# Distillery shows community spirit

The staff at Beinn an Tuirc Distillery have shown incredible community spirit during the current coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic by producing alcohol-based hand sanitiser – which is being distributed free to those most in need.

Beinn an Tuirc has joined other Scottish craft gin producers in using their supplies of alcohol to make hand sanitiser, as stocks of regular hand rubs run low in shops. Alcohol-based sanitisers made using 60 to 95 per cent alcohol are most effective at killing viruses, including coronavirus.

There has been a UK-wide shortage of hand soaps, sanitisers and other hygiene products since the outbreak of the virus, with the NHS advising everyone to wash their hands as often as possible, and use hand sanitiser when soap and water is not available.

To keep things light, Beinn an Tuirc's new product has been named Hogg Wash – in keeping with the distillery's branding, given that Beinn an Tuirc translates as Hill of the Boar.

Limited supplies of the sanitiser have been produced according to World Health Organisation (WHO) guidelines, and it is hoped that more will be produced in the coming weeks and months.

## Huge praise

Beinn an Tuirc received huge praise from the community after announcing the news on its social media channels.

A post on Facebook read: "Those in most need locally will be dealt with first. Businesses looking to buy will be asked to contribute a bit more than cost price to off-set against those in need."

Director Niall Macalister Hall explained that although the distillery was keen to do its bit to help, production of the hand sanitiser was

costing the business money at a time when the gin market is 'non-existent'.

He said: "With HM Revenue and Customs rules we need to charge duty on the ethanol that is in it – this is in excess of £28 per litre of pure alcohol, which for a litre of hand sanitiser works out at £25. Plus there are other ingredients, so it costs us around £30 per litre to simply produce."

"While we are happy to do our bit, and provide for those in most need, any businesses looking to buy it will be asked to pay a small amount over cost price to off-set against any discounted supplies."

"The gin market is now non-existent; and we are hoping we can ride out this storm. If we can't, the simple fact is we will close, like a lot of other businesses."

Despite having their own struggles, Beinn an Tuirc is not the only business offering to help and support others during the pandemic – turn to page three for more.

# Virus sparks cancellations and event postponements

Most of the events on Kintyre's social calendar have been cancelled or postponed to slow down the spread of coronavirus (COVID-19).

This week the majority of immediate, and some future, events were cancelled. This is in line with government advice to adhere to social distancing measures, particularly for those who are at an increased risk. This includes people aged 70 or older, people with specific underlying health conditions, and those who are pregnant.

Last weekend many of the events in the Courier's diary were called off – the Monday Social Club tea dance, a Salvation Army coffee morning, Kintyre Chorale's concerts at A'Chleit and Southend, and two football matches. This trend

continued into this week, with cheque presentations, coffee afternoons, flower festivals and quiz nights also cancelled.

Kintyre Music Club's concert featuring Ugly Bug Ragtime Three, which was scheduled for this evening (Friday), has also been called off.

While there are bound to be more, we have put together a list of some of the events which were to have taken place in the coming weeks and months but have been affected.

Carradale Music Festival – postponed. After initially hoping this year's festival, on April 10 and 11 could go ahead, the Carradale Music Festival committee has postponed it until a later date.

A spokesperson said: 'We are currently confirming dates in which we hope to reschedule the event and will have this information to you within the coming days.'

'Ticket buyers have now all been informed via email

about the situation. All tickets will be transferable to the rescheduled date. Please keep an eye on our social channels next week for more details.

'If you are unable to attend the rescheduled date and you require more information on getting a refund, please do not hesitate to contact us at carradalemusicfest@gmail.com.'

'Thank you for your continued support and for understanding our decision.'

Gintyre – postponed. Due to the ongoing coronavirus situation, the Gintyre committee has made the 'difficult decision' to postpone this year's event, meant to be taking place on April 18, until September 12.

All tickets purchased to date will remain valid.

A spokesperson said: 'We suspect we will all need a large gin by then!'

