David crosses finish line after year of fundraising

Today (Friday, January 1) is the first day in a year that Campbeltown man David Brown is under no obligation to walk, run or cycle at least five kilometres.

David, a manager at Campbeltown's Tesco Metro store, set himself a 5K-a-day challenge at the beginning of 2020 in a bid to raise money for charity while maintaining his fitness, donating 30p of his own money for every kilometre completed to a charity or cause of his choice for each month.

These were: January: mental health awareness; February: British Heart Foundation; March: stroke awareness; April: primary ciliary dyskinesia awareness; May: Helen Gilchrist's Jolly Monday Show; June: Marie Curie; July: Mairi Semple Fund; August: Kintyre Food Bank; September: Campbeltown Christmas Lights Group; October: Campbeltown MS Society; November: Kintyre

Link Club; December: Youth Impact. Despite breaking his shoulder last January, he did not miss a single day's exercise, completing 2,179 kilometres throughout the year and donating £650 of his own money.

Several of the charities were further boosted – by an additional £8,000, David thinks – through their own committee members and supporters joining in with the challenge.

'It was fantastic to see charities embrace my idea and that's what I set out to achieve,' David said. 'I wanted to inspire people to think about how they could help the local community.'

'Mental health has been important to a lot of people this year, and by doing this challenge it has helped me and others.'

David didn't even take Christmas Day off – instead, he drafted in Connor Molloy and Andrew Robertson to run with him, David in a Santa suit and the other two dressed as elves.

Hospital helipad permission

Campbeltown received a Christmas gift when planning permission for a new, purpose-built helipad was granted on December 23.

Argyll and Bute Council approved plans for the helipad at the current, water-logged landing site south of Campbeltown Hospital from which emergency patients are transferred to larger hospitals.

Stuart McLellan, an ambulance technician from Neilston, East Renfrewshire, who has family in Campbeltown, has worked for two years to bring the project to fruition. He is now in receipt of £270,000 funding and work is set to start on January 11.

Stuart told the Courier: 'I am absolutely delighted that an idea two years ago is now becoming a reality. I've had numerous challenges to resolve in order for us to get to the construction phase but I'm hopeful that will be completed by April 2021. Happy new year, Campbeltown!'

The helipad is to be named the Robert Black Memorial Helipad after the paramedic who died in May last year after a battle with Covid-19.

Fond farewell and thanks to thoughtful Marilyn

During more than a decade of writing the Thought for the Week column for the Campbeltown Courier and Argyllshire Advertiser, Marilyn Shedden never missed a single week.

Marilyn has been giving readers something to think about for the last 11 years – through nearly 600 weekly columns – but she has now decided it is time to hand over the role to others.

'I thought it was time that people had a change – 11 years of the same person is quite a long time and I think folk deserve something else,' she said.

'I've absolutely loved my time as Thought for the Week contributor. I've even made new friends through it; people have been so kind, commenting on different 'thoughts' and getting in touch with me about them. I've thoroughly enjoyed

it.' Marilyn took over writing the column in January 2010 as a tribute to her mother, who passed away on Christmas Eve in 2009. 'I started it as a wee tribute to her and I think she would have been pleased with a lot of them,' Marilyn said. 'I decided not to make it a purely Christian 'thought'.

'Before I took over, it had been very much a Bible-based

column, but I wanted it to be something that could touch people of any faith or none. So, while some weeks had a Christian slant to them, there were others of no persuasion – they were just topics I thought might be helpful for people to think about; nature, stars, planets, things like that.'

Marilyn's submissions were quite varied, often referencing popular movies and television shows, or subjects of national and international significance.

'There was a great response to the wee series I did on the Paddington movies,' she said. 'A lady arrived at my door one day with beautiful Paddington hand towels and notelets for me because she enjoyed them so much – things like that just made my day.'

Asked if there was one subject in particular which was her favourite to write about, Marilyn said: 'I really enjoyed the 'thoughts' I wrote while we were waiting to get our

puppies, and then, after we got them, sharing stories about them. I got lots of comments about those 'thoughts' too – pets are also something that touch people across all faiths and none, something many people relate to.'

Marilyn said she tried to avoid expressing overly political opinions in the column and she also tried to focus on the brighter side of life.

'There was so much bad news, so I tried to look at the positive side of things, without being glib or trite. I very much tried to balance it, dealing with the difficult things but not in a patronising way.'

