre of decision making.

The part-time role within the NHS, which ArCaS is initially investing £30,000 a year for three years, will be administered by the North

Ayrshire Health and Social Care Partnership.

ArCaS has long offered cancer support on the island and organises free transport to and from mainland hospital for appointments, but this marks yet another expansion of the services the charity provides.

A spokeswoman said: 'We are aware that everyone is different and would like you to know that Kate is available to help answer any queries or help with any arrangements, should you wish.

'As well as seeing individual people and working alongside the health and social care team, the aim of this role is to work towards a sustainable service for Arran residents, that is in the best interests of those affected. In order to do that it will be helpful to know what has worked for you, or

Arran hit by flu outbreak

A flu outbreak is sweeping Arran which, along with other respiratory viruses, has led to widespread illness.

Dozens of children have been floored by the outbreak leading to many absences at primary schools across the island as well as at Arran High School. Teachers have also been hit by the seasonal flu.

In one day alone there were 27 absences at Lamlash Primary School and Kilmory Primary were forced to reschedule their Christmas show as so many of the pupils were off ill.

Virulent

However, it is not just children but adults, too, who have been laid low by the virulent flu strain with many reported absences from work, and older residents are being urged to take extra precautions.

NHS Ayrshire and Arran

say anyone who is eligible and has not yet had the flu vaccine this year should act now.

They also say that since the flu virus is spread in the small droplets of fluid coughed or sneezed into the air by an infected person, anyone with the condition should avoid unnecessary contact with other people while they're infectious, and stay off work or school until their symptoms have improved.

Dr Elvira Garcia, consultant in public health medicine at NHS Ayrshire and Arran told the Banner: 'Seasonal flu (influenza) is currently circulating within Ayrshire and Arran, as with all of Scotland.

Other respiratory viruses, such as respiratory syncytial virus (RSV), are also being detected by national surveillance.

'Flu is a common infection from which most people will recover without any treatment. However, people aged over 65, pregnant women, young children or adults and children with chronic conditions are at greater risk from the effects of flu.

'NHS Ayrshire & Damp; Arran strongly encourages any eligible person, such as adults and children with chronic conditions, children aged two to five years, pregnant women or carers, to take the offer of flu vaccination in order to provide the best protection possible in the community against seasonal

Appointment

'It is easy to get the flu vaccination if you are eligible – simply call your GP practice to make an appointment or speak with your midwife if you are pregnant. Primary school children have also been offered vaccination at their schools.'

Arran still faces a two-year

wait for new ferry

About £83m of public money has been spent on the vessels to date



The troubled Arran ferry, the MV Glen Sannox, will not be ready for another two years, the Scottish Government has revealed.

In an announcement delayed by the General Election secretary Derek Mackay also announced on Wednesday that the cost of completing the MV Glen Sannox and her sister ship has more than doubled from the initial £97 million cost.

But even if the new dual fuel vessel, which has caused many of the problems, leaves the now privatised Ferguson yard at Port Glasgow at the end of 2021, after at least three months of sea trials it will be the spring of 2022 before she would even start on the Brodick to Ardrossan route a staggering four years late.

Following the public takeover of the yard in August a new assessment of the vessels, and how long it will take to complete them, has established that the MV Glen Sannox will not be ready until the last three months of 2021. The second vessel – known

as Hull 802 which is earmarked for the Skye/Harris and North Uist route - will not be ready until July or August in 2022.

The previous owner, tycoon Jim McColl who rescued the yard when it went bust in 2014, blamed repeated design changes by CMAL, the publicly-owned company which owns ferries and other infrastructure used by CalMac, for

Mr Mackay said in a statement to the Scottish parliament that the full extent of the problems were not revealed until administrators went in and the SNP minister pointed to 'disastrous' management practices.

He said: 'The failures of management, planning and process means the vessels are behind their original programme and that significant rework is required.'


About £83m of public money has been spent on the vessels to date.

It is estimated the cost of completing the ships will be £95.1m, but remedial works and spending at the yard will push these costs closer to £110m.

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Fears over rates relief moves

The headway being made on rates reform is at risk if MSPs remove control over the setting of the business rate from the Finance Secretary and instead hand the power to each of Scotland's 32 local authorities.

In a four-page submission sent to Holyrood's local government and communities committee, the Scottish Retail Consortium said the current Scotland-wide uniform business rate has brought much needed predictability and consistency to the tax over the past two and a half decades.

Last month the committee backed a Green Party amendment to the Non-Domestic Rates Bill, at Stage 2, which ends the uniform business rate and instead gives each local authority the right to set their own poundage rate, rates reliefs and any local rates supplements.

MSP Arran Gibson, one of seven MSPs on the committee who voted against the amendment says the move could remove £6 million of rates relief from North Ayrshire and Arran businesses.

He said: 'This amendment will prove to be a disaster for island businesses if it is not reversed, making it even more difficult for them to survive on a high street already facing severe online competition. The Green amendment does not even create an equivalent power for local authorities allowing them to set reliefs.