Campbeltown Malts Festival – cancelled. Campbeltown Malts Festival scheduled to take place from May 19 to 22 has been

cancelled after much consideration and consultation. Ticket holders will be offered full refunds.

As a preventative measure, all three distilleries involved in the festival – Springbank, Glengyle and Glen Scotia – have made the decision to close their shops and visitor centres and will not be conducting any tours or tastings until further notice.

Kintyre Music Festival – cancelled. From June 1 to June 6, this year's Kintyre Music Festival, which involves primary school children from Mid Argyll to Kintyre, has been cancelled.

A spokesperson said: 'Due to the coronavirus crisis, we've had to cancel all competitions and events.'

'We are terribly, terribly sorry but it's the way it has to be unfortunately – we have to keep the children safe, as well as the mums, dads and grandparents who support us and make up our audiences.'

## MSP suspends face-to-face surgeries

Michael Russell MSP has announced that all face-to-face surgeries across Argyll and Bute have been cancelled as temporary changes are implemented due to the coronavirus pandemic.

'I want to emphasise that while many things are changing because of the virus, what is certain is that the constituency staff and I remain available to help on the already wide range of issues with which we deal on a daily basis,'

said the MSP. 'The operational changes we are introducing are intended to lessen the possibility of spreading the virus particularly to people who are most vulnerable, who form a significant percentage of constituents seen by us regularly.'

The constituency office at 81 Argyll St, Dunoon will remain open but access will be by appointment only.

Visits and meetings already scheduled across the constituency will be reviewed on a case-by-case basis.

Mr Russell and his team will aim to have as much up-to-date Scottish Government and Scottish Parliament information on COVID-19 issues available for constituents as possible.

## Virus puts Pupils' season under threat

Full-time may have already been called on Campbeltown Pupils' 2019/20 season after the Scottish football calendar was stopped to help thwart coronavirus, writes John McCallum.

The Pupils were due to travel to East Renfrewshire to play Busby on league duty last Saturday, but the fixture was postponed last Friday after the Scottish Football Association (SFA), the sport's governing body in Scotland, announced an indefinite stoppage of

football at all levels in an attempt to curb the spread of the COVID-19 virus.

The hiatus, which at the time of going to print has no confirmed end date, includes the whole of Scottish football, from the professional leagues to amateur and youth levels, as well as the country's five futsal leagues.

It follows a move by the Scottish Government to ban events drawing more than 500 people, and from UK health advice that 'unnecessary social gath-

erings' should be avoided. And while the Pupils often enjoy crowds of around 200 spectators for home matches at their Kintyre Park ground, past matches, such as the Pupils v Carradale Scottish Cup tie in 2013, have attracted around 600 fans.

A Pupils spokesperson said: 'This is a difficult situation for the country, for businesses, and for sports clubs like our own, but it is first and foremost about protecting public health.'

# NHS restricts hospital patient visiting in Argyll and Bute

NHS Highland is asking people to visit hospital patients only if absolutely necessary – and to call in advance.

The measure was introduced on March 14 in a bid to reduce the risk of the spread of coronavirus (COVID-19) to patients and staff.

A spokesperson for NHS Highland, which operates within Argyll and Bute, said: 'This is a measure that will be reviewed weekly. If your visit is essential please contact the ward which will support you with arrangements. We are grateful to the public for your co-operation and understanding.'

'If you are visiting the hospital please ensure that you wash your hands or use hand sanitiser before you go on to the ward/department and as you leave the hospital.'

'Please do not enter the hospital if you are unwell.'

On Monday March 16 it was announced that only essential visitors would be allowed access to extra care housing facility Lorne Campbell Court. Those entering the building are asked to adhere to hand-washing advice.

A spokesperson for HC-One, which runs Kintyre Care Home, told the Courier: 'HC-One has always had robust policies in place to both prepare for and prevent the spread of any infection, and we are employing these policies to deal with coronavirus.'