Although never failing to come up with a column, Marilyn admits the words didn't always flow easily.

'Some weeks I wondered what I was going to write about and, when that happened, I'd go to my computer, bring up a blank page, and it just happened – I'd just get the thought,' she said.

'I've never been let down.' Marilyn, who lives near Muasdale, is kept busy as mission convener for the Argyll Presbytery and an elder and worship leader at Killean and Kilchenzie Church. She is also chaplain to both Rhunahaorine and Glenbarr primary schools, something which she describes as her 'greatest joy'.

Asked what she plans to do with any new spare time she may have, she said: 'I've got a new camera and I'd like to get more into my photography, spending more time out and about, learning a bit more about the camera's advanced features.'

The Thought for the Week column will now be written by different religious leaders from around Kintyre on a rota basis.

Hospital and care home visiting guidance updated

With mainland Scotland entering level four Covid-19 restrictions as of Boxing Day, NHS Highland has updated visiting guidance for its hospitals and care homes.

As of December 26, visiting hospitals within level four areas is now for essential visits only, where it is imperative that someone is allowed to see their loved one in a number of exceptional circumstances.

Examples of essential visits include but are not limited to:

- A birth partner supporting a pregnant person during hospital visits;
- For a person receiving end-of-life care – this is to be defined as flexibly and compassionately as possible, to support patients at the end of life spending meaningful time with their loved ones in their final days and weeks;
- To support someone with a mental health issue such as dementia, a learning disability or autism where not being present would cause the patient to be distressed;
- To accompany a child in hospital.

These include any other situation where clinical staff assess that it is essential to involve family or carers for ethical or patient safety reasons.

Some parts of the Western Isles, including Islay and Jura, were moved to level three restrictions.

Visiting hospitals in these areas is also essential visits only, but clinicians at hospital level can agree to move to one designated visitor if it is safe and appropriate.

Visiting all care homes across the Scottish mainland, including those operated by independent sector care providers, has also changed.

Indoor visiting is limited to essential visits only. Outdoor visits, via gardens or windows, can still take place but only agreed in advance with the care home and should be limited to one visitor only.

Visits by children and young people are suspended at this time. Any outdoor visiting is also subject to any restrictions in place with each individual care home.

Essential visits include

circumstances where it is clear that the person's health and wellbeing is changing for the worse; where visiting may help with communication difficulties; to ease significant personal stress or other pressing circumstances, including approaching end of life.

For island care homes in level three areas, the current visiting guidelines continue to apply with essential visits continuing. Indoor visits can have one designated person for up to four hours once a week, and garden visits can have a maximum of six people from no more than two different households, 60 minutes once a week. This is dependent on the current status of the care home.

An NHS Highland spokesperson said: 'We would also ask, no matter what level we are in, that if you are unwell and/or exhibiting symptoms of Covid-19 – a new, persistent cough and fever or high temperature – please do not visit any health or social care settings. Self-isolate at home and book a test.'

Christmas earthquake rocks Kintyre

Kintyre residents rocked around the Christmas tree on December 25 as an early morning earthquake shook the peninsula. According to the British Geological Survey's website, the 2.4 magnitude earthquake took place at 6.52am on Christmas Day, at an offshore location about 14 kilometres west of Westport Beach car park, at depth of seven kilometres. The tremor was felt by a householder in Kilchenzie, about 16 kilometres from the epicentre, who described it as 'like a wood lorry rumbling past the house'.

A decade before permanent solution on A83 at Rest?

Two of South Kintyre's councillors have reacted to the suggestion that it may be 10 years before there is a permanent solution to the landslip issues which have blighted the A83 at the Rest and Be Thankful.

A spokesperson for Transport Scotland, the national transport agency which oversees Scotland's trunk road network, told the Courier that a specific timescale could not be given, despite reports of attendees at a recent stakeholders' meeting being told it could be up to a decade – five years before work commences and another five years before it is complete.

The spokesperson said: 'The current work to identify the preferred corridor is expected to be completed in spring this year. Following this, designs will be progressed and, as with other projects to improve the

trunk road network, there will be a need to complete the necessary environmental assessments and statutory process to allow land to be acquired and the project constructed.

'We recognise that the timescales for developing an alternative to the current route and finding a long-term solution to the challenges created by the Rest and Be Thankful section of the A83 are frus-

trating for the community and we will look to compress the programme where possible.