'One can but wonder what this unholy alliance of Green, Tory and Labour MSPs was thinking. In North Ayrshire and Arran 3,040 properties will lose out unless at least one opposition party sees sense, backs the SNP Government and reverses its position at Stage 3 of the Non-Domestic Rates (Scotland) Bill, which will become law next year,' he

Intentionally acidic

Sour beer is any beer which is made intentionally acidic, tart or sour.

The best known types of sour beer are Belgian lambic, Gueuze and Flanders red ale.

Arran Brewery has also been instrumental in assisting

apprenticeship and brewing courses at its Kilwinning campus.

Managing director Gerald Michaluk said: 'It is a busy time for the Arran brewery with the start of a cider and sour beer range next year and we have a lot more new product developments in the pipeline for 2020.

'I am particularly happy Ayrshire College is supporting the sector and proud to have assisted the college team to develop a brewing offering that will help the whole industry and fill a real gap in provision.



Changes to bin collections

Residents on Arran are being reminded to check their bin collection arrangements for the festive period as there will be some changes to waste and recycling collection services owing to the Christmas and New Year bank holidays.

On Arran only households whose bin collections fall on a Wednesday or Friday will be affected, although the actual time of collections may vary, particularly if adverse weather affects the area. The revised timetable for Arran over the festive period will see bins that would usually be emptied on Wednesday December 25, taking place on Friday December 27. Bins that would usually be emptied on Friday December 27, will take place on Saturday December 28.

Those that are normally timetabled for Wednesday January 1, will take place on Friday January 3, and those that were scheduled for Friday January 3, will take place the following day on Saturday January 4.

Additionally, North Ayrshire's Household Waste Recycling Centres will be closed on December 25 and 26 and January 1 and 2. They will open as normal outwith these dates.

Special uplifts will stop on Friday December 20 and can be requested again on the week commencing Monday January 6, 2020.

Gibson re-elected with an increased majority

Patricia Gibson easily retained the North Ayrshire and Arran seat for the SNP more than doubling her majority on a good night for the Scottish National Party at the General Election.

Mrs Gibson secured her return to Westminster with a majority of 8,521, winning 48.5 per cent of the vote – more than the Conservatives and Labour combined, a result repeated across many parts of Scotland.

She is one of 48 SNP MPs across Scotland to return to Westminster this week.

Speaking after the results Mrs Gibson said: 'The General Election result was a clear victory for the SNP across Ayrshire and Scotland.

'I am honoured that North Ayrshire and Arran's people have again placed their trust in me to represent them at Westminster.

'We fought this election

in the belief that Scotland's future should be in Scotland's hands. No Prime Minister, no government has the right to deny Scotland this choice. The UK Government has already accepted that the people of Scotland are sovereign. Democracy demands that the voice of Scotland's people is beard

Emboldened

'We now face an emboldened Tory Prime Minister with a significant majority who has been comprehensively rejected by Scotland.

'Yet we are being asked to endure that for which we did not vote. If the SNP does not have a mandate to decide its future because it "only" won 45 per cent of the vote, then by the same token, the Prime Minister does not have a mandate, since he only won 43 per cent across the UK and 25 per cent in Scotland.



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Coffee roasting venture for Duchess Court

A bid to set up a coffee bean roasting business in Brodick has taken a step forward.

A planning application has been made to convert the pottery shop and studio of Simon Thorborn, which recently closed at Home Farm, for the new business.

The Isle of Arran Coffee Company Ltd will take over Unit 1 at Duchess Court and owner Duncan Russell is delighted to welcome them on board. He said: 'We are very excited for something new which will compliment the current mix. We are obviously gutted that Simon had to vacate the premises, but his health comes first.'

In a supporting statement to North Ayrshire Council planners the applicant, Ms Alix Hitching, explains what she proposes: I am in the process of setting up a coffee bean roasting business on Arran. I would wish to use the space for the roasting of green coffee beans and to have a small retail offering from the site. The split would be approx. roasting 80/20 retail. Most of my sales will be the business to business market.

'The new machine (Toper 10kg), I will be using, will

come fitted with an afterburner. The installation of the afterburner will ensure that all unburnt components, smoke, smell and dust particles are re-burnt before being discharged. The exhaust air of the roaster meets International EPA standards.

'As the proposed site is in an area with a mix of production and retail, there is already provision for car park spaces. Immediately adjacent to Duchess Court is an area containing 24 dedicated car parks.

'At start up, the business would be run by myself, with the hope that within 24 months, I may be able to employ further staff. I would envisage actual roasting of the beans to initially be half a day a week, building to a full day of roasting.

Ms Hitching adds: 'I had previously applied for a site in Whiting Bay. However taking onboard the rather detailed objection of one of the potential neighbours, it was decided that in the scope of good relations from within a small community, I would look to place this business in an area more set up for a commercial enterprise.'