'In response to the growing UK coronavirus outbreak, we have a number of measures in place and have created a dedicated steering group. To help prevent the spread of infection, the most current and

comprehensive advice is regularly issued to all HC-One homes, including Kintyre.

'We have established hand-washing stations in the reception areas of all homes and installed additional prominent signage regarding hand-washing and other advice throughout.'

'To further minimise the risk to residents, we are restricting non-essential visitors from visiting our homes. This is a decision that has not been taken lightly. However, the health and safety of our residents is paramount and as a responsible care provider, we have to make decisions which are in the best interests of our residents.'



## Argyll Talking Newspapers stops operations

Argyll Talking Newspapers, which provides a free service to 125 listeners including nine in Campbeltown and Carradale, will suspend its operation with immediate effect.

The charity, which records local newspapers throughout Argyll and Bute, will provide listeners this coming weekend (March 20-21) with their usual USB sticks with a recorded message explaining the decision.

After that there will be no recordings until further notice.

Speaking on behalf of the charity, chairman Robin Finlay said: "This has been a difficult decision. So many people rely on us to keep them up-to-date with what is happening in their area. This decision has been taken in light of ongoing government and medical advice and with input also from the Talking Newspapers Federation.

"Considering the average age of our volunteers and listeners, together with the transmission risks associated with the face-to-face contacts and the handling of sticks and envelopes by both groups, to continue may constitute significant risks.

"We will be in touch again with our listeners as soon as the situation changes."

# Cinema remains positive despite closure decision

Campbeltown's beloved cinema, 'The Wee Pictures' is the latest victim of coronavirus.

Following advice from the Scottish Government and the UK Cinema Association, Campbeltown Community Business (CCB), which operates Campbeltown Picture House, has made the 'difficult decision' to temporarily close the cinema for the safety of customers and staff.

This time of the year is generally a period of lower cinema attendance figures associated with poor weather and less popular movies. Nevertheless, the trading figures with both cinema and cafe had been holding up well until the coronavirus pandemic.

Coupled with safety concerns due to coronavirus, the film distributors have been rapidly announcing delays in the launch of popular titles such as the next

James Bond installment, No Time to Die, and Peter Rabbit 2 which had been scheduled for the spring holiday period. With government warnings and advice increasing tempo by the day, any opportunity for increased holiday audience levels was removed at a stroke.

At a meeting on Tuesday evening, the volunteer board had to take the 'very regrettable but essential decision' that the cinema must stop trading and reopen once the crisis passes.

A spokesperson said: "Very regrettably the extremely loyal and hard-working cinema staff are the ones suffering the consequence of this essential action of temporary cinema closure as there was no choice but to send them home to weather the storm."

Meanwhile the board of direc-



tors will concentrate its efforts on ensuring that the cinema can survive and reopen when the time comes.

The timescale of the shut-down is currently unknown as the situation is changing day-by-day but it could be lengthy.

The spokesperson said: "Such a prolonged closure, for whatever the reason, threatens the very survival of CCB and the cinema in the longer term. This wonderful community facility has been progressing well over the past two years since completion of the Centenary Project which transformed a run-down single-screen cinema into a state-of-the-art cultural hub for all the residents of Kintyre and its visitors."

Announced government assistance schemes, which are being updated on a daily basis, are

aimed at providing the means of survival. However, optimistic as the announcements may seem, the details concerning any of them have yet to be finalised.

It is therefore not at all clear at this stage whether CCB will qualify for any of the grant or loan schemes on offer.

Ellen Mainwood, pictured, the cinema's general manager, and the board of CCB are monitoring the situation, and are being advised by the UK Cinema Association which is lobbying the government for measures to ensure the future of the whole UK cinema industry. The majority of UK cinemas have now shut their doors.

Mindful of the fact that government rescue packages may need to be further augmented to ensure survival, Ellen and the board are actively pursuing assistance from other sources such as those funding bodies which helped so massively with the Centenary Project.