'However, it is important that the correct statutory process is followed to ensure a fair and transparent assessment of options and impacts on communities and road users.

'We remain committed to progressing substantial shorter-term investment in the existing A83 in tandem with the work to identify a permanent solution as part of a two-phased approach and we will keep communities and road users updated as the design work progresses.'

Argyll First Councillor Donald Kelly said: 'The suggested 10-year timescale is totally ridiculous and unacceptable and has to be accelerated as a matter of urgency.

'The Scottish Government needs to prioritise the A83 permanent solution and ensure the work is fast-tracked at every juncture.

'We have been treated like second-class citizens for long enough and I am certain that if this was the M8, it would have been repaired years ago.'

Councillor Rory Colville said: 'If there is any good news, it is that, at long last, there is a commitment by the government that a permanent solution is essential.

'Meantime, it is vital that a temporary solution utilising the existing infrastructure is implemented as quickly as possible using a combination of the existing A83 route, the Old Military Road and the forestry track. At the same time, the release of much-needed capital funding is essential to help maintain and improve the alternative routes when the road is closed.

'In 10 years' time, Argyll will either be part of a vibrant Scotland or will have been cast aside by a Scottish Parliament talking shop, full of promises undelivered.'

Skykon fear as firm goes under

New Year and new worries for Skykon after its parent company filed for the Danish equivalent of going into administration in the UK, just days before Christmas.

Danish newspaper Fyens Stiftstidende, and the country's financial news agency Børsen, reported the news last week.

More than 100 jobs are at stake at the wind turbine tower factory on the former airbase at Machrihanish and a new multimillion-pound extension, due to open next month, stands paralysed; it was to take the number employed there up to 300.

Jim Mather, MSP for Argyll and Bute, told the Courier: 'Our officials don't think this necessarily means immediate administration at Campbeltown. They are in touch with Scottish Development International and Skykon, checking the position, and immediate actions and options. Clearly, we will stay closely involved and be seeking the best possible outcome as we have done in the past.'

available to pay for 1,000 new closed circuit television cameras to help fight crime in Scottish towns.

Kintyre Crime Prevention Panel recently received an estimate for the cost of installing a system from a leading security firm. Thorne Security says it could have a system in operation for £23,400, less than half the amount the panel previously thought it would cost.

The system would include four cameras to cover Main Street, Longrow, Burnside Square and the area around Hall Street and the cross.

Four special television screens at Campbeltown Police Station would allow the police to watch the pictures from the cameras. The images would be recorded on an industrial-quality video recorder at the station.

The secretary of the panel, Sergeant Douglas Reid of Campbeltown police, has already contacted the Scottish Office for more details about the funding package. Sergeant Reid said:

'The panel is fully committed, following the tremendous public response, to go in as far as possible along this road.'

Warning to owners of lighters

A case of great importance to the owners of the smaller class of trading vessels has been disposed of in Campbeltown Sheriff Court.

Neil Black, Tarbert, Lochfyne, owner of steamship Bloodhound, was charged with having on July 1 last proceeded to sea without having the vessel marked with the proper load line, contrary to the Merchant Shipping Act.

A plea of guilty was tendered.

The procurator fiscal stated that according to the Act no vessel could leave any port in the United Kingdom without having the load line clearly shown on her side. In the Clyde, however, the Board of Trade did not insist on this in respect of vessels trading exclusively within what is known as the smooth water area.

This area was within an imaginary line drawn from Skipness Point to Fairlie. On behalf of the accused, an agent stated that he had traded with the Bloodhound for nearly 40 years. During the war, the ship had been requisitioned by the Ministry of Shipping, and under the orders of that department had been sent outside the limits of the smooth water area.

The accused had naturally thought that what he had been doing during the war, when he traded to ports on Islay and the Ayrshire coast, he was free to do now. Sheriff Macmaster Campbell imposed a penalty of £10.

Gunner Neil MacLean's POW diary

DOWN MEMORY LANE

The Courier continues to share more from Campbeltown soldier Gunner Neil MacLean's previously unpublished prisoner-of-war diary

Gunner MacLean was captured following the 51st Highland Division's surrender at St Valéry-en-Caux during the Second World War.

The diary, and several photographs of Neil during and after the war, were supplied by Neil's son Calum, who knew nothing of the diary until after his father's death.