Be prepared for Christmas closures

Roisin Kavanagh, director of pharmacy, explains: 'You can do a number of things to make sure you are prepared to deal with common illnesses for the coming months. Have a sufficient supply of medicines like paracetamol, sore throat and cough remedies, as these will help to relieve the symptoms of common ailments.

'If you take regular medication, you should check your existing supplies and only order what you need to ensure you have enough to see you through the holiday weekend. It is also a good idea to make sure you know when your local GP practice and community pharmacy are closed.'

Dealing with loss and bereavement over Christmas

It's one year now since we, Jan Attkins and I, began the Last Waltz, a safe and supported space to share memories and recognise loss.

Christmas can be a particularly difficult time for those of us who have suffered bereavement.

Memories from the past can crowd in to make the loss feel harder. Cheerful decorations and tunes don't help.

We don't have the answers, but we have some suggestions we hope may help you through. They are gleaned from experience, both personal and shared from the community:

• Begin each day by checking in with yourself. Take a few moments to ask, 'how am I?' Feeling down or sad is allowed, it's ok. Scarf initiative cash wrapped

A scarf knitting fundraising initiative by Bay Wool and Crafts in Whiting Bay has raised £500 for Arran RNLI and Arran Mountain Rescue Team (AMRT) as well as delivering almost 50 scarves to homeless charity Seascape Ayr.

'Over the eight months we have been knitting, an enduring memory has been the Optimists Discovery Group from Kilsyth, one of the first groups of ladies to sit down and knit with us. There were six of them in total.

'There was also a couple from Hull and their rescue dog Piper, who had followed them to their car and eventually learned how to open the windows and escape. Then there was a young lady who spent three hours knitting an attractive and intricate design, all completely from memory, while it poured down outside. She and her boyfriend were only on Arran for the day and overnight but were content to while away the hours in the shop knitting.

'We are very grateful to all the wonderful people we've met through this project, old and young, new knitters and those who can't remember not being able to knit.

'A massive thanks to everyone who took part and donated. Extra thanks to Liz McLean and the Big Co-op for rounding up the final total.'

Kat and Steve presented cheques to representatives of the RNLI and AMRT who expressed their gratitude for the donations, all of which will help contribute to making the services they provide possible.

Woodland revival takes root with volunteer help

Holidaymakers, schoolchildren and refugees are among the many people getting involved in the National Trust for Scotland project to revive Glen Rosa's woodland, writes Colin Smeeton.

The latest helpers, 12 people taking part in one of the conservation charity's work-

ing holidays, planted 3,500 trees in November in one of Scotland's most dramatic landscapes.

Generously supported by the players of Peoples Postcode Lottery, this project aims to revive woodland landscapes lost gradually over time, protecting Scotland's natural environment for future generations.

Kate Sampson, senior ranger for the NTS explains more about the project and who's getting involved: 'Tree loss in Glen Rosa started with felling by the first Bronze age settlers, then grazing by community farmers, followed by sheep after the people were cleared from the glen during the clearances and now sheep are replaced by red deer.

The remaining trees in the glen cling to steep-sided gullies or crags where the deer cannot reach. Now deer will be fenced out of an area of 400 hectares, allowing the ground to recover from over grazing and enabling us to kick start the habitat revival by planting trees.

"This ambitious project aims to plant 40,000 trees this winter. Native broadleaf species have been selected for planting, including the en-

locally sourced aspen. These will be planted with oaks, hazel, birch and willows, creating a naturalistic upland woodland.
'Arran is famous for its

demic Arran whitebeam and

three endemic trees: the Arran whitebeams. Only found on Arran, they are some of the most endangered trees in the world. Over the years a local tree 'guru' Henry Murdo, has been collecting seed and propagating the Arran whitebeams. His trees will find a new home in Glen Rosa, hopefully securing the species for the future.

'Aspens on Arran are another tree species living on the edge. A DNA survey of our remaining aspen revealed that only female trees were left. Now we are planting males that have been micro propagated from root cuttings of aspens taken from other parts of the island, thanks to Forestry and Land Scotland. Only through our new planting will the aspens have a chance of producing new baby aspens.

'But it's not all about the trees, only a small part of the fenced off area will be planted, leaving open space for golden eagles that are hunting and visually the mountains will still be glimpsed through the open canopy.

'The 40,000 trees will have a positive impact, increasing

biodiversity, helping reduce climate change not only through storing carbon dioxide but also through reducing the impact of flood events and landslips, and reducing the risk of heathland fires.

'One of the most rewarding parts of this project has been the overwhelming positive response shown from the community.

'Many people have offered up their time to help plant trees. Others who can no longer help physically have given donations for more trees. 'The local school, Brodick Primary School, have been out planting as have Syrian refugee families. Together they are helping to make a difference and although the work may be hard with a long walk in and sometimes challenging weather conditions, at the end of the day almost everyone comes back smiling.'