## Meeting held to discuss school's follow-up report

Argyll and Bute Council's head of education, Anne Paterson, met with Campbeltown Grammar School's head teacher, David Fyfe, and councillors Donald Kelly and John Armour last week to discuss the school's recent HM Inspectorate of Education (HMIE) follow-up report.

Councillor Kelly arranged the meeting, held on Monday March 9, due to concerns raised by parents and the wider community after the report revealed the school had made 'insufficient progress' to tackle problems which were highlighted at its last inspection.

The report highlighted 'weak performance in numeracy', 'limited success in developing a clear sense of direction', 'significant concerns about poor behaviour in the school', and 'major inconsistencies in teachers' practice'.

Councillor Kelly said: "Given the concerns raised regarding the HMIE follow-up report I felt it was important to organise a face-to-face meeting with council officers. "The meeting itself was rea-

sonably positive with a number of issues being discussed.

"The plan is for the council to carry out a mock inspection of the school, possibly in August prior to the inspectors returning in October. This should help assist staff in their preparations for the return visit.

"We also discussed the possibility of increasing the number of NAT 5 options currently available for pupils to take at the school and the opportunity for pupils to

start them earlier. The issue of positive destinations for pupils who are not going on to further education was also discussed as I feel not enough is being done to accommodate these pupils. I have asked for a further report on this to come to the Mid Argyll, Kintyre and the Islands Area Committee."

# Condition survey to be done at Dalintober

After pressure from a Kintyre councillor, a condition survey is to be carried out at Dalintober Primary School following two ceiling collapses.

Councillor Donald Kelly first raised his concerns about the condition of the school more than a year before the first false ceiling collapsed in January this year, forcing the school's senior students to be relocated to Campbeltown Grammar School while emergency repairs were carried out in 10 classrooms.

Shortly after all pupils returned to the school, there was a further ceiling collapse, on February 24, but it did not require the relocation of any pupils.

Councillor Kelly contacted Douglas Hendry, the council's



director of education, asking that a full structural survey be carried out on the building with the results presented to the council as a matter of urgency, but he was told that it was an 'operational issue' and that

no report would be presented. Councillor Kelly said he was left with 'no option' but to construct a motion requesting the support of the Mid Argyll, Kintyre and the Islands area committee to demand

that the council take action. The motion was seconded by fellow Kintyre councillor John Armour and supported unanimously. It was referred to the council's Community Services Committee, where it

was agreed, at a meeting on March 12, that a condition survey at the school would be carried out this month.

Councillor Kelly said: 'I am pleased the committee has agreed with my motion and supported the request for a survey. However, this should have been done immediately and as a matter of course. It should have never taken a councillor's intervention to make this happen.'

Councillor Armour added: 'I was happy to second Donald's motion and I am pleased that the area committee unanimously approved the motion. I was delighted to see that the Community Services Committee also agreed with local members and have brought the condition survey forward from next year to this. Hopefully this will give some peace of mind to parents and staff.'

## Jobs? We'll have some of those, thanks

The announcement in the UK Budget that civil service jobs are coming to Scotland has been welcomed by Councillor Aileen Morton, leader of Argyll and Bute Council.

'This is good news,' said Councillor Morton, 'but could be great news if the UK and Scottish Government committed to a proportion of these jobs coming to the west of Scotland where the population is falling.'

She said the need for these jobs was highest outside the central belt: 'Argyll and Bute is both a mainland and island council area, easily accessible from the central belt and one of the most beautiful parts of the country.'

'Moving the jobs here would help to reverse the fall in population that is an obstacle to developing Argyll and Bute as a driver for the Scottish and UK economies.'

'I urge both governments to make an announcement as soon as possible confirming that these jobs will be going where they are most needed.'

## Vital road improvements planned for Kintyre routes

A series of road improvements are scheduled for Campbeltown and Kintyre – but some of them are not in the areas councillors and community councillors feel they are needed most.