This week continues from: **February 1942** - 1st, sent another letter and a clear photo to Margaret, hope it reaches. 2nd, the farmer killed two pigs, a calf and a stirk making a lot of it into sausages to last them for a year.

The farmer was in a bad rage today, shouting at all the boys most of the time.

He had been like this before and then on the 3rd the con-

troller came so we reported the farmer to him and we hope he will settle down a bit and if not we will go back to Stalaig and go out to another farm to work.

11th, finished the dung today. It was a very cold day, taking it from the farmyard to a pit in the field. One of our boys was shot at Pankendoff with one of the guards. I went over to see the boys on the 18th, all OK and getting on not too bad.

A new guard came to them on the 7th till the end of the month. Some days working in our room separating peas from barley (very tiresome). Shifting snow, all the workers on the farm received 27 cubic cm of wood each so we were down giving them a hand to saw and chop it up, it should be finished

by next week. We heard we are being shifted out here so time will tell.

22nd, sent all our washing to be done by one of the women in the village. Saves us a lot of time and at present we have plenty of money.

March - The hours of this month should be 7am till 6.30pm but as we are well on with our work we are working from 7.30am till 5pm. Up till the 9th we were sorting out peas and doing odd jobs. Pay day, 12-96. Up till the 16th, taking down old trees and pruning along with Finlay Huie.

On the 17th Alex and I went into Marienwerder and bought a pair of glasses for reading costing us each 17M. Enjoyed the day out and met a few

of the boys. Then three days emptying the dung mill... then four days shifting snow on a side road, then odd jobs till the end of the month. (No RCP or cigarettes).

April - 1st, very cold morning, put out to the fields to cut holes in the snow to let the air through, turned out very wet so came home. 3rd, day off for Good Friday. 4th, went to

visit some of the boys at Deit. Monday, off and received a nice tea. 5th, day off, went to see the boys at Pankendoff. 6th, boys came over from Crufern.

7th, at night 20 Russians came to take over our jobs, great excitement, We thought we would be leaving the next morning. 10th, received 150 cigarettes (no smokes in our camp) from friends in Argyll.

Doing odd jobs up till the 14th when we received word to go back to Stalaig. All the boys very happy as the food here was getting a bit scarce, they could have given us plenty more.

16th, up at usual time cleaning up billet. Snowing all morning, moved out by train at 12.45pm and went to Marienburg and went to the head office and received our pay. Our mail has just gone off when we left.

Received a clothing parcel

from Connyglen then marched to the Stalaig, arrived there around 6.30pm. Had our tea and then a look around. Met some of the boys we knew and had a good chat. No lice in Stalaig but plenty of fleas.

17th, received word in the morning to stand by to go out on a work party. Hanging around all day but did not move out. 18th, 5.30am, the guard came and told us to be ready to move out at 6am.

Arrived at Tiegenhof about 10am. Had a good plate of soup and then went to work unloading coal. We were placed on a small railway and have a good place to sleep, only the work is really dirty. 19th, being Sunday we thought there would be no work but at 10am we were told to go out and unload two wagons.

NFUS welcomes EU trade deal but it is not all good news

The announcement that a trade deal between the UK and the EU has been agreed just days before the end of the transition period is a great relief to Scotland's farmers and crofters and the wider food chain.
Since the EU referendum four-and-a-half years ago, NFU Scotland has been resolute in its belief that a 'no deal', and the introduction of swingeing tariffs on key agricultural products would have been a disaster for the sector.
The detail of the deal, contained within a 2,000-page document, must be scrutinised and receive parliamentary approval.
It does offer a platform for trade with the EU, but it is

unlikely to be frictionless. Trade will inevitably involve significant levels of bureaucracy, additional cost and delays, particularly in early January whilst new systems at the borders bed in.
In addition, the decision by the EU to grant third country listing status to the UK on December 23 and approve exports of meat, dairy and other products of animal origin is seen as crucial. Scottish red meat exports to the EU alone are worth more than £80 million.
However, the trade deal has failed Scotland's internationally recognised seed potato industry.
From January 1 it will not be possible for Scottish seed pota-

toes to be exported to the EU.
As an EU member state, Britain exported around 30,000t of seed potatoes, worth £13.5 million, to mainland Europe each year and the majority of these were high-health stocks grown in Scotland.
There is also significant trade with Northern Ireland that is now at risk, although great efforts have been made by the seed potato trade to export earlier to beat the December 31 deadline.