From April to December Transport Scotland is planning to invest more than £2.7 million across 22 surfacing improvement projects on the A83. These include: Campbeltown Temp, May 3, £50,000; North of Bellochchantuy Straights, May 24, £150,000; North of Campbeltown, August, £50,000; North end of Campbeltown, September, £350,000; Hall Street, Campbeltown, September, £75,000; Kilchenzie, October, £150,000; and Ballochroy, October, £100,000.

A BEAR spokesperson said: 'We're mobilising our teams ready to begin work on this new programme which begins in April, and they will carry out consultation with all relevant stakeholders in advance of each project. More information will be shared around the traffic management arrangements, specific dates and timings in due

course. The programme is subject to change depending on weather conditions and progress with other projects across the north west trunk road network.

'Every effort will be taken to ensure disruption will be kept to a minimum during the delivery of this programme, and we encourage road users to plan ahead by checking the Traffic Scotland website for up-to-date journey information.'

Councillor Donald Kelly, who has been lobbying Transport Scotland about some of these areas for the past year, said: 'The resurfacing projects and allocated funding for significant repairs to the A83 is welcomed.'

'I have requested the proposed works for Campbeltown at Hall Street and Snipefield are moved forward and started as soon as possible.'

Although Kintyre's trunk road is set to improve, disappointment was raised at Campbeltown Community Council's March meeting that Argyll and Bute's Council's capital works programme for roads which are not trunked has no plans

for Campbeltown. The two areas where work will be carried out in South Kintyre are on the Mull of Kintyre Lighthouse road and an area at Saddell.

The community council voiced its disappointment at this, given that it sent a letter to the council last month in which it said it 'deplored' the state of the roads in and around Campbeltown, particularly in the following areas: the junction of New Quay Street and Kilkerran Road; the Esplanade near the war memorial; Ralston Road; Hillside Road; Roading; Kirk Street; Argyll Street; Burnside Street; Burnbank; Kilkerran Road at the Ardsheel Hotel; and at the POL depot on Kilkerran Road.

Councillor John Armour said: 'I am disappointed that some of the roads which are in poor condition in Campbeltown have not been included in the capital programme. I appreciate budgets are tight but the roads that are busy in and around Campbeltown and have been highlighted by Campbeltown Community Council really do need some attention.'



## Pitch charge shock for sports clubs

The cost of using playing fields in Campbeltown will increase by 90 per cent and the news has left sports clubs in the area stunned.

The clubs are calling on Argyll and Bute Council to reconsider the increase, which will see adult pitch hire increasing from £31.50 to £60 per game and hires for children going from £15.75 to £30; training hire will also increase from £8.30 to £15.

South Kintyre Sports Council is outraged by the charges, which will be implemented on April 1.

A sports council spokesman said: 'We need to understand exactly what these costs are based on. Oban and Dunoon, for example,

have groundsmen who open the changing rooms and manage the pitches.

'We have repeatedly asked for groundsmen for Campbeltown, but this has been ignored.

'The use of pitches has increased in the last five years in Campbeltown with the introduction of different football leagues.

'In fact, only last weekend, we saw four matches played in Campbeltown – I doubt if any community in Argyll has had that many matches on grass in the last month.

'I'm sure our clubs are quite happy to pay good money for modern day facilities, but we simply don't have these.'

## Row over chemical weapons sea dumping continues

The government is facing further pressure over the question of dumping chemical weapons at sea.

Last month The Courier revealed that a councillor in Northern Ireland believed that dangerous chemical weapons had been dumped in the sea off Kintyre and Islay after the Second World War.

Councillor Oliver McMullen said he had eye-witness accounts of munitions being dumped before they reached the authorised disposal areas in deep water off Scotland and Ireland.

Now Labour's Shadow Defence Secretary

Dr David Clark is preparing to table a series of parliamentary questions which he hopes will reveal the truth about the dumping programme.

He has already said that the fact that munitions are regularly washed up on beaches in Northern Ireland and Kintyre calls into question the wisdom of sea dumping.

## FIFTY YEARS AGO

Thursday March 19, 1970

## Queen's sturgeon was sold and eaten

The 14 lb sturgeon caught last week by local trawler the Crimson Arrow, and intended as a gift to the Queen, was sold and eaten on Saturday night by diners at Glasgow's Central Hotel.

Glasgow fish merchant Robert Brockett spoke of his disappointment when he discovered that the 3 ft fish, which he had intended to offer to the Queen, had been sold to another fish merchant.

'It arrived in the fish market all right – but when I got down there, I found it had been sold along with the rest of the fish. I was very angry.

'Only about six sturgeons have arrived in Glasgow fish market since the war.

'It is a rare fish. By decree of Edward II, it is a royal fish and should be handed over to the King or Queen when it is caught.

'It is merely a tradition but one that is always observed. I had plans for that sturgeon...'

## ONE-HUNDRED YEARS AGO

Saturday March 20, 1920

## Violent gale

On Friday last a gale of unusual violence was experienced in this district. The wind was from the west, and it blew hard all night, while during the daytime on Friday it developed almost cyclonic force.

For several hours walking in the streets was only possible for the most active, and chimney cans and slates were dislodged in all parts of the town.

Fortunately the gale in its most violent phase was of comparatively short duration, and in the afternoon the wind fell rapidly.

The fact that the wind was off-shore here saved the harbour and shipping from damage which would undoubtedly have been serious had the gale been blowing from the opposite air.

The wind developed a velocity greater than any previous storm this winter, and even in the short reach of the inner harbour was sending the waves over the New Quay.

Flying spray covered the face of the sea like a mist, making it possible to see only about halfway down the loch.

The steamer Kinloch on her passage down Kilbrannan Sound made no attempt to call at the Kintyre ports. The officers remarked that never in their experience had they seen Kilbrannan Sound such a sight with flying spray, which made it difficult at times to see as far as 50 yards ahead.

tings ignited a desire in the youngsters to learn about fire-fighting.



# Rhunahaorine project is unveiled to the public

Rhunahaorine Primary School's pupils showcased months of hard work in more than just history at the opening of their Old Largie Castle exhibition at Campbeltown Museum.

For the seventh year, the museum is hosting a spring exhibition of project work from Kintyre pupils.

The Old Largie Castle exhibition includes photography, clay work, sculptures and model artwork all produced by the children of Rhunahaorine.

## Workshops

Since November 2019 until February this year, pupils worked with the Kilmartin Museum education team, professional artists and an archaeologist, as they took part in classroom-based workshops and site visits.

The school is very close to the ruins of Old Largie Castle, which features on its badge, and an old farm steading, but very little remains today of any buildings or walls.

When habitable, Old Largie Castle was occupied by a family of the name Macdonald,

ancestors of the present Macdonalds of Largie, an estate surrounding the school.

The project, which was funded by the West Kintyre Windfarm Trust, included carrying out an archaeological survey of the Old Largie Castle site; researching the history of Ranald Bane Macdonald, the founder of Clan Macdonald of Largie; researching the history of life during the 15th century; surveillance and document recording of soil samples from the site; surveillance of the natural fauna and flora at the site; designing and creating a Ranald Bane sculpture; designing and creating a landscape model of the castle site; and the production of 'green ware' medieval mugs and carved stones of Ranald Bane.

The children were supported throughout their work by Catriona Brown, the school's acting head teacher, Julia Hamilton from Kilmartin Museum's education team, field archaeologist Roddy Regan, photographer Philip Price, artist Jae Ferguson, storyteller Patsy Dyer, drama and music teacher Mandy Beveridge, Marilyn Shedden

and Rebecca Maxwell Macdonald of Largie Estate.

Jae, who is based at Kilmichael Glassary, and Julia both attended the exhibition's official opening last Saturday afternoon and addressed the children and their families, commending the youngsters' commitment and enthusiasm throughout the project. Julia also thanked the museum's former curator, Meghann Logue, for allowing the exhibition to take place.

Before the ribbon was cut by Jenny Taylor, on behalf of the West Kintyre Windfarm Trust, marking the exhibition officially open, the pupils, donning traditional dress, thanked all those who helped them.

## Eager

The youngsters were eager to see their work on display, and proudly invited their parents, grandparents, aunts and uncles – many of whom also attended Rhunahaorine Primary School but still learned something new about castle's history – to join them.

The exhibition is now open to the public. The museum is open from Monday to Friday, from 9am to 12.30pm and from 1.30pm to 4pm each day.

# First Minister congratulates Clachan Primary on Green Flag success

Nicola Sturgeon also apologised for not being able to attend a celebration at the school which was reported in last week's Courier.

Run by Keep Scotland Beautiful, Eco-Schools is the largest sustainable schools programme in the world and encourages young people to take steps to ensure the environment is looked after.

During the school's afternoon of eco fun to celebrate the award, 30 members of the community joined local councillor Anne Horn, and Argyll and Bute's Michael Russell MSP and Brendan O'Hara MP.

Councillor Horn presented the green flag to the pupils as

she has been a 'great supporter' of the school.

Everyone was piped out to the flag pole by Charles MacLean, the school's chanter instructor, before Mr Russell raised the flag.

Afterwards everyone returned to the classroom for a performance of songs and a play about recycling written by all the pupils, which was followed by a presentation about Eco-Schools Scotland.

The children had each created a stall displaying various eco themes.

There were games, challenges, a quiz and free give-aways. Teas, coffees and cakes were also served.

The school has been on the Eco-Schools programme for 16 years.

The assessment feedback for this year's application, which was submitted by Joanna Gray, chair of the eco committee, stated that it was 'one

This week the school received more praise when a pack from the House of Commons was delivered in the post.

It included a hand-written letter from Mr O'Hara, thanking the school for inviting him to attend the celebration.

He described the children as a 'wonderful bunch of happy, confident, intelligent pupils'.

It also informed the school that Mr O'Hara raised a motion about Clachan Primary School at Westminster on March 9, which noted the school's 'remarkable achievement' and commended the 'outstanding work' done by head teacher Lucy Blake and class teacher Lesley Kean.

Mr O'Hara sent a copy of the daily motions booklet, as well as a personal letter, to each child.







## Duty first as charity air ambulance cancels social events

Organisers of Scotland's Charity Air Ambulance (SCAA) have cancelled all public engagement events for the foreseeable future in line with government advice on the coronavirus (COVID-19) outbreak.

The nation's only charity-funded air ambulance, and a frequent visitor to Campbeltown, embarks on hundreds of public engagement and fundraising activities throughout the year to raise awareness of the charity and attract funding for its life-saving service.

But as long as the spread of coronavirus remains an issue these activities will be stopped and a focus given to maintaining the emergency response front-line service.

'As the coronavirus pandemic continues to escalate, our key priority remains to ensure that we sustain our air ambulance services for communities across Scotland 365 days of the year,' said David Craig, the SCAA chief executive.

'Although we are disappointed to have to cancel all

non-essential activities for the foreseeable future, we are confident that it is the right action to take at this time.'

He added that given the current situation with COVID-19 and recent advice from the NHS regarding social distancing, all future events, social gatherings and meetings would be postponed until further notice.

'We hope the public will understand our position and continue to support us in the amazing way they always have to ensure we keep flying for those most in need.'

Since launching in 2013, SCAA has responded to nearly 2,500 emergencies all across the Scottish mainland and the islands. Many of these have involved critical illness or injury where speed has proved a life-saving factor. The charity is due to launch a second helicopter air ambulance next month.






